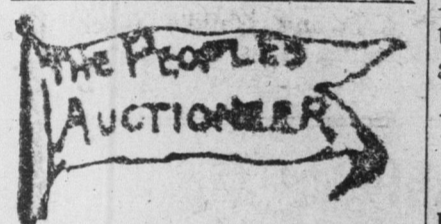

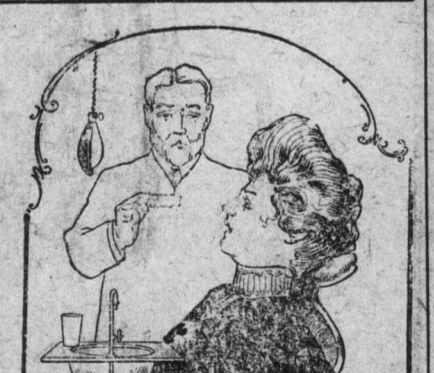

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, Nov. 10. The British destroyer *Louis* is stranded and wrecked in the Eastern Mediterranean. Her officers and crew were saved.

France—Only artillery actions. The Russians have progressed at Orland and in the Dvinsk region, and have carried a strongly fortified post near the Bukovina border. Italy—An enemy attempt to recapture Coddiana was repulsed and further progress made. A strong enemy attack near Gerziza was repulsed. Serbia—Enemy claim further progress.

BONAR LAW.

GENERALS RECALLED.

LONDON, Nov. 10. An official announcement was made today that several British generals had been recalled from the front since the war began. The announcement was made in the House of Commons by Harold J. Tennant, Parliamentary Secretary for War. He said the generals had been recalled for various reasons, but some of them had been allowed to resign or retire, and declined to give information as to the number of Generals recalled.

ANGLO-FRENCH WAR COUNCIL.

LONDON, Nov. 10. A meeting in the Commons to-day, presided over by the Prime Minister, approved the establishment of an Anglo-French War Council, in which French and British would sit. He expressed the hope that Russia would join in the Council.

PREMIER ASQUITH ON FINANCE.

LONDON, Nov. 10. Premier Asquith was to have asked the Commons to-day for a vote of credit of £400,000,000, but some unexpected development prevented him from taking this action, which was postponed until to-morrow. The Premier made his expected statement in regard to the financial situation, and expressed upon the nation the necessity of careful husbanding of its resources. Including the new vote of credit to be asked to-morrow, the Premier pointed out that the total

amount voted for war purposes will be £1,062,000,000. He presented figures showing that the Government has a sufficient sum left over from the previous vote to finance the war to the third week of November. The approximate daily cost of the war between Sept. 12th and Nov. 6th, as given by Asquith, was £4,350,000. It rose to this figure from £2,700,000 in the earlier part of the financial year. Loans advanced by Britain to her Allies and the Dominions between April 1st and November 6th, he said, amounted to £38,000,000. In the same period £23,000,000 was expended for food supplies and miscellaneous items. The main causes of the increases in the cost of war, he continued, were great expenditures for munitions and advances to Britain's Allies and the Dominions. He could hold out no hope that there was any immediate likelihood of a decrease in these two items. In response to a question regarding the effect of the No-Treating Order, Lloyd George said there had been a marked decrease in the number of convictions for drunkenness in the metropolitan district in the first three weeks after the order took effect, as compared with the previous four weeks. Police reports show that drunkenness among women has decreased, and virtually no violations of the order have been reported.

GERMAN ATTACKS REPULSED.

PARIS, Nov. 10. A German attack near the forest of Givenchy was easily repulsed by French troops, according to an announcement made this afternoon by the French War Office. At the same time French batteries in Champagne district, near Tahure, responded with energy to a German artillery attack.

BULGARIA AND GERMANY.

LONDON, Nov. 10. A telegram from Athens says that the Greek Government organ, *Kairos*, to-day publishes the outline of an agreement said to have just been concluded between Bulgaria and Germany, relating to the Balkans, which the newspaper alleges it has received from a diplomatic source. According to the agreement Bulgaria will not advance beyond the Dorian-Cuevsi line, in southeastern Serbia, nor enter Monastir in southwestern Serbia, in order to avoid giving offence to Greece. Bulgaria also agrees to demobilize immediately her campaign in Serbia, is concluded. It is stated that, if necessary, the Germans will operate alone in the region of Monastir.

VELES RECAPTURED.

LONDON, Nov. 10. French forces have recaptured the town of Veles in Southern Serbia.

from the Bulgarians, according to advices received by the Serbian Legation in Athens.

A RUMOR.

LONDON, Nov. 10. The statement is made by the correspondent in Amsterdam of the *Central News*, that the Kings of Roumania, Greece and Bulgaria, have made arrangements to meet at Bucharest. There is no confirmation of this report.

SERBIA AND BULGARIA.

LONDON, Nov. 10. A statement, recently attributed to a member of the Serbian cabinet, that Serbia had asked the Entente Powers in vain for permission to attack Bulgaria before the Bulgarian mobilization was complete, was followed by a question on this subject in the Commons to-day. The reply disclosed that apparently the attitude of the Allies was one of discouragement of the proposal, but that there was no actual refusal of permission for the attack. Answering the question, Lord Robert Cecil said, on behalf of the Foreign Office, that Serbia had pressed this view as the right military policy. The Foreign Office would like to point out that the figures of immigration from Ireland were much below the average. RED CROSS APPEAL.

LONDON, Nov. 10. An appeal for truces to allow burial of the dead and to acquaint relatives of the fallen, with their names, is being made to the rulers of the warring powers by the International Red Cross. The most elementary feeling of pity, it says, demand all useful measures to acquaint their families with the fate of the fallen. The appeal asks that positive instructions be sent to military commanders with a view to the mitigation of needless aggravation of the sufferings of war.

THREE HUNDRED PERSONS WERE DROWNED.

LONDON, Nov. 10. A despatch to Lloyds from Bizertia says that three hundred persons on the *Arizona* were drowned. Most of the lost, the message says, were women and children immigrants. One

hundred and thirty survivors thus far have reached Bizertia.

BRITISH STEAMER SUNK.

LONDON, Nov. 10. The British steamer *Clan Macallister*, has been sunk. She was 4,835 tons gross.

WILL APPLY TO THE WHOLE KINGDOM.

LONDON, Nov. 10. Home Secretary John A. Simon was asked in the Commons to-day what were the respective number of Welshmen, Englishmen and Irishmen, who were prevented from sailing from Liverpool for New York on the *Saxonia* last week, on the ground that they were attempting to evade liability to military service. He was asked also whether American steamships, which are to sail for the United States within the next three weeks are booked to capacity, and whether the Home Office would prevent all men of military age from leaving the country. The Secretary responded that action had already been taken provisionally to deal with the matter, and that he hoped to make a complete statement on this subject within a day or two. Sir John added that he would like to point out that the figures of immigration from Ireland were much below the average. FRENCH LINER TORPEDOED.

ROME, Nov. 10. A German submarine has sunk the French liner *France*, according to a despatch from Cagliari to the *Globe* this morning. The attack occurred on Sunday morning. The crew were saved and landed at Cagliari.

AMERICANS ON THE ANCONA.

LONDON, Nov. 10. The first list available of the passengers on the *Ancona*, contains the names of twenty-five Americans, according to a despatch to the *Exchange* from Rome. One American woman is among the survivors, it is stated.

ANOTHER BRITISHER SUNK.

LONDON, Nov. 10. The British steamer *Callifornian* has been sunk. The *Callifornian* was a Leyland steamer of 6,223 tons gross register, 447 feet long, 53 feet beam, 30 feet deep, and built at Dundee in 1902. Many months ago she was taken over by the British Government. The *Callifornian* figured prominently in the story of the Titanic disaster, having been near the scene of the wreck, but not having gone to the rescue. Lord Mersey is presenting the judgment of the British Board of Trade in the Court of Inquiry into

the Titanic disaster, mentioned the *Callifornian* as having seen the Titanic signals at a distance of eight or ten miles, and declared she could have reached the sinking liner without serious risk and have saved many lives. The *Callifornian's* master, in a subsequent statement, declared that the signals from the Titanic had not been recognized by the officer in charge as distress signals.

Recovering.

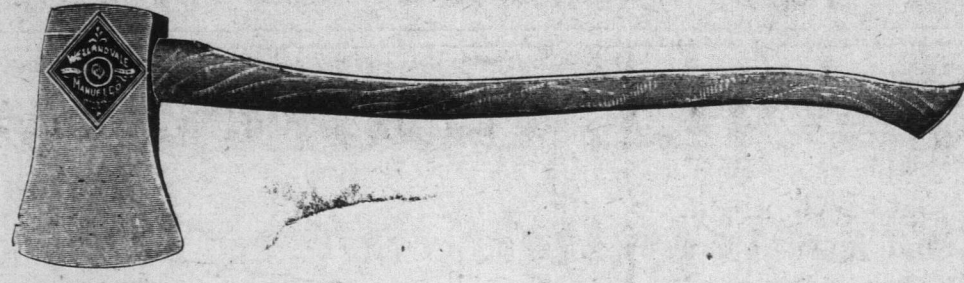

Another Outrage On America.

The torpedoing of the Italian steamer Ancona in the Mediterranean by the Germans, adds one more crime to their black list of sea horrors. The names of the passengers murdered on this passenger steamer must now be added to those murdered on the Lusitania, Arabic and Hesperian. It will be remembered that the German denial that the latter was torpedoed has been disproved by the American naval experts who examined the metal of the engine which destroyed the Hesperian and satisfied themselves that they were pieces of a torpedo. These crimes are even more infamous than those committed in the Mediterranean centuries ago by the Barbary pirates under the Barbarossas, which earned for them the detestation of the civilized world and the unenviable description of the Sea Wolves of the Mediterranean. Among the victims of the Ancona there appear to have been a number of Americans. Last night's despatch states that the passenger list contains the names of twenty-five Americans. One American woman is stated to be among the survivors. One begins to wonder how long the patience of America will hold out. Last February President Wilson warned the Kaiser that the American Government would hold the German Government to "strict accountability," should American lives or property be lost in this nefarious warfare on passenger steamers. The loss of American lives in the Lusitania and Arabic was followed by long and futile correspondence, as the undertaking of Germany not to murder those aboard passenger steamers was immediately followed by the torpedoing of the Hesperian, and now has been capped by the shelling and torpedoing of the Ancona and the loss of many lives and apparently of a score or more of American lives. It is clear that German promises and undertakings are worthless, and the wonder is how long America will resist satisfied with words of protestation.

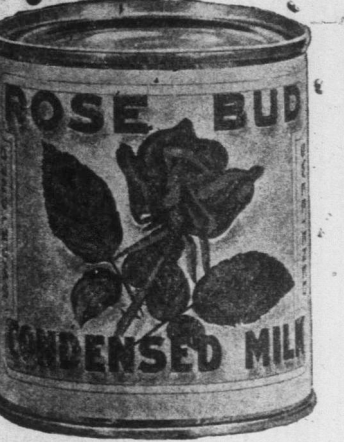

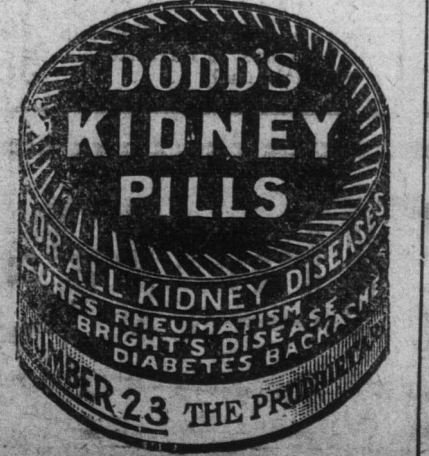

NOON.

ITALIAN OFFENSIVE FAILS.
BERLIN, To-day.
The third Italian offensive in the Isonzo district can be considered as having definitely failed, says a Cologne correspondent at the Austro-Hungarian headquarters, as quoted by the Overseas News Agency, since only feeble attempts to advance are still being made by the Italians. During this last struggle the Italians suffered immense losses besides having lost 5,367 men wounded and prisoners.

THE WAR STAFF.
LONDON, To-day.
Premier Asquith said the War Office had taken steps to secure a more effective and co-ordinate prosecution of the war on the part of the Allied Powers by strengthening the British General Staff and to establish a more intimate intercommunication, not sporadic but normal and habitual between military and naval advisers of all the Allied Powers. His own views had been strengthened by what he had seen during his two visits to the front as to the importance of interchanging officers between the War Office and the army in the field, so that all might have experience in trench fighting and all novel operations this war had introduced. Sir Archibald James Murray, head of the General Staff is about to appoint as his assistant General Mitchell, and the Premier said he was satisfied that the staff now at the War Office, which was far more numerous than the public was aware was composed of very able and distinguished officers, no less than twenty-six of whom had had actual experience in the present war. With regard to the relations between the British staff and those of the other Allies, it would be a great mistake, he said, to suppose they had been living in watertight compartments without communicating with one another. There was a British military attaché at the French headquarters and a distinguished French officer in attendance at the War Office in London. Arrangements had been made for a more intimate co-operation and for interchange of views for the common development of plans for all military operations in the different theatres of war. A distinguished French staff officer, the Premier stated, will be in daily communication with the general staff at the British War Office, and Britain is sending to France officers entrusted with a like mission. It is more than possible, he added, that this organization may still further develop.

FIVE MILLION A DAY.
LONDON, To-day.
Asquith said there was no reason to believe the expenditures during the next two months would exceed five million pounds daily, so that the new vote of credit might be expected to last till the middle of February.

"WAKE UP, WASHINGTON!"
NEW YORK, To-day.
Commenting editorially on the sinking of the Ancona, the Herald under the caption "Wake up, Washington!" says the Ancona infamy is but one in a grand scheme. Germany assumes that this Government can be kept asleep. Why not? The Lusitania is forgotten and fled away in Mr. Lansing's pigeon holes, and yet a doubt arises. True, the Zealandia, which is suspected of having on board German officers who broke parole at Norfolk, was not searched by the United States navy, which should long ago have been after this suspected ship. True, the Lusitania is forgotten, and equally true that Captain Boyd and Captain Von Papen still insult this country with their presence, but the Government shall be given the benefit of the doubt. Something may happen to wake it up yet.

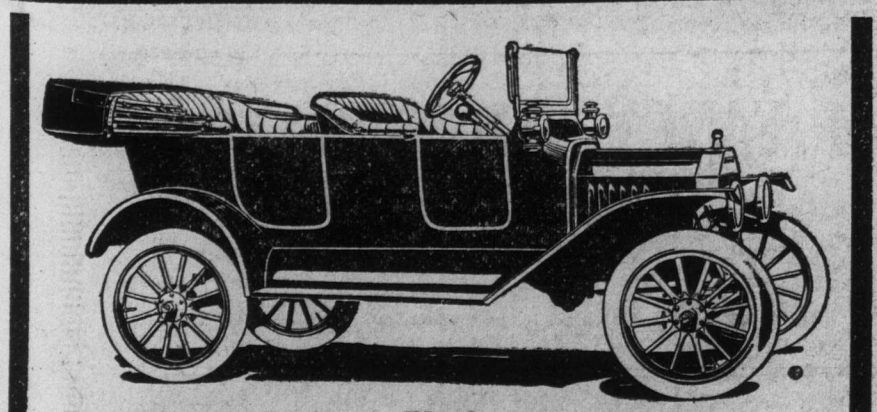

The Story of the Exploits.

How Harry J. Crowe Handled a Property on Which More than Ten Million Dollars Cash in the Erection of Pulp, Paper Plants and Railways, Besides Several Million More in Labor for Operating has Subsequently been Expended.

These transactions have played such an important part in the history and development of Newfoundland, that we have asked Mr. Crowe to give us some of his experiences in this part of the Colony where his labors have been so extensive and so successful. He writes as follows:

"The Exploits Valley in Newfoundland through which the largest river of the island flows, draining in its course several thousand miles of heavily timbered land with immense water powers that have been largely developed as a result of Lord Northcliffe's magnificent pioneer work, has contributed to the island a chapter of most interesting history. This history dates from the time when the British blue-jackets went up the Valley to subdue the Red Indians. In their undertaking many of these sailors lost their lives by being scalped on the ice of Red Indian Lake at the head of the Exploits River."

"Many owners have possessed different portions of this property. The first of these were Messrs. Windsor and Vallance and other inhabitants of the Island who erected a small saw mill at Dominion Point on Exploits Bay. Then came lumbermen from Quebec who formed what was known as the French Company, which Archdeacon Botwood was interested. It was from the Archdeacon that Lord Northcliffe's town and shipping port was named."

"A large saw mill was constructed by the French Company at Botwood but after operating for several years at a serious loss they sold to an English Company who continued logging and manufacturing operations for some time, cutting mostly large white pine logs into three-inch deal which was shipped to the English market. This English Company sold out to a company composed of men in Amherst, Nova Scotia, who reconstructed the mill and continued operating until eventually they turned it over to a Boston Company which carried on the work for several years at a considerable loss. In fact all these lumber companies lost heavily in their operations due largely to the difficulty of driving and holding logs on the Exploits River which was very rapid previous to the erection of the present dams. On this account very little timber was cut on the major portion of the property, and all the pulpwood rafted."

"When the Boston Company after making many unsuccessful attempts to sell their property in both America and Europe, was unable to do so, they further operations, the Amherst Company who held a large mortgage began to fear they should not realize their money and the future prospects of Botwood and the development of the Exploits looked dismal."

"At this time I took an option on the property, believing it to be possessed of all the economic conditions for the successful manufacture of pulp and paper."

"Before referring to the circumstances that enabled me to acquire and head this Boston Company's Exploits property, I should like to touch on the transaction relating to the upper portion of the Exploits Valley which I was successful in securing. Lord Northcliffe's Company a short time previous to my negotiations with the Boston Company."

THE HARMSWORTH DEAL.

"As a result of the great difficulty in getting his supply of paper during the Boer War, Sir Alfred Harmsworth determined upon securing a forest from which he could manufacture his own paper and thus be independent of paper manufacturers. After three years, during which he examined various properties in Norway, Sweden and other countries without finding what he needed, Sir Cavendish Boyle, Governor of Newfoundland, mutual friend of his and of his representative Mr. M. M. Beeton, invited the latter to look into the resources of the Island with a view to securing a property where he might carry out his proposed pulp and paper proposition."

"Mr. Beeton immediately went to Newfoundland and began an examination of some extensive timber limits and there were high hopes entertained of the greatest publishers in the world selecting Newfoundland as the place in which to build their pulp and paper mills. The Government was sympathetic and did all in their power to induce the Harmsworths to locate in the Island, but for various reasons the project was given up at that time and the purpose of establishing a plant in Newfoundland was abandoned by the Harmsworths."

"I was then operating the following properties—Gambo, Gander Bay, Glenwood, Norris Arm, Notre Dame, Indian Arm and Millerton. We assembled our lumber at Lewisport for shipment, while we enlarged our operations on each of these properties, cutting over twenty-five million feet of lumber per annum and establishing a market in South America for our lumber which increased in value over twenty-five per cent. on any previous exports from the Island. Owing to the fact that our lands were so largely covered with pulpwood as to interfere with profitable logging, and for other economic reasons, I was very anxious to sell at least a portion of the property for the manufacturing of pulp and paper. I preferred to do this rather than continue the exclusive production of lumber at a loss."

"Learning that the Harmsworths had given up the idea of purchasing the West Coast property they had been investigating, I decided to go to London and endeavor to interest them in the upper portion of the Exploits Valley. All my associates, and those in authority in the Island, thought it would be impossible to induce the Harmsworths to return to Newfoundland, and I was obliged for the time

to give up the attempt. But very shortly after this I started for London and on my arrival met the late Lewis Miller from whom I had purchased two years previously for the Timber Estates Company his Miller-town and Glenwood properties. He was much interested in the success of our Company, and was anxious to see the Harmsworths established in Newfoundland, but he informed me by conversation and letter not to approach them as they felt very keenly on the matter and would not entertain any Newfoundland proposition. This was subsequently confirmed by Mr. Beeton with whom I discussed the question of interesting the Harmsworths in the Exploits Valley. My conversation with him and the correspondence that followed made it clear that his company would not entertain any proposal to operate on our property or anywhere else in the Island. He further stated that they had abandoned the idea of making their own paper and were then about closing contracts for a long period with manufacturers in Norway and Sweden for their future supply."

"It seemed hopeless to try to turn their attention towards Newfoundland but after several interviews they consented to entertain a proposal I had made to them, to buy paper from a company I would form to develop the property I was then offering them. The terms and conditions of a contract for one hundred and fifty tons of paper per day were discussed."

"I shall not dwell upon my various negotiations that followed with these publishers, but simply state that before I left London within thirty days from the time I first approached these English newspaper proprietors, I secured an agreement signed by Sir Alfred Harmsworth and Harold Harmsworth, under the seal of the Amalgamated Press with a deposit of one thousand pounds for the purchase of the property belonging to the Timber Estates Company in the Exploits Valley. This is the property they are now operating so extensively and in which they have invested over seven million dollars."

"So sceptical were my friends in Newfoundland of my success, that a week previous to the signing of this agreement, one of my associates called on me and wanted to know the negotiations but to confine my efforts to the object of my visit to London, namely the opening of a market for our large paper in South America."

"I was much gratified with the success of this large undertaking, although I may say that personally I never sat in a sitting room either directly or indirectly out of this large transaction with the Harmsworths, or in fact out of any of the properties I had previously handled or operated on the island."

"I desired to sell the Gander property of the Timber Estates, but in order to make the proposition more sound and permanent as well as to enlarge the undertaking, I secured an option from the owners of the lower portion of the Exploits Valley, including Bishop Falls, which I believed a good water power could be developed at Bishop Falls on the Exploits River which was about ten miles from Botwood, an excellent shipping port."

"Armed with full power to sell the Gander and Exploits properties, I went to London a second time. After a year and a half of strenuous negotiations, the particulars of which would fill volumes of more or less sensational matter, I succeeded in organizing the British-Newfoundland Syndicate, with a paid-up capital of nine hundred thousand pounds. This Syndicate was composed of Coates Son and Company (large London Bankers), C. J. Arthur, Pearson & well-known newspaper and magazine publisher, Albert E. Reed, then the largest high grade paper manufacturer in England who afterwards became Chairman of the Syndicate, Sir William Ingram of The Illustrated London News, Sir John Barker, Sir Thos. Bovering, Altek Harvey, Alexander Henderson and others. The Company was incorporated and sixty thousand dollars put up for examination purposes. Experts were engaged to investigate the property, one of the large banks in Canada assisting in the selection of the cruisers, and Albert E. Reed and Mr. Alexander Henderson were appointed by the Syndicate to visit Newfoundland and look over the situation."

"The report of the cruisers showed nearly three times the quantity of timber I had represented as being on the property, and the water power examined by George F. Hardy, the engineer Lord Northcliffe employed on his property, was quite up to the expectations of the Syndicate. Everything seemed satisfactory and it looked as if another large pulp and paper company would soon be operating on the Island, establishing plants at both Glenwood and Bishop Falls."

"But a bolt came out of the blue sky, one of the many that had fallen on me in connection with the formation of this Syndicate. It was found by the engineer that Lord Northcliffe's company had secured from the Government all the water power privileges on the Exploits River down to within three miles of Bishop Falls, and that in order to erect a dam high enough to develop fifteen thousand horse power at Bishop Falls they required to flow back about seven miles, thus infringing four miles on Lord Northcliffe's rights."

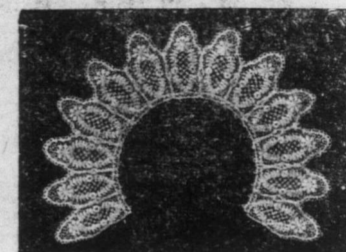

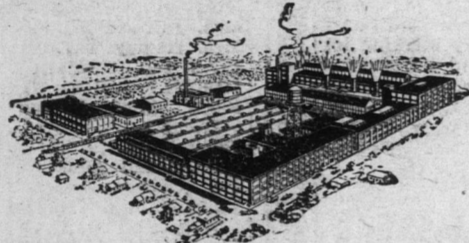

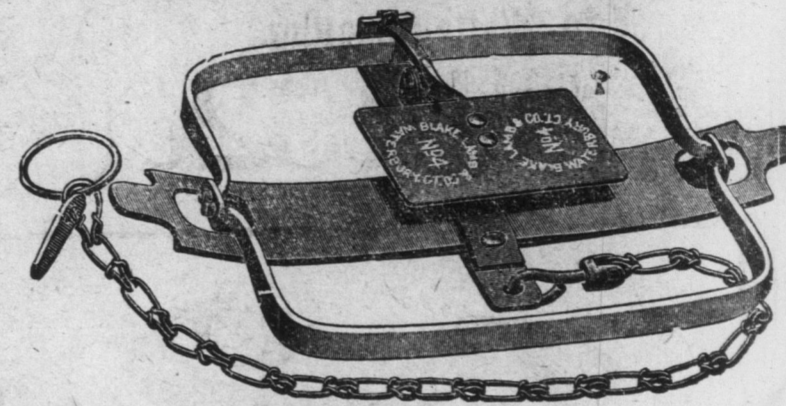
