

The number of armed merchant ships had been increased 47 per cent during the last two months. This was compared with the losses of 69 vessels of 201,000 tons during the first eighteen days off December, and first eighteen days of January. Up to the end of October, also, added Sir Edward, the naval forces had moved more than 9,000,000 tons of explosives and other material, 1,000,000 sick and wounded, more than one million horses and mules and more than 4,000,000 gallons of petrol. They had examined on the high seas or in harbors 15,150 ships. In January last alone in British ports they had examined. 1,754 ships. The total for February would not be less than that. For January the navy's figures, Sir Edward stated, escaped after submarine attack, while only 24 per cent. of unarmed vessels escaped. While not giving the number of submarines destroyed, Sir Edward said, he had a record of forty encounters with them during the last eighteen days.
