





SPOKANE, Wash., July 5.—Fifty thousand Danes, Norwegians and Swedes in eastern Washington and Oregon, north and central Idaho, western Montana and southeastern British Columbia are backing a movement, columbia are backing a movement, launched in Spokane, to urge upon the mother countries the importance and necessity of forming a pan-Scandinavian alliance to preserve the territorial integrity of Denmark, Norway and Sweden.
