BY-LAWS.

BY-LAW NO. 591.

A BY-LAW to Amend By-Law re Physician for Industrial Home.

WHEREAS it is necessary and expedient to amend By-law No. 526 of this Council ;

Therefore be it enacted, and it is hereby enacted, by the authority of the Municipal Council of the County of Welland, that the said By-law be amended by the insertion of the following clause after the word "observations," in that part of said By-law defining the duties of the Physician :

"He shall be required to act as one of the Medical Examiners to make the examinations of insane persons whom it may be necessary to remove from the said House of Industry to any Provincial Asylum."

BY-LAW NO. 592.

A BY-LAW to raise a sum of money by Assessment, in aid of Public Schools in the Townships in the County of Welland, for the year 1892.

WHEREAS, the Standing Committee on Education, in and by their report, recommended that the sums therein mentioned be raised the current year in the several townships in aid of Public Schools ;

And whereas the Corporation of the County of Welland desires to carry such recommendation into effect, and enacts as follows :

That there shall be levied and collected in the several Townships within the County of Welland, the current year, for payment of legally qualified teachers of Public Schools therein, the sums hereinafter named, which said sums so to be raised shall be over and above and in addition to all other rates whatsoever, in the manner and within the time limited and appointed by law for levying and collecting taxes generally, and shall be paid over to the Sub-Treasurers for the said townships in which the same is raised, on or before the 14th day of December next, or on or before such other day as shall be fixed in any by-law of such township which may be passed fixing the time when the Collectors shall pay over their collections and return their rolls, that is to say :

BY-LAW NO. 593.

A BY-LAW to establish the Equalized Value of Assessed Property in the County of Welland, for the purpose of imposing County rates for the year.

WHEREAS, it is necessary and expedient to establish by by-law what shall be the equalized value of assessed property in the several Municipalities comprising the County of Welland :

Be it therefore enacted by the Corporation of the County of Welland, and it is hereby enacted, that the sums set down in the first column shall be the number of acres assessed ; the sums set down in the second column, the assessed value of real estate ; the sums set down in the third column, the assessed value of personal property ; the sums set down in the fourth column, the total assessed value of real estate and personal property, and the sums extended in the fifth column shall be the equalized value of the various municipalities comprising the County of Welland, for the purpose of imposing County rates for the current year :—

WELLAND, June 3, 1892.

To the Warden and Councillors of the County of Welland, in Council Assembled:

GENTLEMEN,—

Your Special Committee appointed to report upon the statement made by Treasurer Hobson regarding the commitment of vagrants in this County, beg leave to report :

First.—That the cost of arrest and conviction of vagrants during the past four months has been about the same as the cost for the first four months of 1891.

Second.—That the decrease of cost for arrest and committal of tramps in Welland Town alone has materially decreased, showing a saving of \$47.62.

Third.—But we find that the committals from Humberstone have increased about twenty in number, and costing an extra \$51.00. Of these twenty committals eleven were recommitted almost immediately after being released from gaol. We are also informed that some of these committals were not legally made, one magistrate only

having acted in each case, whereas two are required by law in some cases.

In view of the above facts we are of the opinion that the new By-law *re* vagrants has not had a fair trial, and your Committee would recommend that the By-law be continued in force.

SPECIFICATIONS FOR ADDITION, TO BARN.

The addition to be built at the south end of the present barn, and to set on a stone wall 18 inches in thickness, sunk two feet six inches in the ground and rising six inches above the ground, laid in cement. The girts are to be mortised into the posts of the present building, and the purlin plates and main plates spliced on the same timbers in the present barn, and the whole framed securely together.

The sills to be 8 x 12 inches.

The posts to be 8 x 8, and of a sufficient height to bring the roof on a level with that of the present building.

The beams to be 8 x 8 inches.

The plates to be 8 x 8 "

The purlin plates to be. 6 x 6 "

The girths to be. 6 x 6 "

The studding to be . . . 2 x 4 "

The braces to be. 3 x 4 "

The purlin posts to be. 6 x 6 "

The purlin braces to be 4 x 4 "

The joists to be 2 x 10 "

The rafters to be 2 x 4 "

There are to be two rows of girths, both braced. All of the above timbers are to be of good sound pine, free from rot and shakes.

The ground floor is to contain a stable, 12 x 30, studded and

lined with good inch matched lumber, except the partition on the north end, which is to be made of plank lined in the same way. The stable to be divided, as shewn on plan, and to be floored with cement 3 inches in thickness, and the stalls floored with good two-inch pine plank over cement.

The remainder of the ground floor is to be a driving room for wagons, and with an earth floor.

The second floor to be laid with a double thickness of good sound pine boards, free from loose knots and shakes. The space from the sills of the present barn to this floor is to be boarded up with a single thickness of good, sound pine boards, free from loose knots and shakes.

The boards on the south end of the present barn are to be taken off and used as far as practicable on the south end of the addition.

The outside of the entire addition is to be boarded and battened with good, sound dressed pine lumber, free from loose knots and shakes.

The roof to be composed of XXX shingles laid not more than five inches to the weather.

The sheeting to be of good pine lumber.

Gutters to be put on the addition of the same size and description as on the present building, and to be joined on to them.

Doors and windows to be placed where shewn on plan. Doors to be made of matched lumber not over 6 inches wide, dressed one side, double thickness, well nailed together with wire nails proper length to make a nice clinch outside boards to be inside crosswise, and hung on rollers; large door to have five-inch rollers, small doors four-inch rollers, all well bolted to doors; caps to be placed over outside doors at the east; the cap not to be less than five-inch and large enough to cover door when open. Small door on west side cap not less than five inches wide and of sufficient length to cover door when open. Door in south end to be made an ordinary batten door, hinge with strap hinges and hook inside with cap five inches

wide ; size of this door, 4 feet wide and 4 feet high ; other outside door to have iron hooks at bottom to serve as guides to keep door to place while sliding ; also to have hasp and staples. Windows to be placed where shewn on plan—two windows in south to slide down in between studding, where there shall be a pocket made to receive them, with proper fastening to keep them up to place when raised. West window to be an ordinary 4-light window, with sash in two pieces. Circle window in south end of present barn to be moved in end of addition. The bolts in sills to be one inch round iron, not less than eight inches in wall, and to go through sill, with nut and washer on top.

The new part is to be 30 feet long to the south end of present barn and same width as present barn.

COPY OF CONTRACT.

THIS AGREEMENT, made in duplicate this 15th day of March, 1892,

BETWEEN George Ellsworth, of the Town of Welland, in the County of Welland, and Province of Ontario, Carpenter, of the first part, and the Municipal Corporation of the County of Welland, hereinafter called the Corporation of the second part.

WHEREAS, the said Corporation has declared it necessary and expedient to erect an addition to present barn upon Industrial Farm, and the party of the first part having been awarded the contract for the erection of a certain addition upon the said Industrial Farm, has undertaken and agreed to do said work.

Now this Indenture witnesseth that the said party of the first part, in consideration of the sum of four hundred and twenty-five dollars of lawful money of Canada, to be paid to him as hereinafter mentioned, doth hereby for himself, his heirs, executors, administrators and assigns, covenant and agree to and with the said Corporation that he, the said party of the first part, his heirs, executors, administrators and assigns, shall and will execute and perform all the

work of every kind required in the erection and completion in a good and workmanlike manner of such addition to present barn. And to furnish all material therefor, save and except such stone as may be at present collected on the premises.

The said addition to present barn to be erected at the south end of present barn, on that part of lot No. 250, of the Township of Thorold, in the said County, marked out by the Home Committee in charge of the said work appointed by the said Corporation.

The said barn to be erected according to plans and specifications prepared and signed by the Warden of the said County, and by the said party of the first part.

Which said plans and specifications are hereby expressly declared to be incorporated in and to form part of this agreement as if the same had been embodied herein, and the said work shall in all things be performed and completed according to the aforesaid plans and specifications after the manner therein set forth and explained to the entire satisfaction of the said Committee or other person who may succeed them in charge of the said work ; and that the said party of the first part, his heirs, executors, administrators, and assigns, and each and every one of his or their workmen, agents and servants, shall in all things concerning the performance of the said work obey, abide by, keep and perform all the several conditions set forth in the said plans and specifications.

And the said party of the first part, and the said Corporation, do hereby covenant and agree, the one with the other of them, that all differences which shall or may, during the continuance of this contract, arise as to the meaning or intention of any part of the plans or specifications already or hereafter to be provided, or which shall or may arise, or be caused between the said parties by reason of this contract during the continuance thereof, when and so often as the same shall happen, shall be referred to the award order and determination of the said committee or other persons who may succeed

them in charge of the said work, whose award in writing under his hand concerning all matters so to be referred shall be final, and the said party of the first part further covenants and agrees to commence the erection of said addition to present barn not later than the first day of March, 1892, and to have the same fully completed in accordance with the aforesaid mentioned conditions and to the approval of the said Committee, or their successors, on or before the 15th day of May, 1892, under a penalty of five dollars per day, which is hereby mutually agreed to be taken and considered as liquidated damages for every day beyond the said 15th day of May the said work shall remain incomplete.

And the said party of the first part agrees to furnish on or before the first day of March, 1892, security in the sum of \$500 for the due and proper fulfilment and carrying out of all the terms of this agreement according to its true intent and meaning, which said security shall be to the approval of the Committee upon House of Industry appointed by the Council of said Corporation.

And for the consideration aforesaid the said Corporation agrees to pay the party of the first part the said sum of \$425, payment to be made by instalments as such work progresses, less 10% of the amount thereof, as follows :

When the frame work is completed, roof on and building enclosed, the sum of \$200.

When the building is completed the sum of \$140.

No such payment to be made except on the written certificate of the Chairman of Committee in charge, that such above specified portions of the work are fully and satisfactorily completed.

SPECIFICATIONS FOR HOSPITAL IN CONNECTION WITH THE WELLAND
COUNTY INDUSTRIAL HOME.

Contract: The contract will include all work required to be done, and materials used, in the construction of the above named brick building, to fully complete the same in accordance with the accompanying plans, and as called for in this specification.

MASON WORK.

Excavation: Excavate the ground as required for the cellar and foundation walls, piers, drains, &c. All surface soil to be put to one side for future use as directed. Fill in and ram the earth around the walls, &c., when directed, and use superfluous earth in levelling and grading around the building.

Drain: Lay a 4-inch vitrified socket tile drain from cellar to a proper outlet, say a distance of 60 feet. Pipes for drain to be first-class, and cemented in best manner, laid true to grade that may be given, and leave cellar 6 inches below the bottom. Connect in approved manner all conductors from gutters with cellar drain, the tile to extend above surface of ground. Provide all necessary bends or curves or Y's.

Stone Walls: The foundation walls and piers to have footings projecting 4 inches on each side of wall above, and no stone to be less than half the total width of footing. The walls to be carried up to the height shown, in good rubble masonry composed of approved quarry stone of the best quality, bedded on their broadest faces and well bonded together, laid up with mortar composed of one part of approved Thorold or Queenston cement and three parts of clean

sharp sand. Each layer to be well filled up and joints on both sides neatly struck with the trowel. The portion of stone wall above grade line, in front, to be neatly tape pointed.

All stone and brick work to be perfectly plumb level and out of wind.

Stone Sills: Provide and set sills 6x9 inches to cellar windows, and 5x9 inches for all other windows, and 7x10 inches for outside doors. All sills to be weathered and fine tooled, except for cellar windows. All sills to be of uniform color, and of approved sound, compact limestone. Provide and fix brace for chimney and 4 wrought iron anchors, also 2 cast iron ventilators, 6x8 inches, in foundation walls.

Cementing: Concrete the cellar bottom with sand, gravel, or broken stone, and approved Thorold or Queenston cement, 3 inches thick, well rammed, and float off the surface with Portland cement, having a slight fall to the cellar drain. Make a depression of about one inch next to cellar wall all round.

Piers, &c.: Build brick piers where shown 16x16 inches and 8-inch brick cellar wall of hard clinker brick, laid in cement mortar, with neat struck joints.

Brickwork: All face bricks to be hard burnt, solid and well shaped, and of uniform color. Inside of walls to be good well shaped brick, mortar for which work in walls and chimney to be composed of one part of approved lime and two parts of clean sharp sand, or in such other proportions as the superintendent may direct. All to be well mixed with good clean water, and not used until a week old. All bricks to be solid bedded and joints well flushed solid with mortar. Front of building to have continuous stretchers externally, sides and rear to be English bond, with headers every fifth course. Joints to be as close as possible and neatly pointed and struck. All brickwork to be well bonded together and outside of wall left clean. All external walls to be built up as shown on plans and well pointed under roof boards and around all openings. Turn

arches over all openings in approved manner. Arches over cellar windows to be in two half brick rims.

Chimney : Carry up chimney as shown ; joints to be well filled and flues plastered smooth inside. Build in chimney all necessary iron pipe rings, and at bottom of smoke flue a cast iron soot door. Leave 8x8 inch opening in ventilating flue for bottom and top of each ward and room in both stories. Chimney to be capped with 5-inch dressed stone cap, as shown in drawings. Provide and fix japanned registers with valves as follows (for ventilation) in base of first story ward : Register with 65 square inch area in base of first story room ; register with area of 38 inches in base of second story ward ; register with area of 30 inches and in base second story room ; register with 20 square inch opening, and at top of each room and ward provide and fix ventilating registers properly connected with flue by boxing and trimming of joists, or openings in walls ; registers above of half the area of those in bottom of rooms. All ventilating registers to be properly connected with ventilating flue.

Lath : The inner face of all outside walls, all partitions, ceilings, soffit of stairs and all places usually lathed with sawn pine laths 1 inch wide for ceiling and $1\frac{1}{4}$ inch for walls, 5-16 inch apart, ends butted and joints broken every 18 inches.

Plaster : All places lathed to be plastered with best two coat work, hard white finish. The first coat to be continued behind base trimmings, &c.

CARPENTER AND JOINER WORK.

The lumber for the carpenter's work to be of good description of white pine, well seasoned, free from shakes, loose or large knots, or other imperfections that would impair its strength or durability, and to hold the full sizes shown or specified, when fixed in the building. The joiner's work to be of clear white pine, thoroughly seasoned. Provide and fix all necessary centerings and turning pieces. Provide and fix lintels to all openings of doors or windows 4x4 inches, and resting 6 inches on walls on each side. Provide strips

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$2\frac{1}{2} \times \frac{1}{2}$ inch, to be built into walls under bearings of joists and elsewhere as required for fixing trimmings of doors, windows and other furnishings, and at every 2 feet in height in outer walls, on which to nail battens. Batten all outer walls with $2 \times 1\frac{1}{4}$ inches battens at 16 inches centres. Provide proper grounds for fixing trimmings.

First floor joists to be 2×12 inches, second floor joists to be 2×10 inches. All joists to be at 16 inches centres, properly trimmed at chimney, stair, well, &c. Trimmers to be 4 inches thick, or double 2 inches, and framed with double tenons. Put a 2×2 inches herring bone strutting to each bearing of joists on both floors. Rafters to be 6×2 inches, at 16 inches centres, and hips $2\frac{1}{2} \times 8$ inches, plates $8 \times 2\frac{1}{2}$ inches, 5×10 inches; purlines and truss timbers 6×8 inches. Main beams for first floor 8×12 inches, for second floor 8×10 inches. Piers to be capped with 3 inches dry, sound oak cap. Beams to be in not more than two pieces. Roof to be sheeted with dressed $\frac{7}{8}$ inches boards, not more than 7 inches in width, free from loose knots, shakes, or sap, well nailed. Put saddle behind chimney boarded as roof. Put dressed fascia to eaves and bed mouldings as shown.

Joists to be tenoned into beams as shown, and well spiked, and also supported by 2×2 inches fillet, well spiked to joists. Second story ceiling joists to be 2×6 inches and 2×8 inches, at 16 inches centres, well spiked to roof truss and supported by 1×1 inch fillet besides tenon.

Rafters to be well spiked to plate and purlines. Plates to be strapped to joists at intervals of 3 feet by 1 inch boards, 7 inches wide, extending across building. All bolts in roof trusses to be $\frac{3}{4}$ inches, and have large head, washers and nut. Trusses to be stiffened by uprights 4×6 inches.

Partition: Build partitions where shown on plans. Studding to be size marked on plans, 16 inches centres, with cap and bottom piece, bridged once in height. Studs to be doubled around all openings. All partitions to be straight, true and perfectly plumb.

All to be well nailed. Put in blocks at bottom of door studs to make end nailing for bases.

Floors : Floors to be laid with $\frac{7}{8}$ inches dressed, tongued and grooved seasoned flooring. To be well fitted and thoroughly smooth, blind nailed at every joist. Floors to be level throughout, and no board to be wider than 5 inches.

Stair : Main stair to be built on $1\frac{3}{4}$ inches moulded strings, $1\frac{3}{8}$ inches wall strings ; to have $1\frac{3}{8}$ treads, rounded nosings, $\frac{7}{8}$ inches riser, 7 inches square and turned newel at foot, and 5 inches square and turned newel at top ; 2x4 inches moulded rail and $1\frac{3}{4}$ inches square and turned balusters. Newels, balusters and rail to be clear seasoned ash, birch or cherry. Cellar stairs to have $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches treads and 2 inches rough stringers.

Steps : Construct steps to front door as shown, treads $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch, risers $\frac{7}{8}$ inch, 2-inch strings, sides finished with dressed stuff as shown. Steps to be as required, whether shown on drawings or not.

Base : Hall and all rooms to have 10-inch moulded base, $\frac{7}{8}$ inch thick, properly scribed to floors and nailed to proper grounds. Nail fillet to floor at base. Trim and do all cutting that may be required for registers, pipes, &c.

Windows : Cellar windows to have $1\frac{3}{4}$ rebated frames and $1\frac{3}{8}$ inches sash. Hang with butts and fastened with bolts and fitted with hook and staple to fasten open.

Sash and Frames : All windows above cellar to have $1\frac{3}{4}$ inch solid frames, 2 inch sills, $\frac{1}{2}$ inch parting strip. All frames to have weather strip planted on and be carefully bedded in mortar. Sash to be $1\frac{5}{8}$ inch, moulded, and fitted with Byam's sash fasteners, lifts and locks.

Trim : Fix moulded architraves around all doors and windows on inside 5 inches wide, with moulded corner and base blocks. Window stools made to lap on window sills, and finish with nosing and cove.

Doors : Doors to be of sizes marked on floor plans, and have rebated frames. Front door to be hung with three 5x5 inch plain bronze butts. To have bronze knobs and 6 inch mortise locks, night attachments and three keys, and have bronze front and striking plates. All remaining doors to be hung with three 3x3 inch loose pin butts and approved rim locks and white porcelain knobs. Front door to be panelled as shown and moulded both sides ; all other doors to be ordinary four panelled solid moulded. Two doors inside to have glazed fanlight in rebated frames, fastened with hinges and secured by bolt.

Side of hall in first story under stairway to be sheeted with 3 inch beaded battens.

Cold air duct in outer wall to have 2 inch frame and be protected on outside with stout wire, having $\frac{1}{4}$ inch mesh and well secured.

Provide and fix one dry sound white ash pillar where shown on plans 9x9 inch, chamfered.

PAINTING AND GLAZING.

Painting : The whole of the internal and external dressed woodwork usually painted, including outside steps, also inside of gutters, to be painted three coats of best white lead and linseed oil to approved tints, unless otherwise specified. The work to be properly knotted and stopped. The stair rail, newel and balusters to receive one coat of oil filler, one coat of shellac varnish and one coat of hard oil finish.

Glazing : The whole of the windows and fanlights to be glazed with double diamond glass, to be well puttied, back puttied and bradded ; the whole of the sashes to be primed before glazing. All glass to be left clean and whole at the finish. Clean windows and scrub floors before and after painting, and put in sashes when directed.

TINSMITH'S WORK.

The tinsmith to cover the entire roof with one thickness of tarred

roofing felt, well lapped, and galvanized iron shingles, "A1-ska," or other approved pattern (No. 28 gauge), all properly locked and strongly nailed with wire nails; finish all hips and ridges with 2 inch rolls. Put gutters along all eaves of 12 inch galvanized iron properly locked and bolted. Provide and fix two 3 inch down pipes, galvanized iron, (No. 28 gauge), soldered and riveted, properly connected with gutters, secured to walls with iron holdfasts, and extending to surface of ground. Provide and properly fix in position 13 feet of 20 inch iron cresting (No. 4, Tilsonburg) and three corner posts (No. 2, Tilsonbug), or other approved pattern.

HEATER.

Furnish and erect in a good substantial manner a hot air furnace with 20 inch circular fire pot and radiators, all cast iron, guaranteed capable of heating the entire building. Furnace to be double cased with galvanized iron, and provided with the necessary pipes for conducting the hot air to the four registers shown on plans. Pipes to be of following sizes: To ward in second story, 8 inch; to room in second story, 7 inch; to ward in first story, 10 inch; to room in first story, 8 inch. All hot air pipes to be of bright IX charcoal tin and have proper dampers near furnace. The smoke pipe to be 8 inch of galvanized iron (No. 26 gauge) riveted and provided with proper damper. Leave apparatus in perfect working order.

Construct 10x16 inch cold air duct from outside wall to furnace, also from cold air register in hall to furnace, of dry 1 inch matched stuff, both to be provided with valves.

Provide the four hot air registers and one cold air register shown on plans. All registers to be black japanned bordered and have valves.

CONDITIONS.

The contractor is to furnish all transportation, material, labor, scaffolding, and all tools for completing the whole of his contract according to the true intent and meaning of the drawings and specifications, and where anything is only shown in the drawings, or

mentioned in the specifications, the same is to be completed as if both shown in the drawings and referred to in the specifications. These specifications and drawings are intended to include everything necessary to the entire finishing the whole building, and the same shall be furnished whether particularly specified therein or not. Should separate contracts be let, each contractor to furnish everything necessary to fully carry out his contract, if not otherwise specified.

All work when finished is to be delivered up in an undamaged state, to the full satisfaction of the Committee or Superintendent.

Should the contractor do any part of the work not in accordance with specifications the same must be made good by him at his own expense. Should any inconsistency appear in the plans or specifications, the contractor must notify the architect, who will make proper adjustment.

The Committee or Superintendent may order any change not increasing the cost, as the change in position of a door, window, partition, register, &c.

The contractor to be responsible for all damage to the County property, or the person or property of the public by himself or his men. The contractor to protect his work in a proper manner until the building is finished, and leave the whole broom clean and the County premises free from rubbish.

The contractor to enter into a bond with two approved sureties for the due performance of the contract.

Payments will be made on certificate of Superintendent, less 15 per cent, which will be paid one month after acceptance of work.

Extra work ordered by the Superintendent to be done, as such will be paid for on the basis of the actual cost of the work and of 10 per cent. added thereto.

No work will be considered as accepted until the final completion of the contract, although estimates are made thereon.

Plans to be returned to the architect.

Contractors tendering for this work may tender as follows :

1. To complete all work called for.
2. For work included under the heading of "Tinsmith Work" alone.
3. For work included under heading of "Heater" alone.
4. For all work excepting that included under the heading of "Heater."

All work to be completed three months after contract is let, under a penalty of two dollars per day for each day's delay after that time.

Each tender to be accompanied with a deposit of 3 per cent. of amount of tender, which sum will be returned to the unsuccessful tenderers when contract is awarded, and to successful tenderer when contract is made and bond given. The deposit of any tenderer refusing to sign contract and bond when requested to do so will be forfeited to the County of Welland.

To the Warden and Council of the County of Welland :

Your Committee beg leave to recommend that in the event of your Council deciding to lay a main to the Industrial Home to connect with the Welland waterworks, that a four-inch Standard cast iron pipe be used, for laying which the tender of John Gross & Son, being \$1,100, is the lowest.

The cost of the pipe only would be between \$700 and 750 ; the cost of lead for joints would be perhaps \$40. We are informed that the excavating and filling may be advantageously performed by prison labor, under the supervision of Turnkey Mains, and a considerable saving effected thereby to the County.

Mr. G. A. Ellsworth, having completed the addition to the barn, we recommend that the Warden do issue his cheque for \$382.50, being 90 per cent. of the amount of his contract.

Your Committee would further recommend that the new hospital be located near the site of the present one.

Both in the rural sections and in the incorporated villages, in the large heavy schools and in the smaller ones, good order and discipline usually prevails, and while in the case of schools under the management of the younger and less experienced teachers points may be observable in which there is room for improvement, there are schools in which nothing appears to be wanting.

STATE OF PROFICIENCY :

From a variety of causes, the state of proficiency varies, and not only in the different schools, but occasionally in the same school, from time to time. Most of the schools, however, are able to show a state of proficiency varying from middling to good or excellent, and while on the one hand there are instances of an inferior grade, there are on the other hand schools in which the state of proficiency is excellent in the subjects generally.

Among the subjects to which the attention of teachers has been more particularly called is that of English grammar. As a very small percentage of pupils ever go beyond the fourth-class, it is important that by the time they get through that class they should be able to speak and write their own language correctly. To accomplish this object it is necessary that the subject of English grammar should occupy a primary place on the school programme and receive proper attention throughout the pupils' course.

COUNTY MODEL SCHOOL :

At the last session of the County Model School 14 teachers in training were in attendance. At the end of the session an examination was held, which was conducted partly on paper, and consisted, partly in the practical teaching of classes before the County Board of Examiners. The result of the examination, together with the report of the principal, satisfied the Board that all the teachers in training were worthy of certificates, which were accordingly granted to all of them.

As a factor in our educational system, the importance of the County Model School can hardly be over-estimated. It is there that

those who are to conduct the Public Schools of the County are instructed in the theory, and practice of teaching, and in the best methods of presenting the different subjects of the curriculum to their pupils.

The æsthetic influence, also, of the County Model School will be more or less felt in the Public Schools of the County. Whatever, therefore, is calculated to place the County Model School upon a better footing, and enable it to accomplish its mission to the utmost, deserves the most attentive consideration. The County Board of Examiners have from time to time expressed their dissatisfaction with the accommodations and the surroundings, and have advocated a new site and suitable buildings. Owing, however, to the present demands upon the finances of the town, their proposition has not as yet been carried into effect.
