LONDON, July 26 .- (Can. Press)-The attempt of Joseph/ Havelock Wilson, president of the International Seaman's Union, to organize a national strike of transport workers in support of the striking London dockmen, has failed. It is expected that the failure of Mr. Wilson will lead to an early resumption of work on the London docks.



Their story is that the princess, who possessed jewery worth 8.89,000, was followed from Russia by a gang of thieves who engaged an adjoining room and enter-ed her apartments during her absence. They secured a case containing jewels valued at \$80,000, but in their hurry,

The only large robbery reported from Ostend recently was that of the Princess of Thurn and Taxis, who, it was stated, had jewels valued at \$80,000 stolen from her in a hotel there. The princess was a Miss Nicolls of Uniontown, Pa. She was divorced in Pittsburg in 1906 from Gen. Gerald Fitzgerald of Ireland, and last November, at the home of her mother in Uniontown, married Prince Victor of Thurn and Taxis, a member of the Hungarian branch of his family.

The official announcement has been made of the erection at Edmonton of a union station, costing approximately \$400,000, by the Grand Trunk Pacific and Edmonton Dunvegan and British Columbia Railways, as soon as negotiations with the municipality for the closing of certain streets have concluded. The building will have a length of four city blocks. It will be two storeys in height and will have all modern conveniences for the comfort of the traveling public. Prevision will be made for six sets of double tracks and four passenger platforms. The E., D. & B. C. Railway will operate its own freight from its own terminals. Contracts for the erection of the new \$750,000 Grand Trunk Pacific Hotel in the same place will also be awarded shortly in Montreal. When the time for receiving tenders expired on July 15, six bids had been put in, all from firms of repute throughout the Dominion, but these will require some little consideration before any announcement is made. Steel will be on hand in the Albertan capital in three months' time, and construction will be prosecuted throughout the winter as in the case of the Fort Garry at Winnipes.

Commissioner Harris reported that he had reconsidered the proposal that concrete be used, and after sending Assistant Engineer Power to investigate bridges of this construction in Philadelphia, Boston and Washington, he was more firmly convinced than ever that a steel bridge was the only possible me-thod of crossing the Don Valley. Mr. Harris again reiterated his stand that if any other material were used his department would assume no respon-sibility for the permanence of the

Don Mills Road. The Don Mills-road widening and paving question again came up, and after discussing the question the committee passed Ald. Hilton's motion that the street should be paved at a width of 24 feet instead of a 42-foot width of 24 feet instead of a 42-foot street, as had been originally recommended. According to Commissioner Harris the expense of a 42-foot street would be too great for the property-holders to bear, and at the same time he contended that it was advisable that the thorofare should be constructed at such a width. 

He had been several hundred dollars in debt, he said. He was working for an insurance company, but was being an insurance company, but was being very poorly paid. His creditors per-sistently called at the office of the company, with the result that his chances of promotion and prospects of

getting a larger salary were rlined. Owing as much as he did, he knew that he had very little chance of set-tling one account without his other creditors instantly stepping in and

seizing his furniture. After thinking the matter over for some days. Cowtan continued, he decided to adopt a ruse to gain time in which to make a new start in another position, somewhere in the country. where living would be cheaper.

Could Not Borrow. As he at that time was situated, there was no chance of borrowing any money, and he also was behind in his house rent. On the morning of Aug. 10, 1911, he put on a suit of dark clothes. Over this he put on his light business suit. After bidding his wife

and children goodby, he started off for the river.



Cream one heaping tablespoonful of butter. Bone and pound twelve sardines, add two hard cooked eggs and pound again till smooth, then add a few drops of lemon juice, a dash of paprika and a little mustard, Mix well together and spread on buttered toast. Cut into fancy shapes. Ham and Steak Roll.
