

Snake in a Horse's Eye.

A remarkable veterinary surgical operation was performed at Sheepshead Bay, L.I., on Tuesday. A snake three and one-half inches long was removed from a horse's eye and it is thought that the animal will survive, although nine times out of ten this operation results in death.

The horse, which belonged to Frederick Gracs, a butcher of Sheepshed Bay, was taken ill several weeks ago. It was noticed that a film had grown over the right eye, and Graes called in Dr. Sheppard, a well known veterinary surgeon living in the village.

Dr. Sheppard, after washing the horse's eye with a lotion which removed the film, observed a small live object wriggling about in the pupil. He decided that it was a case of what is known as "snake in the eye."
