THE STAMPEDE

While the weather man certainly did not err on the side of kindness, the opening day of the Stampede passed in a manner that gives assurance that, with the continuance of reasonably favorable conditions, the exhibition will be an unequalled success.

As the most remarkable exhibition of its kind to be held in the Dominion it cannot fail to afford to this city a measure of publicity of incalculable value. Associated with the great Stampede the name of Calgary has been carried far and wide.

We who live in Calgary have a pride in our city which we believe to be well founded. Our guests will see here a modern city, growing at a pace which must seem almost incredible to those who are unfamiliar with the brief but splendid history of the Canadian West.

THE PROBLEM OF THE CITY

Peculiar significance attaches to references to the existence of a housing problem in Canada, repeatedly appearing of late in the larger Eastern newspapers. There is food for ironical reflection in the fact that Canada, with the certainty that her population will be multiplied many times within the next few decades and possessing everything necessary to accommodate these coming millions, is yet faced with the problems presented by overcrowding in her larger cities.

The lesson for the newer cities of the West is clear. The reproduction here even of such conditions as are to be found today in Montreal and Toronto is inexcusable. The time for action is now, when evils that must be eradicated later at immense cost, may be prevented by the exercise of thought.

The best interest of the whole community is served when the efficiency of every unit is raised to the highest power. The loss sustained by the community through the existence of the inefficient is not represented by the cost of poor relief and of the maintenance of charitable institutions.

can make such provision now that, no matter what the increase in population, every man, woman and child will live in an environment which will ensure health of body and mind, in so far as they can be ensured by outward conditions. If nothing else can be done at the present time parks and playgrounds can be secured.

A REASONABLE NAVY POLICY

It is difficult to believe that Mr. Borden will have any other course open to him than that of approving the principle underlying the naval policy formulated by his predecessor in office. The principle recognized in that policy and regarded by the great majority of Canadians as fundamental, was that Canada's duty to the Empire could be permanently fulfilled only by the establishment of a Canadian navy, paid for by Canadians and under the control of the Canadian government.

If the Canadian people can be convinced that peculiar existing circumstances require some form of direct contribution, that contribution will be freely given. It is unlikely, however, that they will be satisfied to discharge their obligation to the Empire by the mere signing of a cheque, and it is to be regretted that there are so many newspapers in the Dominion that appear to think that the task which faces us may be satisfactorily accomplished in that way.

"If war had broken out last year at this time, and everybody knows now that it was by the merest chance that it did not, Canada could have done nothing, simply because Sir Wilfrid Laurier had not included in his program a cash contribution to the British navy."

The naval policy of Sir Wilfrid met with the full approval of the British authorities and of the British press, representative of both political parties. If what The Province regards as a narrowly escaped calamity had befallen Great Britain and war had been declared last year, cash contribution from Canada at that time would have accomplished nothing.

The Grain Growers' Guide has the following to say of the application of the C.P.R. for permission to issue additional stock:

"The application made by the Canadian Pacific railway to the Dominion government for permission to issue \$60,000,000 additional stock is of vital importance to every Canadian."

"At the present time the Canadian Pacific railway stock with a par value of \$100 per share is selling on the stock exchange at about \$280 per share. This high price is due to the huge profits which the company has made through its excessive freight rates. Those rates are coming down. Nothing is surer. It may take some little time to accomplish the matter but the change is not far away. In view of this there should be no issue of stock by the Canadian Pacific railway at the present time. The stock cannot be issued unless by the express permission of the government to whom parliament-delegated that power some years ago. If the stock is issued today at the market value of \$280 per share a serious reduction of freight rates would undoubtedly reduce the value of this stock. Then we would hear tales of the suffering of the widows and orphans who had invested their money in the Canadian Pacific Railway stock and who must be protected."

"Considerably less than \$280 a share it would all be gobbled up immediately by the magnates who now own the Canadian Pacific railway. Suppose the stock is issued at \$150 per share the magnates would then turn round and put it on the market at \$280 per share and thereby make \$130 profit on every \$150 invested without giving the slightest return. No new issue of the Canadian Pacific railway stock can be made in justice to the people of Canada until the freight rates are adjusted. The railway no doubt needs money for development. If so, its credit is as good as the credit of the Dominion government. Let the Canadian Pacific railway borrow money to sell debentures. In that way there will be no addition to the capital liability to form a barrier against freight rate reduction."

Joe Bayley and Billy Allen All Ready for Championship Battle

Participants in Mill for Lightweight Championship of Canada Have Finished Training; Will Rest Today to Prepare for Tomorrow's Event

All is in readiness for the Bayley-Allen battle for the lightweight championship of the Dominion tomorrow morning. Each of the principals put the finishing touches on his training yesterday and each will rest today without doing any physical exercise. The men are in the pink of condition, and will enter the ring at about 10:30 p.m. Billy Allen has taken off the extra two pounds of flesh which he has been carrying around of late while training, and is in his very best. The arena was finished on Saturday and provided that good weather is on tap, the biggest crowd which ever attended a ring event in the history of the sport in Canada will be present. The advance sale of seats was a little over five thousand dollars. These seats were bought with the knowledge that the westerners might suddenly take to the hour, and the purchasers wanted to be sure of getting the very best places. It is expected that over twenty thousand people will be at the arena at 10:45 tomorrow morning when the first round preliminary will be fought between Jack Tinsley of Edmonton and Alf Boyd of Los Angeles. These men will weigh in at 132 pounds.

Following this there will be a six round mill between Jack Feeney, Billy Allen's sparring partner and Cyclone Scott. These men will weigh in at 132 pounds. The wind-up will be between Kid Lucas and Kid Lewis, the two lightweights who gave the Bassano fans their money's worth and then some. The main bout will start at 11:30. Tommy Burns will referee.
