—The degree of success which has attended the St. John Business College and Short-Hand Institute speaks volumes for the principal Messrs Kerr and Pringle. During the term, however, would appear to be altogether unwise, as tending to increase unnecessarily and to a very large extent, the expense of carrying on the machinery of government. —When the Municipal Council, at the recent session, passed a resolution indemnifying surveyors of highways against any costs that might be incurred in attempting to prosecute the statute labor law, we presume it was not expected that the same would be called upon to pay a good round bill of costs at this early day. But such would appear to be the case. A story comes from Middlesex of a surveyor who attempted to collect the commutation tax from a property owner, a resident of Halifax. The justice who tried the case gave judgment for the plaintiff for the amount of the tax and costs, together with seventy-five cents for his own letter to the defendant demanding payment.

—For this and certain other irregularities the defendant applied to the Supreme Court in Halifax for a writ of certiorari. The case was argued last week, and as will be seen elsewhere in our columns, the writ was allowed with costs, which means that the county will have a bill of costs of the extent, probably, of \$100 or \$150 to pay.

—The principle of the municipality indemnifying surveyors of highways against any loss incurred in the discharge of their duties, while doubtless sound in theory, should be surrounded with restrictions. To allow any surveyor to rush off to the nearest magistrate and begin a lawsuit, which, owing to the aversion or incompetency of the justice, is likely to involve the municipality in hundreds of dollars of expense, is certainly allowing too much latitude altogether. If the municipality has to file the bills, some competent official should direct the prosecution of these cases, so that there should be no reckless and unnecessary litigation.

—At the same time, the conscientious official who has to invoke the aid of the law in the discharge of his duty, should not be left to do it at his own risk.
