How Camphor is Made

As a perfume, camphor has been known and valued by the people of China and Japan for centuries. Originally obtained from gum deposits ocionally found in old camphor trees, it is now extracted from the wood itself, which, after been sawn through lengthwise, is reduced to chips and heated in a still.

The vapour given off in this way passes through bamboo pipes into a cooling chamber, where it condenses in crystal form, known as "flowers." These crystals are collected and exported to Europe, where they are fur ther purified by being mixed with lime and charcoal and refined in special retorts. The oil thus obtained should not be confused with campho oil, which consists of camphor olved in olive oil.
