Immigration Statistics, number of immigrants who are reported to have arrived and settled in Ontario for 1873 are 39,184. Making allowance for these who do not ases tried as soon as possible.

There were 1,100 more failures in the United States in 1873 than in 1872, with an increase of liabilities of \$107,443,000. Over trading, and year 1872 the number of immigrants who arrived were 28,129; for 1871, business operations, are ascribed as who arrived were 28,129; for 1871, 25,842; for 1870, 25,290; and for 1859, 15,893. Thus it will be seen that the increase last year over 1872 was 11.055, and over 1869 23.291. This is a most gratifying exhibit, and fully justifies the increased expenditure of the Government in attracting to this country an industrious of these is the Ministernal candidate. and thrifty class of settlers. The Ottawa Valley Immigration Aid So. it sent home no less than \$10,680 to North East and Western Canada be expended in bringing immigrants out under its auspices. The Government has also become a valuable means of communication between immigrants and their friends in the old country, in the transmission of money to aid them in coming out also. Last year the Immigration Department transmitted \$22,555 for this purpose. The total cost, per head, of immigrants, as reported in 1872 and 1873, including the bonus of \$6 paid in a large proportion of cases, averages only \$3.50, or, if we take the total estimate of arrivals, \$3.12 per head.

The Local Government of New Brunswick are continuing their excellent immigration policy. It consists in setting apart certain tracts of good land, clearing a few acres, and erecting a small house on each lot, and then bringing out from England or Scotland a whole colony of agricultural laborers, sixty or seventy families at once, and conveying them directly to their new homes in the forest, where they are allowed every chance to improve their condition. 
