JOKAI IS MAURIC. Budapest, May 5.—Mauric Jokai, the distinguished Hungarian novelist, journalist and politician, who was recently reported to be seriously ill from influenza, died this evening. Jokai was born at Komarom, a royal free city and capital of the county of the same name, situated at the confluence of the Waag and the Danube, 46 miles west northwest of Budapest, on Feb. 19, 1825. He was educated at the royal academy of the Hungarian parliament, till 1845, and at the Calvinist College of Pecs, town in the County of Veszprem, Hungary, afterwards becoming an advocate. An ardent patriot, he took an active part in the revolution of 1848-9, under the leadership of Louis Kossuth, and in the subsequent struggle which resulted in the establishment of the republic of Deak in 1867.

At the age of forty he began the publication of the series of novels and romances, which has made him known throughout the civilized world. Among these may be specially noted "A Hungarian Nabob," a translation of which was issued in 1888, and "Black Diamonds," which appeared in English in 1886. Jokai was a prolific writer, and his works are characterized by vivacity, psychological analysis and vivid portraiture. In addition to his numerous volumes he also acted as chief editor of the Nemetz, a noted Budapest journal, and held this position down to the date of his death. Jokai was married in 1848 to Rosa Benke Laborfalvi, and a second time in 1859.

RAILROAD AND MARINE.

The Canadian Pacific Railway would be built in favor of the straightening of the tracks to the east of the Union Station, according to the statement made by the World yesterday by General Superintendent Timmerman. Since the Canadian Pacific has joint rights with the Grand Trunk over the tracks in question, the move to have them brought into alignment that would assuredly follow the acquisition of the language property by the latter is not a matter of course. The cooperation of the C.P.R. This Mr. Timmerman had no hesitation in saying would be a great relief.

He considered that beneficial results to both roads would accrue. The present mode of handling the road has had its serious disadvantages, the chief of which have been mentioned upon in order to afford accommodation. Were the tracks straightened there would be no occasion for going beyond limitations, since passenger traffic would be readily discharged to the east of the Union Station.

Between Church and the depot, the city having consented to this order being made.

It is hinted now that the C.P.R. may be authorized to build a new pier at Harbor-square, now used as a playground, which the railway would be able to utilize for the construction of freight cars.
