THE BALANCE ON THE WRONG SIDE

Canada's Imports Show An Increase While the Exports Have Declined.

Ottawa, Dec. 19.-The financial stringency is making itself felt in the trade returns. While the eight months of the fiscal year ended with November show an increase in the aggregate trade of Canada of \$22,790,313, as compared with the same time last year, this increase was en-

tirely in imports

There was a decrease in exports of \$4,-874251. About the half of this decrease was in foreign exports. Domestic exports for the eight months show about \$2,000,000 of a decrease, while the imports increased by over \$27,000,000. The output of the mine shows a decrease of about \$1,750,000, the fisheries a small increase, the forests a decrease of about \$300,000, animals and their product a decrease of over \$11,000,000, agriculture an increase of nearly \$7,000,000, manufactures an increase of \$1,250,000 as compared with the same eight months in 1906.

For the month of November there was a decrease of \$2,621,469 in imports and a decrease of \$2,455,769 in exports, compared with November, 1906.

An investigation carried on by one of the local papers during the past few days relative to the effect of the alleged hard times in Ottawa shows that only four or five cases of extreme poverty and need were found in the whole city and in each case the cause could be traced to sickness.

Many men were found out of work, but in most cases they had preferred to stay in the city, although employment could have been secured in the surrounding country. The market for skilled labor was found to be not unduly overstocked.





Is No Waste 10 Chop Them

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18—Four million Christmas trees will be in use a week from next Wednesday, according to the estimate of Gifford Pinchot, chief of the Forestry Bureau, President Roosevelt's woodchopping companion and a member of the Tennis Cabinet.

The chief forester has carefully considered the question of Christmas trees because at this season of the year he is deluged with appeals to prevent the "needless destruction of the nation's for ests by the cutting of Christmas trees." Letters pour in by the basketful and many persons take the trouble to call in person and file their protests.

Mr. Pinchot is not one of those who believe that damage is done by taking an evergreen from the hillside for the purpose of entertaining the children. He has given this subject attention for ten years and finally reached this conclusion:

CUT ALL THE TREES YOU WANT.

happiness and good of maintain as the consumption of the children and family on Christmas day.

"So far as endangering the future life of our forests is concerned, the effect is infinitesmal compared to the destruction caused by forest fires and wasteful lumbering. It is estimated that 4,000,000 Christmas trees are used in this country each year, one in every fourth family. If planted four feet apart these could be grown on less than 1,400 acres, a good size farm. You see, the amount is utterly insignificant when compared to the other great drains on the forests.

"Trees suitable for Christmas do not grow in the old forests, where reproduction is most important, but in the open. Even if serious denudation were threatened, the proper remedy would not be to stop using the trees but to adopt wiser methods. There is no more reason for an outcry against using land to grow Christmas trees than to grow flowers."

It has been found by Mr. Pinchot that the cutting of Christmas trees is perfectly compatible with the welfare of the forest. This has been demonstrated in Germany, where the consumption of Christmas trees is greater and where the most highly developed forest policy is pursued. There is scarcely a hut in Germany that has not a Christmas tree.

The chief centre of the Christmas-tree industry lies in the lage cities of the East. New York City and the New England States consume 1,500,000 trees or nearly one-half of the total output. Maine New Hampshire, the Berkshire Hills, in Massachlusetts, the Adirondacks and Catskills, in New York, are the sources of supply for New York, Boston and Philadelphia. The swamps of Michigan furnish the markets of Chicago, St. Louis and Minneapolis and Detroit. In Illinois and Ohio nursery-men supply local demands with nursery-grown Norway, spruce.


