LETHBRIDGE, Alta., July 5.—(Special.)—Not since the opening of the pre-emption land last September has there been such a rush at the land office as there was this morning.

Piute Makes Derby Record

Ketchell Wins in 20 Rounds Decision Over Billy Papke

Middleweights Battle for World's Championship at San Francisco - Winner Breaks Hand in Sixth Round.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 5.—Stanley Ketchell of Michigan is still the world's middleweight champion. In a desperate grueling battle, during which the champion was constantly on the aggressive, he was awarded the decision over Billy Papke of Illinois at the end of the twentieth round.

Referee following statement: "Ketchell was the aggressor at all times, furthermore, he landed the cleaner and harder punches and scored the only knock down in the tenth round, also nearly everybody seems to think that Papke slipped to the floor. There is absolutely no question but Ketchell earned a clean cut decision."

Both men weighed in at 11 o'clock and easily made their required weight. There was brisk betting at the ring-side. Many wagers were made at 10 to 5 with Ketchell the favorite.

Ketchell forced the fighting from the tap of the initial gong and with the exception of the third round, he was up in a trice and waded relentlessly in the first half of the battle.

When seen in his dressing room Ketchell gave out this statement: "I broke my right hand in the sixth round and later on, in the eighth round, I believe, I dislocated my thumb on my left. But for these mishaps I would have made short work of Papke. I will be only too glad to give Papke another chance."

The defeated pugilist said he would fight Ketchell at any time. Willis Britz said that unless Ketchell had improved the championship would not be able to fight Jim Flynn in Los Angeles on July 14.

FIRST FIGHT BY ROUNDS. Ketchell opened up with a right smash to the stomach, and after some wrestling, Ketchell duplicated the blow, but Ketchell's hand slipped and he landed a vicious jab to the body.

SECOND ROUND.—The men fought at close range with Ketchell forcing his man against the ropes. Ketchell landed a straight right to the jaw and a moment later slipped a similar blow to the stomach.

THIRD ROUND.—Ketchell rushed Ketchell with a straight left to the jaw and the right to the stomach. Ketchell landed a vicious jab to the body and a moment later slipped a similar blow to the stomach.

FOURTH ROUND.—Ketchell opened with a fearful left swing to the jaw. He went after his man, landing right and left swings to the jaw and body. Ketchell planted a straight right over the heart, but Papke only smiled.

FIFTH ROUND.—Ketchell met Papke's rushes with a straight left to the jaw and they clinched. The men fought bitterly every inch of the way. Papke putting in a solid right to the face.

SIXTH ROUND.—Papke rapped Ketchell on the jaw with a right uppercut. The men fought so fiercely that they fell to the floor from their exhaustion.

NEW YORK EXCHANGE CLOSED AND CANADIANS ARE STEADY

Dealings at the Toronto Stock Market Light—Usually Active Specialties Become Dull—Bank Stocks More Active.

World Office, Monday Evening, July 5. The New York Stock Market was closed to-day, but the market showed a decided decline in Canadian securities at the Toronto Stock Exchange.

The usually active specialties were quiet and especially was this the case in the South American field. The market was firm with only one sale of a broken lot, while Sao Paulo sold at the closing price of last week. The announcement of a new bond issue of Dominion Steel was without effect to the stock of this company, but the prospect of a strike on the Dominion Coal property lowered the quotations for the common stock of this concern.

Dependent on Crops. Henry Clews says: The new Lackawanna deal and the declaration of a dividend equal altogether to 150 per cent. gave increased stimulus to the stock market.

No change of an unfavorable character can be detected in the general situation. The business outlook is generally satisfactory as far as regards activity, but the prevalent disposition is to await the outcome of the harvest.

The wheat situation is better than at one time anticipated and farmers are sure of good prices, but the surplus for export is sure to be considerably curtailed, a matter of some moment in the foreign exchange market. The most unsatisfactory feature in the crop situation is the deterioration in cotton. June is usually a month of progress for this staple, but in spite of the decline, conditions still remain fairly promising.
