Ethel Walker Shows That Story About Her Sister

WAS TOTALLY FALSE

Girl Supposed to be Murdered is Alive and Well in Waltham—The Fredericton Exhibition Expected to Eclipse Last Year—Big Moose Head

FREDERICTON, N. B., Sept. 26.—(Special)—Miss Ethel Walker of this city is naturally very much annoyed at the sensational report given currency by the St. John Star regarding her sister, Miss Blanche Walker. In conversation with her sister this morning she stated that she was employed in a hotel at Waltham, and she had received several letters and photographs from her during the past week and this morning a telegram came to hand stating that she was alive and well.

With two days yet to run, the attendance so far is eight thousand short of the total of two years ago. Secretary Hooper expects thirty thousand paid admissions by Wednesday night. The horse races are going on at the Driving Park, this afternoon under favorable conditions. The free-for-all race tomorrow is looked forward to with great interest. Another Mystery Young Woman Found Murdered and Mutilated in English Railway Tunnel.

LONDON, Sept. 26.—The Mertham Tunnel of the London Brighton and S.E. Railway, where the brutal murder of Fred I. Gold by Percy LeFroy, alias Mapleton, occurred June 27, 1881, has again been the scene of a mysterious tragedy, the details of which so far as ascertained are markedly similar to that of a quarter of a century ago. In the present case the victim is a young woman, Mary Mooney, whose body was horribly mutilated. A long well was dug and in her mouth, and the police are confident she was murdered in the compartment of a train on which she was traveling and her body thrown from the car. The fact that all the doors of the train on its arrival at Red Hill were closed is considered to prove conclusively that it was not a case of suicide. Miss Mooney left her home on Sunday evening saying she would not be gone long. The affair therefore is a complete mystery. No ticket was found on the body and no one has been able to explain under what circumstances the young woman entered the train or where she was going. It is supposed to be a case where the murderer disappeared without leaving any trace. The car turned up close to the crime which could not be occurred anywhere but in a railroad car having an isolated compartment such as is used on the British railway.

PLAN GREAT EXPLOSION TO RAISE SUNKEN SHIP

Eighty Tons of Dynamite to Be Set Off on Steamship Chatham in Suez Canal—Port Said Fears Consequences.

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—A despatch from Alexandria, Egypt, to the Herald says that intense excitement prevails at Port Said, consequent on the decision to blow up the steamship Chatham, which is in the Suez Canal. That the town will be damaged to any extent is considered unlikely, the vessel being nearly 12 miles distant. RESCUED ENGLISHMEN TELL HORRIBLE TALES OF TARTAR ATROCITIES

Armenians Shot Down Like Dogs and Their Bodies Mutilated in an Awful Manner—Cossacks and Chief of Police Stood Calmly by While Horrors Were Proceeding

LONDON, Sept. 26.—Interesting incidents of the experiences of the Englishmen, connected with the oil industry at Baku, are reaching their relatives in England. Williams, one of four Englishmen rescued from a trap at Balakaban, writes that the stories of the horrors give but feeble idea of the actual occurrences. He adds: "I was shut up in my place at Zebraf for five days without any water except local mineral water. All the people here were crying and fainting. All around were fire and rifle shots. Ten Armenians were killed out of those in our own yard. You could not walk a yard without several shots being fired at you. We tried to save the wounded but the shooting was too good, and we had to give up the attempt."

JAPANESE ARE CLAMORING FOR NEW ADMINISTRATION

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 26.—Kentarō Kayano, editor of Yoneda Choro, one of the leading papers of Tokio, is in Seattle. Mr. Kayano stated that his personal observation led him to believe that practically all of the people of Japan are dissatisfied with the present administration. He said that the present ministry will be dissolved soon, because the people are clamoring for the resignation of the cabinet, and the emperor is giving personal attention to the memorial to the throne. The people of Japan demand a new cabinet and think they will win it.

THAT ORANGE STREET CASE

Although Ada Williams Claims to Have Been Ill-treated, Police Can Find No Marks of Violence.

The girl who was assaulted Sunday evening in a barn owned by Mr. Patterson between Orange and Prince streets belongs to Upton, New York, and her name is Ada Williams. She came here with Mrs. J. E. Rodgers, daughter-in-law of L. B. Rodgers, being employed as a maid. Mrs. Rodgers has been here about two months, and as Ada Williams who is 21 years of age, she states that she remembers only being about three weeks ago on the corner of Orange and Prince streets by a large man, whom she does not know, and who took place about nine o'clock in the evening, and the appearance of an unknown man, she saw the offender.

The directors of the street railway this morning met the highway board of the parish of Lancaster respecting the extension of the street railway system into Fairville. Speaking for the board of directors Col. HOW CAPTAIN KEYS DROWNED

His Body Was Found Near the Stern of His Ship at St. John's, Newfoundland.

HALIFAX, N.S., Sept. 26.—(Special)—Particulars regarding the drowning of Capt. Keys, of the Furness liner Sicilian, at St. John's (Nfld.) are available. The officers on the Red Cross liner Rosalind, which arrived early this morning from St. John's, say that so far as they could learn, Capt. Keys was last seen alive at 11.30 p.m. by a customs officer walking along the deck of his ship. There was some lumber on the deck and it was thought he might have tripped on it and fallen over. His body, however, was found in the morning near the stern of the vessel. The feet were in the mud, and it was thought that he might have gone ashore and fallen over from the pier.
