Mr. Joshua Kribs contributes a fine old Art. Joshua Kribs contributes a inte oil painting illustrative of a scene in the life of Christ, besides a stone thimble which was once the property of some of the Cape Croker Indians. Steers and heifers, two or three years old, made up the bulk of the animals, although there were as usual quite a large number of yokes of working cattle, and as usual they were held at a high figure. The horses were worth notice this time, which they seldom are. It is well known of what class the animals of this species that are are offered for sale here-generally are, but we noticed on the ground at this fair several horses that would be not disgrace to any farmer's stable. We did not learn of any business having been done in this line.

Such beef as found a sale went low, some not bringing more than \$2.50 live weight, and the best that was offered going for no more than \$4.25. Working oxen appear to be always in demand, and always bring a high figure. The following are the sales we heard of as having been effected: Wm Smith sold four steers at \$4.25 per cwt. and two for \$60. Wm Patterson sold two steers for \$36. The Messrs. Millar bought twelve head at an average of \$35; Wm Aitchison bought three brought all the way from Paisley for \$100, three oxen from Robt. Strachan, in of Guelph township, at \$2.37\frac{1}{2} per cwt., and 23 head, which cost him the sum of \$605; John Wallace, of Waterloo township, bought a yoke of oxen from \$120, and Mr. Landreth, of Dumfries, a yoke at the same price: Mr. Duffy, of Hamilton, bought 17 head at \$28 a-piece; Robert Walker, of Erin, sold 3 heifers for \$32. and John Jephson, of Eramosa, sold a 4 year old heifer for \$32. John West bought 2 steers for \$35. Donald Henderwon, of Everton, sold three steers, three years old, at \$24 ach. The Fenian Alarm in Britain nsiderable excitement was created erwick on Oct. 4th and 5th by Considerable excitement was created at Berwick on Oct, 4th and 5th by the announcement that information had been received that it was intended by the Fenians to make an ettack upon the barracks, and seize the arms and ammunition which are stored there; The information was received on Friday morning by the arrival of a London detective officer, who had been sent down specially by Sir Richard Mayna. It was decided that the Folunteers should have their arms removed from the barracks and put into their own possession; and this was done on Friday and Saturday right. The staff and the Militia are on duty all night with loaded arms. Three large field pieces in the barracks square have been loaded with grape shot, and so placed as to repel an attack from whatever direction it might be made. Hand grenades are also ready to be thrown over the walls of the barracks at any time. The coast-guard officers, and the men of the gunboat are also fully prepared for any emergency, and are keeping a watchiday and night. The police, under the direction of Sergeant Ronaldson, are on duty all night, and watch strictly the whereabouts of any stranger who may happen to come into the town.

Shortly after 11 o'clock on the night of Oct. 10th, a rumor spread through the crowd at the fire in High street, Edinburgh, that the Fenians had entered the General Post Office and set fire to it. This caused great consternation. The astounding rumor had so far gained credence that intelligence was conveyed to the Castle and a company of soldiers, under the command of two officers, was marched down to the scene of the fire to keep order. Lord Provost Chambers appeared on the ground at this time, but having ascertained that the fire had got under and that the Fenian rumours have been affoat in Dublin, one for instance, to the effect that a military movement took place a night or so ago towards Tallaght, the Fenian rendezvous of March last, where a gathering was

have been attoat in Dublin, one for instance, to the effect that a military movement took place a night or so ago towards Tallaght, the Fenian rendezvous of March last, where a gathering was expected. Nothing of the kind happened. Arrests on suspicion made in Dundalk have proved to be of no importance. Two labouring men, named O'Brien, were remanded by the Dublin magistrates for having had concealed under the cushion of a sofa in the room they occupied, two rifles and a bayonet which they stated to the searching party of police they had got from a person who had gone to America.

The Edinburgh banks have been warned against a Fenian surprise, and the rifles have been removed from the militia barracks to the castle. The general belief is that there is no ground for apprehension, and that the precautions taken are unnecessary.

RUNAWAY AND SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—On Saturday afternoon last about 4 o'clock as Mrs. Benjamin Carter of Galt was driving on the Blair Road, near Rosehill, an iron cliff which attaches the shafts to the buggy broke off and allowed one side of the shaft to fall and strike the legs of the horse. The animal ran away and there being nothing but the traces to keep the buggy steady, it swayed from side to side and at last upset, throwing Mrs. Carter on the ground with great violence. Her left wrist was sprained and the bone of the left elbow badly bruised if not broken. The left side of her face is also much injured and swollen, but although the bruises are painful, she is in a fair way to recover speedily. The buggy was damaged and left on the road, but the horse came to his stable of his own accord not much the worse of his runaway.—Gall Reporter.
