





It was found by the engineer that Lord Northcliffe's company had secured from the Government all the water power privileges on the Exploits River down o within three miles of Bishop Falls, and that in order to erect a dam high enough to develop fifteen thousand horse power at Bishop Falls they required to flow back about seven miles, thus infringing four miles on Lord Northcliffe's rights.






