Gladstone said that the government had ascertained that DeLesseps in protesting against troops on the property of the Suez canal company acted solely as a private individual. It was not thought necessary therefore to take steps regarding his so-called protests. The only matter to be considered with advantage in regard to the canal is the condition that it shall remain open, which it does.

It is rumored that the government has ordered Dufferin to leave Constantinople in the event of the ports refusing the military convention demanded by England.
