Another machine picks them up and arranges them heads and points together ; and a third piece of mechanism puts them into paper. One of these machines occupies no more space than an ordinary table ; each of them turns out from 30,000 to 40,000 per day. Most of the needles up to the present time have been imported from England. The Ontario Government have done our town the honor of appointing a Police Ma-gistrate,--with an extraordinary proviso, or agreement to the effect that, inasmuch as such an official was entirely unnecessary, and that to make such an appointment is an outrage upon and an injustice to taxpay-ers in the town-he shall charge the town only \$500 per anum. The statute pro-vides that the salary of the Police Magis-trate in towns having less than 6000 inhabi-tants shall be \$800, and in towns over 6000, \$1000. These sums are not too much : and \$1000. These sums are not too much: and where sch an official is required or neces-

sary, he should be paid what the law pro-vides; and if, as is the fact in regard to Stratford, it is felt by the appointing power that the duties to be performed are so few— so insignificant, that a less salary is deem-ed sufficient, no appointment should be made. The appointing power, by bargain-ing with the new official that, contrary to the statute, he shall accept \$500 a year in-stead of \$1000, to which he is entitled, de-clare most unmistakably, that they feel they clare most unmistakably, that they feel they are, in making such an appointment, doing a coss injustice to the taxpayers-doing an ndefensible act. Such a bargain, because learly illegal, cannot be binding upon the fficial, and the end of it will be that the

THE PARTISAN PRESS ON TWO CON-STITUTIONAL LAW CASES.

STITUTIONAL LAW CASES. When the Earl of Mulgrave was Governor of Nova Scotia, some dozen years ago, a ma-jority of the voters of the Province petitioned him to dissolve the House of Assembly. Mr. Howe, the Premier, advised a refusal of the prayer, and pointed to a majority of two in the Assembly—a majority composed of men who had been elected to turn him out of office. The Governor decided that the prin-ciples of Responsible Government required him to act on the advice of Ministers sus-tained by Parliament, and he refused to dis-solve. The Sceretary of State for the Colo-nies, the Duke of Newcastle, in reply to a memorial from the petitioners, wrote a des-patch conveying the approval of Her Majes-ty's Government to the Governor. The Halifax papers that have become frantic in their rage at the refusal of the Governor General to neglect the advice of his Ministers cordially approved of the course of the Earl of Mulgrave and the despatch of the Duke of Newcastle.
