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



## No Ivory Famine

The elephant is a very useful animal, both for draft purposes and for ivory. A few years ago 70,000 were slaughtered annually for their tusks, so that it seemed as though there was a good chance of the big animals becoming extinct, says the Washington "Post" Wise laws, however, have checked the destruction so that the number is increasing. The war gave the elephants their chance and the British authorities in East Africa have also protected them. South of Zambesi the elephant is virtually extinct, and the Cape market for ivory has ceased to exist. At present Mozambique is the center of the ivory trade. Oddly enough, the Portuguese, through whose hands it comes, send nearly all the ivory across to Bombay, where it is sorted and out and dispatched to the European markets. The world's supply of real elephant ivory is now about 250 tons a year.

### Lady Balfour Finds Little to Commend

LONDON-(A. P.)-Young women f to-day are much inferior to the old ashioned girl in point of morals, intelligence, romance, and knowledge of the great affairs of life, said Lady Frances Balfour, daughter of the Duke of Argyll, in a recent lecture before the London School of Economics. The face of a modern girl is a mass of powder," the speaker declared. 'Her lips are painted until no longer ecognizable, and the reek of her person makes one long for the outdoors." In the past, Lady Balfour continued oung women doubtless led considerably more sheltered lives. There was tween ignorance and innocence, but life has more romantic possibilities. The girls of that period knew less of men and thought of them as paragons of virtue and unselfishness. Men, she went on, were better in consenquence of this than they are today. "It is good to be believed in, especially by men. The girls in former times were held to be entirely irresponsible, and it didn't matter how they spent their time so long as they amused men."





### Inventor Claims Superior Tone

FOR IMPROVED VIOLIN.

ed fiddler, who prided himself on the age of his instrument and its tone, will stand in the background hereafter if only a few of the claims of the inventor of a new form of violin are recognized by the musical world in its everlasting mood of expectancy for thrills. Modern science has been applied to the art of violin making, it is contended, and under the new method the newer the violin the better the tone and harmony. Greater volume, strength, purity and sensibility are promised for the up to date violin of which the inventor is Dr. Franz Thomastik, an Austrian

The problem which Dr. Thomastik asserts he has overcome was to make the body of his violin really resound to its full capacity. The body of the instrument, as in all violins, is intended to act as a resonance chamber.

The inventor and those critics who have heard the new tones, claim that the development of the resound to its full power has been obtained by connecting one of the feet of the bridge with the belly, and carrying the other through a pier which rests on the back. In this way both the belly and the back are brought into vibration, and the volume of the air enclosed in the resounding chamber is animated, giving a much better tone in every

STILL DREAMS OF RUSSIA RE-

TOKIO, March 14-(A.P.)-Ataman eminoff, leader of Cossacks and heir to Admiral Kolchak's illusory title as the Russian people." Just when he does not know. At present, he admits, the time is not ripe. But he 'preparations" go forward.

Seminoff has just left Tokio after a two week's visit in the Japanese capican government and failed to find

the correspondent, was entirely private. He was visiting old friends and was seeing to some financial inter-He called on no Japanese officials he said, and the Japanese say the same. There is little reason to doubt either statement, as Seminoff's star is set in Japan, where recognition of the Soviet government now is the liveliest issue in foreign politics.

Reports which Seminoff says have reached him from White agents in Russia have encouraged him to think that the Red hold on Asiatic Russia, at least, is weakening. In the Amur province, with Blagoveschensk as a center, the Soviet's imposition of grain taxes in kind has led the peasants to encourage White partisan bands which have gained minor and temporary successes against the Red garrisons. At several points along the Trans-Siberian railway, according to Seminoff, discontent is taking on the proportions of considerable risings against Red rule.




