

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

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

In order to discuss this or an similar question profitably and intel-

ligently, it is necessary to set aside pride and prejudice of every kind, whether personal, sectional or national, and consider in a judicial spirit the conditions in which this problem is involved. We must know the state of the fishery and the principal facts pertaining to the life and habits

Until within a few years the life istory of the lobster was very imperfectly known, and this ignorance has nowhere been more clearly refleeted than in the attempts to cure xisting evils by legislation. Knowng the general facts of the case, we must interpret them in accordance with the principles of science and common sense. The principal facts

(1) The fishery is declining, and this decline is due to the persistence with which it has been conducted during the last 25 years. There is no evidence that the animal is being driven to the wall by any new or un-

(2) The lobster is migratory only to he extent of moving to and from the shore, and is, therefore, practically a sedentary animal. Its movements are governed chiefly by the abundance of food and the temperature of the

The swimming period lasts from six to eight weeks, or until the lobster has molted five or at most six times, and is three-fifths of an inch long, when it sinks to the bottom. It now travels towards the shore, and, if fortunate, establishes itself in the rock piles of inlets of harbors, where it remains until driven out by ice in the fall or early winter. The smallest, now from 1 to inches long, go down among the loose stones which are often exposed at low tides. At a later period, when 3 or 4 inches long they come out of their retreats and explore the bottom, occasionally hiding or burrowing under stones. Young lobsters have also been found in eelgrass and on sandy bottoms in shallow water.

The desire to protect the immature lobster and allow it to breed at least once in its life is certainly commendable. 

### The Last Plank.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, July 28. The Austro-Hungarian Government declared war against Servia to-day by a manifesto which is one of the briefest of the momentous documents in this declaration by announcing her rejection of the British scheme to bring the four Powers together in a conference for mediation. Germany explained to the public that her ally could not be expected to submit her acts to a European Council, as though she were one of the Balkan States. This announcement preceded the declaration of war by only two hours and gave an exhibition of the perfectly harmonious working of the partnership between two nations which stood firmly together through the Bosnia crisis of 1909. ### Germany Would Strike Hard.

BERLIN, July 28. No confirmation had been received up to a late hour this evening either by the German Foreign Office or Rus-sian Embassy of the mobilization of various army corps in Russia, reported in yesterday's despatches to London. German officials declared flatly that German officials declared flatly that any Russian mobilization against Austria, partial or otherwise, meant war. German mobilization orders would then, he said, immediately be issued. When these once had been launched there would be no possibility of recalling them or of Germany resting on her arms while negotiations continued, as the strategic necessities of war of her two frontiers would force Germany to strike immediately hard. The opinion is expressed in well informed Russian circles to-day, however, that a partial mobilization of Russian troops along the Austrian frontier is quite probable as an answer to the Austrian declaration of war on Servia. Servian officials

appeared to think that such a step could be undertaken without evoking a German counter mobilization.





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
