Globe Editorial, Feb. 5 : But if a railway and the rates it charges are a matter of public concern, how much more so are the privileges connected with the development of the power of Niagara Falls? Here is one of the great assets of the Province. If it were dec to grant them to a private company, surely the commonest prudence would have suggested that the government should retain the most absolute control over the rates to be charged consumers, and in order to arrive at a knowledge of what the rate should be, it would be necessary to know what was the actual investment in the enterprise, not the watered investment, with which we are too familiar. If any of these precautions were taken we have not heard of them.

This company is to take over the assets of a smaller company of the same owners previously organized.







There are a number of islands at the entrance of Portland harbor, and these have been used by the army in its system of defence. Six forts have been established for Portland's protection.
