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## In the Municipal Council ANNUAL SESSION, 1907

Council met in the Court House in Annapolis Royal in the County of Annapolis, on Tuesday, the eighth day of January, 1907, at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

Present: The Warden, Councillors Outhit, Charlton, Fitch, Williams, Neily, Armstrong, Porter, Healy, Piggott, Bishop, Grimm, Thomas, Buckler and Brown.

Ordered that the following be the standing committees, namely:—Tenders and Public Property—Freeman Fitch, B. F. Williams and J. W. Piggott.

Finance—F. H. Porter, W. C. Healy and T. G. Bishop.

Assessments—J. H. Charlton, J. C. Grimm and A. D. Thomas.

Road Returns—Walter Purdy, A. Stanley Brown, Joshua J. Buckler, Innes—D. M. Outhit, A. Neily, W. E. Armstrong.

Ordered that the minutes of the half yearly session be amended by adding after the resolution: "Ordered that the Bridge, Bridgeport, be placed under the Bridge Act," the following words: "provided such Bridge is condemned by the Government Inspector and upon the town of Bridgeport contributing seventy-five dollars per year towards the same interest."

At the Almshouse, Supt. Hiltz has been kept very busy, owing to the scarcity of proper help, but in spite of this the standard of excellence has been maintained and the same interest and vigor given to his work as in previous years.

At the Almshouse Mr. and Mrs. Myers, who assumed charge in June, have succeeded admirably and from their previous training as nurses in the Almshouse, were well adapted for their new duties, and we are pleased to say that everything has passed off smoothly.

Successful Institute meetings were held in November and December addressed by Mr. Anderson, of Orillia, Ont.; Mr. Woodworth and Mr. Parker, of Berwick, at Melville Square, Nictaux, Williamson, Lawtonstown, Clarence, Paradise, Beaville and Round Hill.

Arrangements have been made through Prof. Cumming, Secretary for Agriculture, for ten or twelve Institute meetings to be held in the county, west of Bridgetown mostly.

Speakers—Mr. Woodworth, of Berwick and Mr. Foster, of Kingston. Secretaries of Agricultural societies or others please advise me on what days of the week it is most convenient to have their meetings, commencing on February 5th.

Farmers should attend the Provincial Association meeting at Middleton on the 25th, 30th and 31st, where they may learn much that will be of interest and advantage to them.

### Catastrophe Not Exaggerated

Extent of Disaster at Kingston Greater than First Reported—Death List Reaches Many Hundreds—10,000 People Homeless.

Washington, Jan. 17.—An emergency bill for the relief of the sufferers on the Island of Jamaica was passed today. The bill is as follows:—That the President of the United States is authorized to use and distribute among the sufferers and destitute people of the Island of Jamaica such provisions, clothing, medicines and other necessary articles belonging to the subsistence and other stores of the naval establishments as may be necessary for the purpose of succoring the people who are in peril and threatened with starvation on the said island in consequence of the recent earthquake and attendant conflagration.

Chairman Tavenor, of the Appropriation Committee, explaining the needs for the emergency measure, said that the Secretary of the Navy had received a wireless message from one of the battleships which had touched at Kingston that the devastation was even greater than reported, and that the British government did not know of the extent of the disaster.

Without waiting for the authority of Congress, however, Secretary Metcalf had telegraphed Admiral Evans to send the supply ship Celtic, which is now on her way to Guantanamo, to Kingston and turn over her full cargo of supplies to the sufferers of the stricken city.

Holland Bay, Jan. 17.—All the reports agree in stating that the entire business section of Kingston is completely demolished, mainly from the fire which started immediately after the earthquake on January 14.

Port Antonio may be said to be completely unharmed, although the Town Hall was partly destroyed. The Titchfield hotel at Port Antonio is uninjured and all the clerks and employees of that establishment are safe.

The gutted section of Kingston includes that portion of the town between East and West streets, from Tower street to the waterfront. All the piers are down with the exception of the Royal Mail Steamship Packer Company's, and that of the Government railway.

The Elder-Dempster Company's steamer Port Kingston and the Admiral Sampson belonging to the United States Fruit Company, are safe in Kingston harbor.



Ordered that the report of the Committee on Tenders and Public Property as read be received and adopted.

To the Warden and Councilors of the Municipality of Annapolis.

Your committee on Tenders and Public Property beg leave to submit the following report for your consideration December 1st, 1906.

We have during the year exercised a careful supervision over the construction at the Asylum and Almshouse as is possible under the present method of conducting the business.

All supplies which practical have been purchased by tender at close prices, the quality also has been fairly satisfactory. Taking advantage of the establishment of a contractor's undertaking we have had some work done in connection with the undertaking as the institutions. We are pleased to see the improvement that has been made in the efficient condition and the amenities clean and comfortable.

Mr. and Mrs. Hertz are still in charge at the Asylum and Almshouse and a very satisfactory year's work.

Considerable difficulty has been experienced in procuring suitable help, and some of the time we have been short-handed, which has entailed a good deal of hard work on the Superintendent and Matron. Our Asylum has a good name and has the confidence of the authorities at Halifax.

A change has been made in the staff at the Almshouse. Mr. and Mrs. Lowe resigned charge June 1st, on account of Mr. Lowe's poor health. We procured the services of Mr. and Mrs. John Myers, who formerly assisted Mr. Hertz at the Asylum. Our former good opinion of Mr. and Mrs. Myers has been confirmed and we have found them industrious, economical and kind to the inmates.

It was quite late in the season when Mr. Myers took charge of the farm. He succeeded, however, in raising a very good crop.

LOCAL AND SPECIAL

A large tract of land on the North Mountain in Kings county, has been secured by a company for the industry of sheep raising.

Hides are a commodity that has advanced in price during the past year. They are quoted now at nine cents and scarce at that. To account for the lack it is stated that many farmers reduced their head of stock in the winter of 1905, when hay was scarce and high.

We learn that prices of fruit in the English market have improved materially during the past few days. It is hoped that the large shipments of apples just starting from our province for the old country will meet with much success, gaining for our fruit-growers the rewards they so well deserve.

The office of the Bank of Nova Scotia in Kingston, Jamaica, was among the numerous buildings destroyed by the recent earthquake and fire. Temporary quarters have been arranged for, however, so that the bank's business in that city will meet with but brief interruption.

Mayor Hoy has received a communication from the Chronicle Pub. Co., requesting assistance in raising a fund for the relief of the Kingston sufferers from the earthquake, and requests the Monitor to ask any one wishing to contribute to leave the amount at either of the Bridgetown banks.

The public meeting held in the Court House on Monday evening last was adjourned to Thursday evening, the 24th inst., at 8 o'clock. Owing to the absence of the town officials, information required by the rat-payers could not be obtained. It is particularly requested that the mayor as well as other town officials will be present on this occasion.

Motor cars are to be introduced on the government railways, according to a statement made by Mr. Emmerson, minister of railways. They will be made in Amherst, and introduced on suburban routes near St. John and Halifax. The deputy minister said that the cost of operating these would be half the cost of steam cars. No action will be taken towards the establishing of motor cars on the branch lines until the result of the test is known.

Olive Branch Division is steadily increasing in membership and interest. An enthusiastic debate formed the chief item of entertainment on Monday evening last. The question for discussion was "Who has done more to develop the resources of our country, the Farmer or the Mechanic." About twenty persons took part in the debate, and much wit and humor brightened the various speeches. The ladies gave expression to their opinions respecting the subject, and joined heartily in the final vote awarding the place of honor to the farmer. A literary entertainment is being prepared for next Monday evening.

LOCAL AND SPECIAL

Two shipments of apples of 500 and 1,000 barrels respectively, have gone forward from the D. A. R. station since Saturday, for the London market.

The Canadian government has voted \$50,000 towards the relief of conditions in Kingston, Jamaica. A steamer with supplies has been forwarded from Halifax.

Twenty-five dollar bank bills are to be introduced in Canada by the Farmers' Bank of Canada. These will correspond approximately with the English five pound note.

At a special session of the council held yesterday afternoon, the auditor's report was laid before the council and was received and adopted, and the accounts of the town clerk and treasurer being found correct to the satisfaction of the council, were passed and allowed. It was further ordered that 300 copies in pamphlet form of the said report be published for distribution among the ratepayers.

TOWN FINANCES.

The report of the conditions of town finances placed in the hands of the printer, yesterday show taxes for 1906 unpaid \$1,005.79. The sum total of property and poll tax and revenue from water service received amounted to \$8,740.26. Proceeds from railway and sewer debenture loans and from other sources make the sum total of receipts \$18,568.76. There is an over draft in Union Bank on sewer construction of \$286.96, on water system of \$2,756.96. There is also an over draft in Bank of Nova Scotia of \$681.39 with cash to offset it of \$378.41. The net over draft at beginning of 1906 was \$2,499.50.

OBITUARY

DR. JAMES PRIMROSE.

The death occurred on Thursday afternoon, at his residence on Grandville street, of Dr. James Primrose, after an illness of several months of cancer of the stomach. Though it was well understood that his illness was of such a character that he could not recover, it was not until within a few hours of his death that his symptoms became alarming, and surprise as well as regret, followed the circulation of the sad news. Some five months ago his health causing grave anxiety, Dr. Primrose was persuaded to go to the United States for treatment, but his case being pronounced hopeless, he returned home and with patient resignation awaited the end. Having practiced his profession of dentistry in this town and in Annapolis, since his graduation from the Philadelphia Dental College in 1881, he had a large acquaintance and many warm friends in the western section of the county.

Dr. Primrose was born in Lawrencetown, his father being a physician of that place, and his brother, Dr. Stens and Primrose, a skilled physician and surgeon, still residing there. Another brother, Dr. Fred Primrose, a leading dentist in Baltimore, is a graduate in both medicine and dentistry. One other brother survives, Edward Primrose, of Boston, and a sister, Mrs. J. G. Heppeiger Parker, now living in Sydney. He married Miss Minnie Le Cain, of Round Hill, who, with one child, a son, Clarence, survives him, and they have the deep sympathy of all in the sad loss they have sustained. Being quiet and reserved in temperament the true worth of the deceased was best known and appreciated by those who knew him longest and best. The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon, Rev. Mr. McDonald conducting the service, and the remains were taken to Round Hill for interment.

WALTER E. PALFREY.

The death of Walter E. Palfrey, of Lawrencetown, which occurred from pneumonia, on Saturday, 19th inst., was learned with deep regret in this town and in other parts of the county, as he was one of the most favorably known business men in Annapolis county. His illness was reported last week by telephone, as having taken a turn for the better, but though he lingered several days, the disease had fastened too strongly upon his constitution to be resisted. Through his artistic ability, strength of purpose, sound principle and a genial personality, Mr. Palfrey had built up in the last ten years a prosperous business in the line of general merchandise, and will be greatly missed by the trading public in his locality. As a youth, Mr. Palfrey, having an inclination for pharmacy, first entered the drug store of the late Dr. L. R. Morse, and afterwards that of Primrose & Beane, Annapolis. In 1881 he was persuaded by his aunt, Mrs. Woodcock, then engaged in the millinery and dry goods business, to become manager of her business. Upon her death Mr. Palfrey developed the business, building and occupying a new store and adding general merchandise to his stock. He was ever alive to the interests of his town and his judgment and opinions were highly valued by his townsmen. His first wife was Miss Rebecca Holland of Stewarke, the daughter, by this marriage survives her parents. His second wife was Miss Ada Tupper of Lawrencetown, and two sons and a daughter, all living are the offspring of the second marriage. He is also survived by two brothers, Arthur C. carriage maker, of Bridgetown, and Fred G., manager of the Union Bank of Halifax, Lawrencetown, and one sister, Mrs. F. M. Steadman, of Bear River.

The funeral which took place on Tuesday was one of the largest held in Lawrencetown, many people from adjoining sections being present to pay their last token of respect. The Sunday school of which he had been superintendent for many years was present in a body, and formed in ranks on either side as the casket of one they loved and mourned was borne to his last resting place.
