I went to the window and saw a pile of stuff on the road, and went out and by the aid of lighted matches I discovered it was a man. He was badly battered and bleeding, while his jaw was crushed in. He was near the centre of the street. There was an umbrella, opened, lying on the street. I saw no sign of the motor car. I did not know the body, although I saw he was old. I stayed for a few seconds, and went in for help, and then came out and carried the man from the street to the side of the house, and then 'phoned the police station. I saw a motor car with a man running towards it near Victoria Street. (This was while I was looking at the body, for I saw no man when I came out of the door). He was 10 or 12 feet from the car when I saw him. He boarded the car. I saw no one else. The car then started and went east. I heard no re-mark made. I could not identify the man, although he had an overcoat on,

On that night I left home after 7 o'clock, went to Snow's residence, and I left Snow's house at 8.30 or thereabouts, and got in the car with Mr. W. Snow. Two of us were in the car, and we came down Water Street and Feaver's Lane (blowing the horn all the time at intervals). I put my head out on one side and saw the glimmer of an umbrella.
