

City is Having Some Difficulty in Making a Compromise With the Company.

What the City Will Tax the Various Companies in the Meantime-Engineer's Report.

The City Legal Department is preparing County Judges in regard to the scrap-iron assessment. Mr. A. B. Aylesworth, K.C., been chosen by the Ontario government to act in conjunction with the city in fighting the judgment. It is expected some time during January, when the Legislature is meeting, and the result of the appeal can be made known to the

mpanies under the scrap-iron act, taxing the Bell Telephone Co. \$100,000, Toronto Electric Light Co. \$150,000 and Incandes cent Light Co. \$30,000. The Toronto Railway Co. assessment has not yet been fixed, as the city has been trying to arrange with the company as to the figure at which street cars should be assessed. The city placed the assessment on cars alone at \$700,000, and the judges left the matter to the parties concerned to arrange upon a ngure at which the cars should be assessed. Numerous conferences have been neid between the representatives of the Assessment Department, the Legal Department and the Street Railway Co., with a view to coming to some amicable arrangement.

a view to coming to some amicable arrangement.

The company does not want to pay taxes on more than \$450,000 for cars, and the city, altho willing to cut off \$100,000 or more from the original assessment, does not propose to take the big slump the company desires, and a stated offer was last night sent to the company, with the announcement that if it was not accepted the case would go to the courts, and evidence would be taken as to the value of cars. The company may keep up the bluff and refuse, and officials would not state definitely what was the figure mentioned by the city, but it is somewhere about \$550,000.

Bloor-Street Extension.

The idea of connecting Bloor-street and Danforth-avenue, in accordance with the motion of Ald. Oliver, is reported upon by City Engineer Rust as follows:

"The most feasible way of carrying out the proposed extension of Bloor-street east to Danforth-avenue, would be by the construction of suitable steel trestles over the Rosedale Ravine and drive and the valley of the Don River, with a bridge at the crossing of the River Don; the remainder of the work would be in cutting and embankment. Bloor-Street Extension. mainder of the work would be in cutting and embankment.

"The total length of the work would be about 5000 feet, made up of 1200 feet of steel trestle over the Rosedale Ravine and Driveway, and 1432 feet of bridge and trestle over the Don River and Valley, leaving the remaining 2368 feet to be constructed by grading and filling. The width of the trestle and bridge would be 36 feet, designed to carry two street raliway tracks with two 7-ft. sidewalks, the total width of the right-of-way being 66 feet. The estimated cost of the work, exclusive of land and damage, is \$350,000."

Equal to the Present One. The Engineer's report answers Ald. Richardson's questions re Parliament-street cars, as follows: "I am at present consulting with the company as to the best methods of meeting the wishes of the citizens in the eastern portion of the city with a view of providing a street car service equal to the present one."

Boat Railway on Island. The suggestion of Mr. Alex. Alexander, that a small boat railway be constructed on the Island from the bay to the lake, is favorably commented upon by the Engineer. It would cost between \$300 and \$400.

A brick pavement on Avenue-road, from Dupont-street to the north city limits, would cost \$1795. To cross the C. P.R. tracks at this point it will be necessary to secure the consent of the Railway Committee of the Privy Council, but the Engineer thinks the Street Railway Company should attend to that end of it.





WHAT CONSTITUTES A CARLOAD? Grain Men Desire New Standard for

The Grain Section of the Board of Trade held a special meeting yesterday afternoon In the rotunda to receive the report of the committee recommending certain changes in the bylaws relating to the terms of trade and to discuss several matters of importance to the industry. Mr. John Carrick presided, and about 25 members were present. Mr. H. N. Baird took objection present. Mr. H. N. Baird took objection to the lack of printed copies of the proposed resolutions and reports presented, and wanted to have the meeting adjourned so that, in the meantime, printed copies of the proceedings might be procured. The objection was overruled by Chairman Carrick, who contended that due notice had been given the members of the meeting and also of what would be discussed.

Secretary Wills read the report of the committee, recommending a number of committee, recommending a number of changes in the bylaws regarding terms of trade, which was adopted clause by clause.

A recommendation was also passed regarding the correct definition of carload quantities. At present a carload of Ontario grain is made up of 30,000 lbs., while of Manitoba grain it requires 40,000 lbs. Grain men want a carload of Ontario grains, such as wheat, barley, com, peas and rye, to consist of 40,000 lbs., and of outs and buckwheat to consist of 35,000 lbs. They are satisfied to have 40,000 lbs. of Man toba grains constitute a carload.

The meeting protested against the reof Man toba grains constitute a carload.

The meeting protested against the recent ruling of the Inland Revenue Department, that no measure of less capacity than a bushel is legal for the purpose of testing grain. They declare that a bushel is by far too large a measure, and will recommend to the department that a smaller one be adopted.

A resolution recommending the appointment of official weighers and car inspect. ment of otheral weighers and car inspect-ors at terminal elevators was also passed. The resolutions passed and recommenda-tions made will come before the Council of the board for consideration.
