

Relics in Oklahoma of Mound Builders

Secrets of the prehistoric race mound builders, whose culture is declared to be distinct from that of any other type hitherto investigated in Oklahoma, wil be 'plumbed' by an archeological expedition to Grove, Delaware County.

The contents of the mound can only

be conjectured, but an indication of what might be found in the cave was given in the discovery of remnants of prehistoric life in an outer chamber that has been explored. The mouth of the cave apparently was sealed after its abandonment many centuries ago. It was reopened and a large deposit of wood ashes, charcoal, bones of game animals, mussel shells and other kitchen refuse was found on the floor near the entrance. An extensive collection of bone and flint implements also was discovered, together with many fragments of pottery.


War on Weeds

During recent years many attempts ave been made to find a means of estroying certain weeds that are injurious to crops. Charlock, one of the commonest weeds in Great Brit-ain, is particularly troublesome to farmers, for where it is rampant there is rarely a good crop of corn.

Now, however, it can be destroye by means of spraying. A spray made from finely powdered kainite has een found satisfactory, although the most successful as well as the cheapest means of destroying charlock is a solution of copper sulphate, with 28 lb. to 35 lb. of nitrate of soda or sulphate of ammonia added to each arrel of the spraying mixture.

The British Workers' Handicap

By the RT. HON. I. H. THOMAS, M.P. When we see a man starting a race

fifty or a hundred yards behind his nearest rival we are generally justified in concluding that he is the best runner, that that, in spite of his severe handicap, his quality wil probably enable him to win the race. Most of us have seen such a man gradually wear down the field and breast the tape

Nevertheless, I must say that I have always thought that deliberate handicapping was a bit unfair. Personaly, I like to watch a race where all the competitors start level. After all, if anyone deserves to win, it is surely the man who is physically the fittest, who is the best trained, who has spent most thought upon his condition, and used to the best advantage the qualities of self-denial and self-discipline.

The victory of the inferior man, by reason of the others severe handicap, only tends to put a premium upon mediocrity, to make tinsel look like gold, to lower the standards of efficiency and of all achievement. Therefore, I say, let us all start level, and let the best man win. It is fair to him, and it is good for those who, by his example, are keyed up to their highest and best in competing with him.

But no one can claim that this condition obtains in the world field of Labour, which, in many of its aspects, may be compared to a race, or to any other competition depending upon skill, energy, intelligence, training. management. The handicap has been the rule, as far as Britain is concerned and not the exception. Generally speaking, it would be true to say that the British workman has been the "scratch man" of the world.

At the same time, anyone talking, even immediately before the War. about the standardisation of worldconditions of labour, especially as regards hours of work and rates of wages, the bringing of these and other conditions to a parity in all countries, would have been regarded, not so much as a dreamer and a visionary, but as a candidate for Colney Hatch, or any other lunatic asylum.

Such a consummation, though "devoutly to be wished," has always appeared a very remote one even to the most optimistic. Naturally it has been the great argument for what is salled Tariff Reform; a device which has represented itself, to many minds. as the only effective way of bringing the other racers back to "scratch," or, preferably, perhaps, putting the poor "scratch" man-Britain, by name-either level with, or, if possible, well in front of all the rest of the competi-

What may be regarded as the present Government's first front-rank easure is the revisal and revival what is styled Safeguarding of Indus tries. It is supported by the Government as a move in the direction of reducing our handicap disadvantage, at least, and of totally abolishing it if possible, whilst the ostensible reason for its reintroduction and application is the difficulty caused by the fluctuations and dislocations of the world's exchange.

That this factor in the world situation is a real difficulty no one will deny. But a much deeper cause than this depreciated value of the currency of many countries, the real cause, and a more persistent cause which, in the minds of those who look for a sedative and not a cure for alleviation and not abliteration makes necessary some measure of this kind is the fact that other nationals work longer for less money than our own, and thus get a start nor only in the world's markets but actually in our own, which we cannot run as we may, hope to overhaul This is a brief but fair statement of the Government case, which opinion, I need hardly say, I do not share.

But whether we agree with the remedy or not, we must admit the condition of the patient. It is pretty ser ious. Its main symptom is unemployment. The British workman, in my opinion, has not his superior in any other country. It has not been chance, or luck, which has made this little country-a mere speck on the map of the world, rather hard to find unless you know where to look-the workshop of the world. The British workman has performed this miracle by dint of skill, industry, and intelligence, and, as long as he maintains these prime factors in his make-up, success vill not be indefinitely delayed. It will only be his failure to keep his level, both of output and quality, as high, at least, as that of his compattors, which will spell catestrophe to the industry, the commerce,

and the well-being of this country. Nevertheless, at present, the handicap remains, and it is not by any means an entirely new condition of things. In the old controversy, in pre-War days, between Free Trade and Tariff Reform, this fact was strongly urged, and the workers were used as pawns against the workers of other countries. The contestants, in fact, were so taken up with assertions and refutations, arguments and counterarguments, so obsessed with their verbal warfare, that they were totally blind to the fact that the flerce competition, the keen rivalry, which regarded the worker, as I have said. merely as a pawn in the great game,



so convinced were the best the most far-seeing men, of the ruth of this, that, among many failures and blots which vitiate the Peace Treaty as a means of peace, they suc ceeded in inserting in the Versailles Freaty at least one little patch of dom-a rainbow of promise spang a sky which the Treaty itself had left rather dark and gloomy. My friend, Mr. George Barnes, in 1919, during that prolonged conference, delivered an epoch-making speech, from which I will make an abbreviated extract here:

"In normal days, before the War, labour conditions were largely the result of blind chance. Age and want too often haunted the mind of the worker during his working life, and we must remember that the worker to-day still lives very largely in pre-War memories: he dreads return, and is determined not to return to those ore-war conditions.

"These conditions have laid upon he world a heavy burden and a great danger. They have produced a workman who is class centred, who regards work as a blessing, and has been deluded into the belief that the less work he does the more is left for his workmates. That feeling, and the practice based upon it, is demoralizing to the individual and harmful to the community. It can be eradicated only by security against unemployment and by improved conditions of employment. . . The conditions existing are a source of concern to all lovers of their kind, and a menace to he peace of the world.

"It is that latter aspect of it that makes regulation, labour improvement, an integral and urgent part of the work of a Peace Conference. International co-operation has hitherto been fitful and sectional. . . . We are seeking now, for the first time in history, to get the willing co-operation of all concerned-States, - employers, and workmen-engaged in a common task and animated by a common desire to improve the workman's

conditions in all countries." I have quoted Mr. Barnes because the matter cannot be better put, and the result was that an agreement was embodied in the League of Nations charter which opens with the following memorable preamble:

"Whereas the League of Nations has for its object the establishment of universal peace, and such peace can be established only if it is based upon social justice; and whereas conditions of labour exist involving such inustice, hardship, and privation to large numbers of people as to produce unrest so great that the peace and harmony of the world are imperilled; as, for example, by the regulation of the hours of work, including the establishnent of a maximum working day and week, the regulation of the labour supply, the prevention of unemployment, the provision of an adequate living wage, the protection of the worker against sickness, disease, and injury arising out of his employment, the protection of children, young persons and women, provisions for old age and injury, protection of the interests of workers when employed in countries other than their own, recognition of the principle of freedom of association, the organization of vocational and technical education and other measures; Whereas also the failure of any nation to adopt humane conditions of labour is an obstacle in the way of other nations, which desire to improve the conditions in their own countries: The High Contracting and other details are classified under Parties moved by sentiments of justice and humanity, as well as by the cluding desire to secure the permanent peace



Famous Race of '75.

St. John's Joiners, Defeat English Cap-tains, Spaniards And Crew Of

St. John's Senmen

Editor Evening Telegram Dear Mr. But few residents of St. John's are with us now who witnessed the races of 1875, when the Joiners, a hardy, sturdy and stalwart crew, were the successful contestants, in the Mary, in the Tradesmen's Race, agains the following named boats and crews:-Volunteer, Ships' Car penters; Lady Hill, Sailmakers; Native, Coopers; Heather Belle, Blacksmiths. The description of their feat, given by the press following Regatta Day, reads thus: - "Their performance asionished everyone. They redeemed the honor of their boat, the Mary, by winning from the word "go," and in the all-comers race, after having previously rowed two races, they covered themselves with laurels, by making the quickest time of any crew for the day." I ought to add, Mr. Editor, that their prowess in the above race, won for them the bonus money, of ten dollars, for having made the quickest time. Today for the first time I made the acquaintance of Mr. Albert Osmond, one of the crew of the Mary, and from him I obtained the names of the other rowers. Mr. Osmond is the father-in-law of my friend, Mr. John "Long, the well-known printer of St. John's. The names given to me, by Mr. Osmend, are as follows:-George Horder, brother of the late fourder and Proprietor of the "Evening Telegram"; Thomas Nicholis, who died not long ago, in this City; William Strathie and Thomas Brown, both of Bonavista district, and William Stowe, of Hr. Grace. The names of the boats which opposed the Mary, and their crews, in the All Comers Race, were as follows: Heather Belle, rowed by a crew of English Captains, whose names, the names of the vessels as well, I give you: Capt. Hatswell. Waft; Capt. Dyer, Isabella; Capt. Dyer, "Pride of the Isles"; Capt. Beal, Goonlaze, Capt. Searle, Hilday; Nicholas Ball, Beatrice; Capi. Scoople, Ethel; the last named was coxswain. A Spanish crew rowed the Lady Hill, with a Spaniard, Coxswain. A crew of St. John's seamen, rowed the Native, with a native coxswain. For many years afterwards the splendid oarsmanship, the grit, and endurance of the crew of the Mary was talked about, Now and again I have come across some time-worn citizen who had spoken to me of the Regatta when the Joiners of "Monroe's Mary," performed the splendid feat in rowing, recorded above. With thanks, Mr. Editor, for the latitude you have given me, in permitting me so much space in your valuable and interesting journal.







BUSINESS MEETING.

The ninth half yearly meeting of the Grand Falls Co-Operative Society, Limited, was held in the Catholic School on Tuesday, the 4th inst. The Chairman, Mr. Raines, in giving a hearty welcome to all the members present, made a special reference to the large number of ladies present and which, in his opinion, augurs well for the future of our Society. Reviewing the half year's operations he stated that we had again beaten all previous records, the sales showing an increase of 33.7 per cent. He assured the meeting that it was a source of great satisfaction to the Executive to be in a position to record an advance and to assure the members that the Society was more firmly established than over and that if the menibers would only increase their share capital, a much better state of affairs would exist and our progress would ecome much more rapid.

During the half year under review we had made several additions to the premises, which added considerably to the business efficiency. The dry goods department in particular was one in which they felt proud and it was anticipated that the members would increase their loyalty in this department to a marked extent during the present period. The sales for the half year amounted to \$105,947.47, as against \$79,203.94 for the corresponding period of 1924, an increase of \$26,743.53. The share and loan deposits for the half year amounted to \$9,451.65, while withdrawals totalled \$2,918.05, an increase of \$6,533.60.

Membership at the beginning of the period numbered 467, since when 71 have been admitted and 25 have withdrawn, leaving the present number 513. The balance sheet was taken in detail and after various items had been explained, the Auditors' Report was read by Mr. Morgan. The latter testified to the manner in which the auditors found the books and to the correctness of the accounts submitted, after which the balance sheet was put before the meeting and carried unanimously. The net trading surplus for the half year amounted to \$7,652.50. The Executive recommended a return of 7 per cent. on purchases for the period, which was accepted by the members and carried by acclamation. The election of officers resulted in the two retiring members being re-elected, together with William Janes, Samuel Lane, Walter Fewer and William Cobb.




