## EDITORIAL NOTES.

A pamphlet, being a memorial of the late John Robert Willic, the first Nova Scotian conchologist, has just been issued by W. E. Ganoag, $A M$, Professor of Botany ai Harvard University, and Mr. Harry Piers, of the Legislative Iibrary, Halifax. The little rork comprises an introductory page by Ganong, the life of Willis by Piers, and a bibliographical and critical notice of Willis' published papers, with 2 liet of Nova Scotian shells, by Ganong. It is carefully edited and will prove very interesting to all students of natural bistory.

The harves: moon is the full moon on or nearest to the autamnal equinox, and is so called because it rises more nearly after sunset for several evenings than any other full moon of the year. The moon, which will bo new on the zath of this month, and fulls about the $27^{\text {th }}$ or 23 th, will thus prolong the light to the best of her ability for the benefit of harvestars, but we fancy the idea is mole poetical than practical, because farmers now-adays seem to make a point of getting their garners filled in the day time. Nevertheless, a harvest monn is very delightful, and is duly appreciated by young people who have a fancy for meandering off together under the silvery or rather almost goldon rays of our satellite.

In the course of an article on "The Christianity of the Future," in sho Forum for September, the eminent and venerable Professor Blackie observes:-'Say what re will, abstinence is the despair of virtue. I abatain because I am too weak to be tenperaic ; I retreat bectuse I dare not face the adversary; I commence my virtuous career by a public confession of the most unmanly of all vices, namely, cowardice. No doubt it is rise in some persons to play the coward; and self-denisl in some exceptional style, like the amputation of a limb, may be the ouly safe:y to 2 man for whom a large freedom cannot be claimed. For this we have the highest authority (MIathew v, 29); but neither our Lord nor his apostles ever taught that the abstinence prescribed for the moral diseases of the few was to be laid down as 2 rule of health for the many. On the contrary evon drinking at marriage feasts and elsewhere receives a sympathetic recognition from the same God-man by whom the sour faces, the formal fastiogs, and the severe sabbatic practice of tho pharisaic respectables was condemned; and weats and drinks, acconding to the great apostle, were to be wisely used and moderately enjoyed, just as we enjoy the universal brightress of the sun and the universal fragrance of the flower."

Our contributor, "P.S. H.," whose letter appears on page 6, asks information on a matter about which we have no knowledgo. If any of our readers can tell us anything about the "Recsor Patent Ventilator," wo shall be pleased to publish it. It is certainly atrange that stich a valuable inven tion as that described by our correspendent should have gone out or useperhaps passed into oblivion.

Much interest has been taken in the experiments recently made by the milltary authorities at Ottaws with carrier pigeons. In this connection it is interesting to know that swallows are now being ueed in France by the military authorities instead of pigeons. A test was recently made at liaubo, and fifteen of the birds were given absolute freedom oi wing for the first time. They flew in different directions, and in about twenty minutes one came back and perched on the trainer's out-stretched finger. In lialf an hour every swallow had returned. If the homing instinct is as strong in the swallows as in the pigeons, there is no reason why they should not bo utilized as messengers.

The Grand Jury of St. John, N. B., has masde a presentment to the court in reference to level raiiway croseings. This is not before it is needed. We are constantly hearing of fatal accióents on these crossings, and as there are no gate3 0 : watchmen or other protection to warn people of the approach of a train, the work of slaughter goes on. It would be best if thete were no such things as level crossings, but at least the government sbould ace to it that ample protection be provided where they already exist, and that in future the highways or strents should be carried over or under the railway by means of bridges or archwaye. The Grand Jury has done well in making an inquisition into this matter, and it is to be hoped that it will be speedily productive of a change from the present state of affits.

Ifie Chignecto Ship Railway work is being successfully carried on, and on its successful completion issues of, we may say, world wide importance hang. Not only will it save a voyage of five hundred miles around Nova Scolia to the cossting trade betreen the Bay of lundy and the Gulf of St. Lawrence, provably increase that trade to double its present proportions and tend to consolidate our great Dominion, but if the scheme is a success it will at onco be taken as an example for similar enterprises in many places in Canada, where canals are not feasible, as well as at other important points elsewhere in the world. The possibilities of the ship railvay are not yet known, and as this is the first great ship tailway of the world, much importance must be altached to the experiment. It is proposed to carry vessels of 2,000 tons displacement on this railway, and there is little doult that it will have plenty of work to do.

The public schools re-opened after the summer vacation on September 1st, and teachers and pupils ought to be, after theiy rest, in first rate trim for work. We understand, however, that many of the children have been unfortunate enough to take cold, and on enquiring into the matler we find that the trouble probably lies in the school houses. The month of August was 2 very damp one, and ss the school houses were shut up, they naturally contracted a good deal of it. This could easily have been overcome by baving fires lighted and thoroughly airing and drying the class romms a fev days before school opened. This should have been attended to as a neceasary precaution for the health of both teachers and pupils. We understand that fires are not used until October, which, if true, should be remedied at once. We are liable to have several days in September when artificial heat is necessary for comiort and rell-being, and if the pupils in our schools are to ait still with cold hands and feet, even if not shivering all over, no = good work can be expected of them, and they may lay the foundation for a winter's sickness. It is certainly the duty of the Schuol Board to see that matiers of this kind are properly looked after, and the health of the teachers and pupils taken care of.

The new iron tube railway tunnel just completed, connecting Canada with the United States, under the St. Clair Piver, is a notable feat of engipeering. It is the longest river tunnel in the world, being 6,050 fect in all, 2,300 feet of which is under the river bed. Its outside diameter is 2 fect . It is only a year since the tunael .proper was comnenced, and deapite the rapidity of construction, ferer casualties havo attended it than any other similar work. It is the first iron tunnel of its kind. The castings which make up the lining are 4 feet 10 inches in length, 18 inches in width, and if inches in thicknese. Thirty-two bolts in each segment connect it with its fellows, and the completed tuanel forms an immense iron tube. It has been built for the purpose of accommodating the traffic over the Grand Trunk Railway of.Camada, the Chicago and Grand Trunk, the De:roit, Grapd Haven and Milwaukee, and the Toleuro, Saginaw and Mluskegon Railways. The steam car ferry, at present in operation at this point, was fornd inadequate, and a bridge was impossible owing to the low lovel of both shores and the great amount of shipping traffic of large dimensions. The project was a Canadian idea, and has been carried to a successful issue by Canadian enterpise. The aystem which was made use of in driving the bore is that invented by Mr. A. E Beach, of the Sciensitic American. The method of constraction, under which the tunnel was completed as the mork proceeded, is the invention of the designer of the project, Mr. Joseph Hobsan, of Hamiatod, the chief engineer of the Groat Western Division of the Grand Trunk Railway. As soon 28 this tunnel is in runniog order, -bjech may be by the end of the yecr, another will be begun alongside of it, in which the same mechinery will be used. One remarkable thing about it is that it did not exceed the original estumated cost of construction, three million dollars. Atter being cleaned of the clay and silt which is in it, the fandel ia to be trealed with a preparation to prevent rusting.

Industrial and agricultural fairs and exhibitions are valuable in promoting competition for the highest degree of excellence, and showiug up the progees of the county, provinee, or country for which they are held. Theey should not he neverdome, hovever, or they will fail of their object. 'Ihere are, we lelieve, sisty fars to be hedd in the l'rovince of Ontario this month. and forly or fify more in Octobur. This is ton many to be successful.

Etta Simpson, 17 yeurs of aye, whose home is in Monrton, N. B., ha; astonished the medic-l faculty and her friends by falling asleep on August 24th, since which time she has nut awakened. She is said to have been in the habit of eating brown paper, the appetite being so strong that she couid not sse a piece without wartibg to devour it. Indulgence of this norbid appelte may have somedhiog to do with her present rather precarious condition. and sinold he a lesson for others wion are aflieted with a craving for indigrstibie submames: State pencals, paper, beans, leaves of rees, raw vegetables, hits of wood and many oblher such del-terious things feat. thechief diet of many school girls. Pareats should ho watchful, and if they discover their children eating such things administer a prompt corrective in the form of a good spanking, or shutting up in a dais closet, or cuitiog off a meal or su a day in order to produce at hungry fecling for good fisod.

Now would be a gond time to start a society for the preventiun of misdirected philanthrophy in New York, where, according to the Press, a home for cats is about to be built. A fine site has been secured on the banks of the Harlon, where accomodation will be provided for a thousand homeless and abandoned specimens of the folis domesiica. Kindness to animals is a trait to be admired in any person, but in a case like this it ia rather mistaken. The life of one child is of more value than a thousand cats, and the money that is to be expended on the proposed home would go a long way towards supplying the necessaries of life to many of the homeless human beings in the city of Ners York. The spirit that devotes noney to such a cause as the caring for homeless cats is undoubtedly kindly, but the intellect that ditects it must be of a very weak nature to allow the pressing needs of humanity to be so overshadowed. It would be farmore merci!ul to poison the cats and use the money which would otherwise be spent on their care in promoting the comfort of homeless human beings.

Society, or at least the feminine portion of it, is occasionally stirred to its depiths on the servant-girl question, 38 it is called. Those who are interested in this matter will find an article in the Nineteenth Centur-finn August on "Domestic Service," which will repay perusal. It is wruten l, Mrs. Francis Darwin. She argues from the servant's side of the question which no one can deny has many grievances. She brands as a relic of feudalism the custom of demanding a formal and sritten character of a servant when being engaged, and thinks that every mistress should choose a referee, or two, among her servants pashor present, who have been with her not less than two years, to whom the selvant whom she is inclined to engage may apply for information as to the cbaracter of the mistross. Many roforms are needed in the relations of mistresses and servants to each other, bat very litule rould be effected by the system of giving characters which Mrs. Darwin would inaugurate, unless a consciencious appreciation of their mutual duties should rule them. Mrs. Darvin's aim is to plac'. domestic services on a higher level than they have hitherto reached.

The Sunitary Era for August, a progressive health journal published in New York, contains mortality, meteorological and other statistics fur the first four months of the current year, of the United States and principal cities of the neighboring republic, of the principal cities of the Dominion. and of Europe, and of representative cities of Australia, India, Africa and South America. Comparison of these mortality statistics presented Halifax in very unfavorable contrast with the larger majority of the cities whose death rate is given. Of some go citics of the Union, onls a i have a ligher death rate, and of is Canadian cities only Montreal, Quebec and Winnipeg contrast unfavorably with our metropolis. Manchester, Glasgow, Edinburgh and Dublin only, of British towns, show a higher mortality rate than Halifax. With few exceptions the great European cities aro assigned a very high dualh rate, and this, as would be expected, is also true of Indian, Norih African and South American citics. Comparing our city with St. John, which we are !ond of doing, we find that the total deths in the sister city, with a population estimated at 43.336 , for the first five months of the current year, is 345 , while the number of deaths for the same period in this city, with 2 population estimated at 42,000 , is 425 Ottawa, with 2 population of $44,00 \mathrm{c}$, has a record of 410 deaths. Ilamiton, with a population of 45,000 , and Toronto, with a population of 178,000 , inave had respectively 373 2nd 1332 deaths during the same poriod. No city could be more healthfully situated than ours, with a splendid water supply, uneraelled drainage, accessible in every part to sea breezes, with a fine harbor in front and tho common in the rear, to say nothing of plenty of open spaces and fairly broad strects. Malifax should be the healthiest city in the world. We liave not taken pains to compare the statistics given by the Sanitary bira with other compilations of a similar description, but if the statement before us is correct we are greatly in need of sanitary reform. The Board of Ifealth and the physicians of the city, who should in all sanitary interests be the coadjutors of the Board, should thoroughly investigsto the condition of the city and take such fneasures as would place Halifax in the position that it sheuld occupy as tho healthiest city in the world. It must be admitted, however, and should not be forgottco, that the best efforts of Iealth Boards and Medical Boards and Commissioners, unaided by the co-nperation of the citizens themselves, and hy an enlightened and aroused public opinod, will be rewarded with but a scant measure of success.

The people of Shelburne are agitating for a new steamship line from that place to Toston.

The annual fair of the Toronto Industrial Exhibition Association was opened on Monday by the Earl of Aberdecn.
$\Lambda n$ investigation into the loss of the Ulumbla will bo commenced at the County Court House before Captains Snith, R. N. R., and Hunter on Monday.

The preliminary altack on the defences of Halifax by the Comus and Burzard took place on Saturday. The land forces were judged to be victorious.

The wreck of the steamer Ulunda has been purchased by S. M. Brookfeld of Halifax, who will endeavor to get her off and place her in the dry dock hore.

The death is announced of Mrs. Hole, wife of the Rev. Dr. Hole, formerly of St. Paul's Church, Halifax. Her death occurred at Bromley, Kent, on the 24 th ult.
J. Henniser Heaton, an English member of Parliament and a well known advocate of postal reform, is going to lay his views before the Dominion Government at Ottawa.

Some friends who recently paid a visit to Bridgewater speak enthusias tically of the kiodness and attention of Capt. Oakes and Mr. Bates, the steward of the steamer Bridgewater.

A pair of carriage horses purchased in Montreal for Lieut-Governor Daly were suffocated by smoke from burning straw in a car on the G. T. R., between Richmond, P. Q., and Arthabask. The price paid for them was $\$ 600$.

Diptheria is again prevalent in the city. Every care should be taken to avoid infection, and the city health authorities should see that the city is kept in a healthy condition. We are glad to see that .he sewors have had a dose of lime.

Five was discovered in the hold of the Allan steamer Grecian, which arrived at Quebec on Tuesday, when she was off Newfoundland. The fire was suppressed and but litic damage was done. The passengers were unaware of their danger until all was over.

The pupils of a public school in Toronto havo had a shindy with the pupils of St. Patrick's eeparate school A dispute arose, and the Protestant children pursued the Catholic children to their school, which they fusiladed with stones. This bellicose spirit should be nipped in the bud before something more serious happens.

An attempt was made on Wednesday night to blow up the house of C. W. Lolter, Coustable at Londonderry, with dynamite; considerable damage was done. Mr. Iotten was in Truro at the time, and his wife and children were alone in the house. Great indignation provails, and it is thought the Local Government should offer a reward for the cupture of the villain.

It is stated that Cardinal Taschereau declined to altend the ball given at Quebec in honor of Prince George because he was refured precedence over the Admiral of the fleet and the Commander of the forces in Canada, and that these officials refosed to give him precedence. Norhing is known definitely, and no one seems inclined to give any information on the subject.

The first annual Exhibition of the Charlottetown Driving Park and Provincial Exhibition Associstion will be held at Charlotictown on Sept. 30 th and October 1st, 2nd, and 3rd. Competition is cpen to the whole provir.ce. The Exhibition building is a very allractive looking and well builh edifice 200 feet long by 87 wide. The grand stand is beautifully located by the side of the driving park, and is capable of comfortably seating about 2,500 persons From it an excellent view may be had of the horses in their contests of speed in trotting or runiuing, and of the grand parsde of all the prize animals. The ground floor under the grand stand is conveniently fitted with dining and lunch rooms. The half mile track for showing or testing the speed of horses is conceded by all who have seen it and are capable of judging, to be unequaled in tho Dominion and to be equal to any this side of Cleveland, Ohio, being graded on the plan introduced by Falsig in that city. There are stalls for 250 horses. The doors are made in two sections: the upper half may be open all the time and horses viewed by visitors whether the attendants are present or not. The sheds for cattle, sheep and swine are convenicnt, spacious and arranged so that no animal will be in the least exposed to the inclemency of the weather. The poultry house is constructed so that the fowls will be subject to no inconvenience in receiving food and water, and their admirers will have every opportunity for aceing them which good space and light can afford. Flooring has been put down in the avenues through the centre of the sheds in which animals are exhibited, so that visitors are protected from dampness in case of rain. The owners of this driving park are also the Exhibition Association. They huld the Provincial Exhibition annually and the government contributes \$2,000 fo: prizes for cxhbits, in addition to any prizes for trotting competitions. For the coming Exhibition $\mathbf{S}_{4,000}$ in prizes are offered. It promises to be the moal successful yet hold on the Island

A circular letter is being sent out to the clergymen of the archdiocese of Toronto requesting information concerning mixed marriages．Similar enquiries are being made orer the civilized world by order of the IIoly See．

The Cornwallis railway is about completed．It runs from Kentville on the Windsor and Annapolis railiray down the Cornvallis Valley in Nova Scotia，a distance of 12 miles．The surrounding country is well cultivated and full of rosources，and it is expected that the railroad will do a big export trade in opples during the coming scason．Tho road is equipped with 12 box and to flat cars built by Messrs．Harris \＆Co．，of St．Jolin，and three additional cars，one first－class，one second－class，and one compartment car for biggage and freight，aro now being built for this road by the same firm．

The Victoria 13．C．Assembly of Knights of Labor congress，recently in session at Dtawa，protested againat the increasing Chinese immigration to Canada，aud alleged that the Colestials have a bad effect on the morals of the country．They pointed out that since their advent to the l＇acific coast copiun smoking and eating in public has ceasad to cause abhorrence．Tbe labor congress is urged to ask Parliament to restrict their immigration in justice to white labor apart from the questiou of morality．Replying to the british Columbia workingmen，who waited upon him to ask that Chinese immigrants be prohibited from landiug in Canada，Sir John Nacdonald said such a policy could not be adopted，as it would destroy the prospect of building up trade between China and the Dominion．

The United States 「ariff Bill was carried in the Senate on Wednosday by a vole of 40 to 29.

A daughter of Gen．Barrundia，whose father was shot to death on the Yacific mail steamblip Acupulco at San Jose de Guatemala last week， aitempted to kill United States Minister Mizner on Sept．Ist．The young woman entered his office with a pistol in her hand，and，accusing him of having been the direct cause of her father＇s death，aimed the pistol directly at his heart aud pulled the trigger．Miznez had picked up a large book， which he held betweeu himself and the girl，and the bullet intended for him imbedded itself in the leaves of the book．Before a second shot could be fired，assistance arrived，and the pistol was taken from the young woman． Mizner says he will not prosecute her．A special from the City of Mexico says the widow and children of Gen．Larrundia have sent a telegram to President Harrison protesting that the General was vilely assassinated on bosrd an American stenmer，where he was found under the shelter of the American flag，and that his death，illegally consummated by the government of Guatemala，is due to the ofticious and criminal co－operation of Minister Aizner，wl：o ordered the captain of the steamer to deliver up the General． The telegram concludes．＂We protest．before you against this savage deed and expect from your rectitude and justice that you will demand due repar－ ation for the outrage of which we are unconsolable victims．＂Minister Mizner＇s frionds urgo him to tlee，as General limriundia＇s followers threaten to kill hin．

## LITTCERS TO COUSIN CARYL.

Dear Cousin Curyl,-IThe subject of d-oss-reform occupies the feminine mind now iodays to a great extent. Dross ought to be beautiful so far as it can; to please the oye, to gratify the artietic sense, to harmonize with womanhood, which was meant in itsolf to be beautiful. Thore is no virtue in ugliness, or any safe guard ngainst vanity in an uncouth, unbeconiug garment, and a beautiful woman in a beautiful dress is as pure a source of delight as tho oxquisite shape and hue and fragrance of the blossoms of June, At the samo time it should combino the first principles ind ross, health, comfort, udaptability, liecuty and simplicity.

Some day our women will learn that to bo beautiful they must bo healthy; that to be healthy they must make a study of rational dress; that the human form as God made it is lovelier than any device of the dressmaker. There will be more individuality in dress, but less violation of fundamentsl law ; just as many beautiful gowns, but a great mauy more plain, simple, substantial ones to take the place of the flinsy creations of an enoducated taste.

But after all, I say to every woman with brains and common sense, do not go to a dress reformer to be told what you ought to wear outside or underneath. Use your own common sense and your natural sence of modesty, remembering that without hes ${ }^{\circ}$ and strength you cannot be of use. Tho grown woman who has not invention and ingenuity enough to arrange her own clothing had better not try to work on charity committees or even to diroct a bousehold.

If we we were all ton times more indepondent of each other in mattors of fashion, my dear, we should be better off. Now don't call me strongminded or other hateful names for that !

You wanted to know about the baby's outfit. Woll, when poor Mary's children wero left to my care ten yoars ago I had become quito out of patience with the uncounfortable, unhygienic methods of clothing helpless infancy, and determined to evolve "out of my own head " (as the boy said ho made the gato, something a little moro practical and usoful. This was tho result: lst, a short shirt; 2nd, a waist; 3rd, one or two skirts; 4th, a dress. The shirt was of ecurr llannol-frequently maide from a soft, partlyworn under vest of my own-shirt, ju preference to the luty patlern of tho "Gertrude suit," because it thus becomes needless to change it through the day, as it escapes being soiled. 'The waist, of cotton in summer, (hesvior in winter and with sleeves,) and with a row of buttons for attachiog the skirt or skirts. These may be onc or more according to tho season, wore or luss olaborate according to the occasiun, and usually moderately short ; for ridin. out on a cold day, howover; a longer, heavier one may be added, which will wrap tho little feet more securely than any other garmont.

The dress may be a simple slip, or a gored dress, trimmed much or littlo according to tho mother's tasto; fur myself I think the simpler the better, as being tho wose appropriate to the innocunt little boing it is to cover.

After babyhood up to tho age of nine, Mary's children bavo worn nothing noxt the skin but flannel, and for this purposo I have found the well-known "Shsker" flannel most satisfactory. Of course the "Sanitary all-wool "is the ideal in its various grades, but is much more oxpensive and far less durable. Of tho "Sbaker" thero are several grades, and wo may find for sunmer wear one quite light, which, made with short sleeves, keops the little wearer comfortable, while guarding against suddun caill. Tho heavier qualities aro excellout for tho culdor soasou, made with sleeves down to the wrist.
l have found this mode of dress eutirely satisfactory ; and you cannol find two healthier, happior children than Bess and Mollie.

I was in town tho other day and happoned to bo going by Stearns' during a ale of fancy work. You know they have the very prettiost thinga there, as woll as the nowest. I thought of your bare marblo-xop parlor table. I went in and saw the tablo spreads, and "when soen maile a rote on." Among them a spread for a small table is made of mahogany colored velours, bound with silk braid, which has a rov of tassels in the middle. IVhen finished it forma a fringe; either side is right ride, as they are bothaliko. A lovely table scarf for an antique oak stand messures thirty 8 seven inches in longth, is of olive green plush with a stripo in centre of old gold figured silk. The searf is lined with canton flannol to match. Where the silk and plush are sewed together cover with old gold silk cord.

I think tho sproad would bo prottior for your parlor, don't you, as you want to bide that cold-looking marblo? I got ever so many new ideas thut day.

## THE REESOR VJEN'ILATOR.

In its effrets this venilator soemed to mo to be porlect. Whero used there was not a particlo of dust perceptible, and the car was continuously swept over by a delicious breeze, the lovol of the current boing raised or lowered at pleasure Tho more thuroughly the car windows and doors wore $\mathrm{k} \in \mathrm{l}^{1 \text { t }}$ closed, tho strongor au 1 steadier was this fresh air cur rent. It secmed to mo a delighlful arrangonient. ## COMMERCIAL.

The brauches of trade gonerally present indications fur a good avorayo turu-ovar this fall, and the general impression is that the outlook is favorable. In dry goods, irun, loather and lines of grocorios the preparations aro for a good businoss, and it seoms now that it is likely that the expoctations will bo fulfillod. During the week tho regular fall opening of millinery has crented considerablo activity in dry goods.

It was hoped that the advent of the ranth would have usbered in an easier monoy warkel, but so far the stringency has boon as marked as it was at the close of August, the rates for call loans being quoted at 6 to 7 por cent., with some round amounts placed at the latter ligure. Men of good commercial rating, who formorly got their discounting done at 6 per cont., have had to pay 7 yer cent. within the past fow days. Storling oxchange is quiet and oaby.

Farmers continuo to bo very busy with crops; much of what has been alresdy harvested remuins in first hands, but the receipts in this market are in gradually increasing volume. Tho crops gonerally throughout this Province are satisfactory. The hay yield is onormous. Potatoes, though in quantity somowhat bolo: the avcrage, aso of excollent quality and of fair size. On the wholo, farmers have reason to look with gratitication at the result of this season's labors.

United States.
Dnr Goons.——Considerablo activity has charactorizod the dry goods market this week, as the regular fall millinery openings have attracted a large influx of country buyera, and this has benefittad the general trade as woll. Stocks of fall goods aro nearly all hero now, so that businass is for prompt shipment, and buyors are reported to bo in a vory favorablo humor. It therefore seems that the expectations which havo been held of a good business this fall are likely to be fulfilled. The ciiy retail trado bas also been good, so that the week has been quite an active one.

Iron, Mandwame and Metals - The market romains quito as firm as when last reported and a fair movement has transpired during this weok, although some buyors are still holding off. The outlook, however, is that presnnt prices will be maintained for some timo to come at least. Pig iron rules firm, and the inclination is in favor of higher prices. Cable advicos report continued excitement in the speculativo Lranch of the English market with an irragular novement of prices. But the tondency of that market is upward, and $\overline{5} 3$. to 103 . more at least is asked for manufactured iron than a week ago. In other lines tre markot does not show any particular change, but the feeling is generally steady hero with a good outlook for a successful fall business. The tinplate warket continues firm with very littlo offering on spot. The tremendous demand in Groat britain, and purchases havo beon numerous and mado without any hesitation on bet terms possitlo. The consequence is that but littlo stock can bo had for prompt shipment, and also that all such articles as Canara plate and very thin shoets havo advanced in the samo proportion, Canada plate now costing fully 30c. moro par boas at primary points that it did ton days ago. The copper market is firm and a fair businoss is reported.

Breadsturys.-The flour market shows no change, and busir. a rules quiet on the wholo As previously stated, buyers stucked up protty well duriug the recent turn, and there ir, consequently, not so much trade doing now. Leorbohm cables-" wheat steady, corn quiet ; Fronch country markets firm." Wheat has been easy at Chicago, having declinod ${ }^{3}$ c. to $1 \frac{1}{2} c$. as to options. Coru was weaker but quiet thern. At Now York wheat furthor declined $1 \frac{1}{5} \mathrm{c}$. to 1 sic. At Si. Lauis the later options of wheat were woaker, showing a decliue of \}c. $101 \frac{1}{4} \mathrm{c}$. The earlier options wero steady and unchanged. At loledo wheat doclined 1 c . to 1 c ., and at Duluth $1 \frac{1}{c} \mathrm{c}$.

I'rovistoss.-Tho lucal market conitinues tu rula quiet, and no change towards activity is probable for some weeks. Fresh beef, mutton, pouliry, cte., show an easier disposition, and figures aro more reasonable than thev have boen for somo weeks. Tho victuallers' combine to keop up, or rather, to advanco retail prices, seems to have met with an early collapse. The vio inertia exercised by the public soon broko it down. The attempt was nade at the wrong soason of tho year, whou the public domand for teest foods is at its ninimum, and the public slivind that it was easier to part with meat 88 an articto of diot than with their monoy in the shapo of exhorbitant pricos. In Livorpool lard and bacon wero stronger, and advanced 3 d . and $6 d$. respectively. At Chicago pork was easier, and declined 22tc. Lard was steady ; hogs firm ; cattlo rreak ; sheep steady.

Butrer and Cueese.-The butter market is characterised by tho same features, but the position is purely nominal, and confined to purchasing operations. On the whole there is nothing new to noto. It is simply a matier of repetition to describo the checso markot. Spot business continues dull under an absence of oncouragemont from the other side. There has beon a boom in Now York on July make, which has beon a surpriso to both buyors and holders. The reason for this is hard to understand, but it is suggested that tho Augnst bolders want to get July off the market so that they may hold August with a firmer grip.

Fnuit.-The fruit market has shown no chadge since our roviow last week, trade boing rathor quiot on the whole, pending the arrival of new goods. In dried fruit a prominent feature is tho onquiry for currante, which aye very scarco. In greon fruit there is nothing particular to noto. Lomons and oranges move quiotly at unchanged prices. Tho Alpha brought from Bormuda so largo a quantity of banadas as to threaten to glut tho markot, but this was avorted by shipping several carloads to Montreal. Now apples have beon received sparingly, but thoso that havo 80 far come to hand wore mostly windfalls and otherwise inferior fruit, furnishing no indication from the figures that thoy brought of what sound apples will bo worth Inter on. The crop is small througbout the world, and big prices for winter "pplos ate expected.

Sunar and Molassks.-Tho sugar warket lons been quito active and prices have advanced de. to 1c. during tho work, and thore is no special disposition to soll oven at this advauco. Rofiued has advancod on all grados at Now York owing to the strongth of raws. The report of stock held in four parts of the United Kingdom show a decrease of 36,000 tons as compared with the same time last year. Nulasses is steady to firm with no movement to noto. A lotter recently reccived from a firm in Martiniquo says that Martinıque was paying the bighest prico for I'rinidad molasses for the purpose of making ruw, and that 1,400 puucheons of 'Inoidad molasses had been shipped from Boston back to Martinique. In consequence prices have advanced in Boston and New York 4c. to 5 c . per gallon.

Tea and Corfee.-The tea markot has beon very activo during tho weok, and considorablu quantitios are reported to havo changed hands. An advance of Ic. to lide. on most grades bas been achioved. sigents ropresenting Japau houses in Montreal have beon cabled to withdraw all 'as except at un advance of 1c. to 1 de. over last week's quotations. Tho suvauce in blacks there has been oven wore marked, and orders for 000 nud 1,000 rackago lots sold at the limits given the agents per last mail (subject to market changos,) are being rofusod, sn advance of lc. 10 2c. being askod in all cases. Collees are in better demand, buyors beginning to realize that they wust meet the holders' views as regards prices. Tho Now York narket is firm on all grades.

Fish Oils.-Our Montreal repoit is as follows:-"Ihero havo been sales of 500 to 700 bbls. of Newfoundland cod oil at 37 c . to 38c, with latest basiness at 39 c for round lots. We quote 38 c . to 39 c ., nlthough some holders aro asking t0c. 'ithe recent purchases bave gone into leathor mou's hands, showing that the demand is for consumptive purposes. Seal oul is also firm with an upward tendoncy, and we quote 5lc. to $52 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{c}$. for stoam refined. Tho outsiders who hold tho bulk of the stoan refined soal oil in this city, it is thought, will come out all right on thoir desl aftor all. Cod liver oil is quiet but steady at 45 c . to 50 c . Norway oil is quoted at 80 c . to 85 c ."

Fish.-The loca! fish market is fairly active all round. There is a good demand for codfish, herring and mackerel, but the supply has, so far, beeu ample to meet all calls. The cateh of codfish on tiso bauks, from present indications, will probably be below the average. Of courso the next fer weeks may pull up. The bay codfishing nas boen fair. Tho vessols that started early did pretty well, but those that set out later have not nearly come up to their records of last year. The shore codfishing has boen, on tho whole, somewhat bettor than last yoar, though thete aro indications at prosent of a little falling off. Nothing is doing either on our own shores or in tho bay in mackereling. What is now coming to market is small mackerel, taken in Juiy, which mect a ready market at good prices. The catch of fat herring along our shores has, so far, been very small, in fact not suificient to fill cuuntry consumptive orders. The Labrador herring fisherics have been vory diecouraging up to the last roports, dated August 25 th, whicn stato that nothing had been done yet. Our outside advicos are as follows :-Moutreal, Septomber 9.—" Dry cod is very scarco, aud values have an upward tendoncy. Orders havo been sont in for lots of 50 to 100 bundles at 3525 f.o. b. Halifax orders for Gaspe fish have been rofused, owing to tho poor catch. 'I'he Newfoundland and Inbrador catch is largo, but it is oxpected that i: will all bo wanted for tho Meditrrancan trade. Capo Bretun herrings are scarco, and would command $\$ 550$ to $\$ 6$ readily. About 400 or 500 bbls. of shore herrings have been sold at $\$ 4.50$, and some look for higher prices, owing to the shurt catch everywhero. Yurmouth bloaters of good qualaty are eelling $\$ 1$ to $\$ 1.2$, per box of 60 ; bonoless codfish is quoted 6 c . to $6!$ e. por 1 lb .; and bonoless fish 4 c . to 5 c ." Gloucester, Mass., September 9.- $\because$ Wo quoto new Georges cudtish at $\S 5.2 j$ a qut, for largo, and small at 8450 ; Bank $\$ 4.75$ to $\$ 5$ for large aud St fur small; Shoro $\$ 5$ and S.4. 25 for large and small. Dry Bank SJ 50, medium $84.7 \overline{5}$. Cured cusk at i4 per gil.; bake 5262 ; baddock 83 ; heavy salted pollock 8225 , and linglish curod do. $\$ 2.87$ per qil. Labrador herring $\$ 4 . \bar{j} 0 \mathrm{bbl}$.; med. spht $\$ t$; Nowfoundland do. 85 ; Nova Scotia do. 85.50 ; Lastport 84 ; split Shore $\$ 4.25$; round do. $\$ 350$; round Eastport 83.25 ; pickled codfish $\$ 7$; haddock 86 ; halibut heads 83 ; sounds 811 ; tongues and sounds $\$ 9.50$; tongues $\$ 8$; alowives $\$ 3.50$; trout $\$ 14.50$; California salmon 810 ; Halifax do. \$22 ; Newfoundland do. SI6." Port of Spain, Trinidad, Augusi 21. -"The cargo per Ariol from Lockeport wo sold outright at 82.4 drums, $\$ 23$ tierces, 85.40 boxes and $\$ 15$ haddock. The only other import has beon 94 tierces Halıfax curo per S.S. 'rrinidall, which mas disposed of in lots at 823. Dealers are only moderatoly supplied, and with a fair consumption going on there ought to be room for further supplies shortly. There have been no recent landings of pickled tish, and good mackerel and horring would sell readily." JBoston, Septomber 9.-"The mackerel market has been very firm all this week. Small mackerel have advanced to $\$ 11$ yer bbl. N. S. plain large 3's have sold at $\$ 17.50$. All good lots of P. E: Island mackerel have beon sold at about $\$ 21$. The weok closes with a good demand. We quote the market on Island mackorel as follows:-No. 3 319, No. 2 $\$ 21$ to $\$ 22$, No. $1 \$ 23$ to $\$ 24$, extra No. 1 \$ 25 to $\$ 27 . "$ Havana, August 29.-" The demand for codfish has been unusually good, and all the markotable fish loft over from last meek, togothor with now landlugs, bapo beon
sold at $\$ 7$ to $\$ 7.25$. Sicco last lhursday a splendid opportunity to push sweated and poor cundition fish has boon presonted, and has boen takon advantage of. Theso ehould bo but little codtrsh of any kind on the wharf when the noxt receipts come to hand. Haddock, on the other hand, was nover duller, and thero have cen vory fow drums sold. We quoto 8037 ! to $\$ \bar{i} .50$ with downward tendency, uuloss shipments are decrased. Hake has moved 80 well at 85.25 , and sales hava tison so largo, that wo havo decided to put our pice nt $\$ 5.37!$ to $\$ 5.50$. Wo hope to seo theso prices rulo tho coming weok. The market for Norwegian codfish is dull at $\$ 8.75$. Demerara, August 13.-"The markot for fith is in a most unsstisfactory etate. The inports of last nunth, in addition tu the heavy balances carriad from Juiy, aro equal to supply all requiramont until tho und of October, While thu high prices hava to a large oxtont checked consump: ©on."

## MINING.

Advices from the Coxheath Copper Mines up to Sopt. Ind have been reccived at tho Liostov office of the Eisstera Dovelopment Co.

The rives from tho $18 t$ fect level of voin B is in bigh grado oro and is down 40 feot; in sinking the last 10 fect the vein has widenod over 3 feot, making this vein, at that depth, 13 foct ride. Voin $B$ is so powerful a fissure that it is wore than likely it will maintain its width at thls point for a considorablo depth and lougth. The cross cut at 200 foel from the shaft torsards vein 13 is looking promising, and has cut several natrows stringors of gecol ore. Tho pipe line for sir drills is comploted up to the nerp voin on the mountain, also down to No. 1 shaft and is connoctod with the tunnel into the hill, which is half way betwoon shafes Nos. 1 and 2. Tho two shafts being 1,000 feot apart this tunnol is designed to cut veins $C$ and $D$ and prove their continuance eastirard. A tunnol to be driven south into the mountain will soon be started 2,000 fect to the west of shaft No. 2 to prove tho strongth of the restern oxteusion of the parallel voins that have beon cut underground by the main cross cut frem shaft No. 2 and which havo been traced by promising surface cropping westivard. When this work is comploted and the gouth cross.cut from No. 1 shaft drivon into the mountain, as recommended by Messrs. Firancis and liumbert in their recent reports, the sitrougth of tho four parallel veins $A, B, C$ and $D$ will be thoroughly demonstrated for 3,500 feat in lenath. The new voin opaned up on the surface for nearly 1,000 feet is in sddition to the abovo; and is also a yowerful fissure, showiog ore on surface at soveral points from 6 to 13 feet in width, 50 that the prospects of the Coxbeath becoming a very large producer in time is exceedingly bright.
N. B. Mining Notes.-It is so long since I havo contributed any itoms to your columns that you will think I hava dosertei you, but not so. Moving about considerably and pressure of other mattors has provented.

There aro wany rumoro of miniog affirs in Now lifunswich, but the boom is slow in coming as it has to you in N. S., nevertheless thoso who Fatch the sigus of the times cirefully see a bright fature for the mining industries of N. L .

To commonce with I may say that the production and shipment of manganeso from the well known Markhamvillo mines continues regularly.

The deposit of manganese recently purchasod for the Crimora manganose Co. of the $\mathrm{L} . \mathrm{S}$. in Albort County, is expected to tarn out a bonamzs for the owners.

This deposit is in the form of a powder ur sand said to contain a paying percentago of manganose, and work is now going on proparatory to shipping it in lario quantitics. Drying kilns aro being erected and a branch of the Albert lailiray is being constructed to the doposit. It is said there are huddreds of thousands of tods in some places the deposit is fully 30 fee: thick.

Dr. Chandlor and sorne Moncion friends are engaged in devoloping a property near $\mathrm{Ei} / \mathrm{gin}$, in Albott Co. It is said the indications aro very prowising.

At ( gusco American capitalists are engaged in nuniag manganose, and it is said to exist in good quastity. Recently soma naw machinery has boen pleced on this property.

At Woodstock the stockholders of the lifitton Silver Miue are doveloping thoir property and ase determined to seo what the final rosult will bo. A good let of mathinory is on the mine aud it is bsios energotically and systematically devoloped.

Near St. Stophen a valuzble and largo deposit of iron and copper pyrites is roported. It is said the ore runs high in sulphur for purposes of sulphuric acid and alzo yiohds 4 per cent copper.

When the Tobiquo Valley railatay is cumpleted the immenso deposits of plasier on the Tobique will bo viforvusly worked, sad will prove a formidablo compotior with Windsor and the Albert plasier mines.

Prospecting for gold is being carried on in soveral places in N. 13. I am informed that on a branch of the Tobique somo pritios, who hive for somo yeari past been prospocting, havo pu: up as smail crushing plani. What cesults ato is no: known so fir. I am in receip: of facis snd infurcostion of a well defined vein in a certain section of the l'rowince which is betwecn 6 and 7 feot wide. sianass of tho simo show from 36 ozs. of silfor and 102.15 dwhs gold to 57 ozt. silvor and 1 oz 10 dwis. gold. This oughi su altrict tho attention of cipitalists. If you know of any porson, or any of yeur readers do, who woold like to go into this, I mean genuido Twna file business promplly, I think matters might bo put in reasonzble shapo with the ownera for basiness.

Silver lead ores were found atd woried in the neighborhcod for some munthis bofore the preseut center of atrraction was much thought of. Now the o!d places are forgotton, aud if worked at all are worked in a very deenltory fashion. Thegreat mine is that of the llrokeu lill Proprictory Company. It was first taken up by a boundary rider who thought ho kad found a mountain of tin. He secured sevecu blocks, esch 20 cisains square. They wero numbered blocks $10,11,12,13,14,15$, aud 16 . The compary now holds blucks 11,12 and 13 . Block it was first floated in tine oolonios, then 15 and 16 were placed in England and called the British Iroken Ifill Proprictary Company and last bloct 10 tras put on the market. An original share in ihe lisolen Hill D'roprictary Company has received to dato $£ 145$ 10s. in dividende and bonuses, wad shares of the nomian value of slot. Tho price at which thoy wero first pu on the markel aias $£ 9$ 10s. These shares havo been divided ints 60 , whieth are now saleable at $£ 13$ each, or sifi for an original share. The first owners of the mino were not very well pleased with their proper:yg at tho beginniug, and, it is said, two who owned une fourteenth each played a gamo of cuchre to seo who would take tho other's share and pay up the calls which wero beiog regularls made, tho money being spent in sinking a shaft on the immenso manganic iron untcroy. The assays made of stuff from this mine wero poor until ouc day chloride of silver tas found and then carbonato of lead. From that time on orery devolopment has been good, until now the output of the furmaces is 400 to 500 tods of lead and 150,000 ounces of silver per weck. At the half-yearly meetiog held in Molbuurac, on July 25, the chairman stated that tho total yield to dato had been $17,913,518$ ounces of silres ( 545 tons of $2,-$ 250 lbs asch), and 71,056 tons of lesd. There ts uo lav of cure, aud the conditions essential to curo ate :he conlitions ossential for tho presorvation of hoalth. With r. ferecee to madiested inhalitious, a curtain patented variely of which you strorgly recommend, I am of the opinion that tho atmosphero just as the all wise 're ator compounde ' it, or the purest and least vitistad air oltainable, is the resy best mediciua for the lung and all diseasos of tho luags. Oxygen in excess, or nittigen in excess, or anything in excess of or in addition to tho normal annosphero is idjuilous.

It is no: I glote, or I as the roprosuntative of a heterodex or "irregular" schoul of medicino, who am opposed to drug modication, or who place reliauce entirely upon tho remodial poser of Naturo. The venorable Joseph M. Smin M. D., a professor in the Now York Collego of phasicians and surgeo..s, says "drugs do not curo diseaso, disesso is alvays cured by tho ris medicatix na'ura. Another professor of the same college, Dr. Alox. Stevens, says "The older physicians krow the moro skeptical they become of the viriurs of medicine:, and the znore thoy are disposed to trust to the powers of Naure." l'rofessor Nlouz., Clarko N. D. says "all of our curstive agents are poisons, and, as a consequenco, overy dose diminishos the pationt's vitality "" and agaio, "Many different remedies have been tried for the curo of consumption. We must rely on hygiene."

Unfortunately for myself as a caterer for my correspondents, and for the fow friunds to whom I vrite, on my hu'sbics I am not entertainias, and off of them an scarcoly atay good at all. The papers aro full of news of orery description which you get as frosh almost ns your braikfast rolls.

What most delights me here in tho city is music, of wisich one can have their fill, if indecd it is pissible for one who loves musia to got unough of it. The buads are all good, and all dispense their goodnesa litorally; but, whito I have neither desiro nor ability for critics compsrisous, I am particulariy pieased with the proficioncy of the bind of the 63 rd Voluateor Rifos, which has, I think, greatly impröed since last Docembor, whon I first hoard it. A fow days afternards B - receivod a letter from a Boston law firm, which has resulted ic his establishing a legal claim to a small fortane, being moncy and accamalated interest left for his bnnofit by his futher some tronty-five yoars ago. II - wrote that ho has yieldod to the importunitics of an linglish gentleunad, to whom ho inss sold his farm at a good advanco on cost, and will probably return to this city. You could not do better than follow his example; then, instead of long lotters Fo should bava loog talks
