If a man has lost a leg or an arm in our service, the best we can do is to supply him with the very best substitute that can be obtained. The artificial limb means a change from misery to comfort, from gloom to cheerfulness, from a crippled, broken-down appearance to one of smartness and efficiency.
There is no good reason for any delay. Yet there has been delay. In fact, practically nothing has been done. Injured men are waiting, and wondering why this simple matter is not attended to, when all that is necessary is to give the order, have the measurements made, and pay the money.
Why should there be red tape or procrastination over so simple a piece of business? If any private citizen met with an accident involving the loss of a limb, and the money was forthcoming, a reputable maker would be selected, the order would be given, and the limb supplied without loss of time.
But it would seem that it is undignified for a public body to attend to a simple duty of this kind without a lot of humping and delay. Those in authority hesitate and make excuses as if they were awarding a contract for a trans-continental railway or new parliament buildings. Meanwhile the men who have been crippled in our service hobble about on crutches and grow sick and tired of waiting.

SEA FIGHTING AT LONG RANGE
The fight in the North Sea between twelve miles away. When the Bluecher was struck, she was ten miles from the English coast. If old-fashioned obsolete ships open fire at 12,000 yards, what the super-dreadnought can do may be guessed. What they can do, experts say frankly, is throw a 2,000-pound projectile twenty-five miles with such accurate range-finders that the deflection will be only twenty yards for six miles.
In fact, the improvement and change in naval equipment has been swift and revolutionary that the life of a battleship has been rated first rank for only five years. In speed, in size, in armor proof, and big gun fire, the changes have come so fast since 1905 that the nations had either to fight it out or cripple themselves financially building bigger and bigger monsters of the sea; and oddly enough, the changes all date from a little "cheese box on a floating saucerpan," the Monitor of Civil War fame. From the time the Monitor and the Merrimack spat out their fire-cracker shots at each other, it has been a race among the nations for speed, armor proof, big guns, and long range. Those best informed declare that the big gun and speed have rendered secondary both armor proof and submarine; but these are disputes that will be finally settled in the present war. Neither side has had any monopoly of courage. The courage of both sides has been magnificent—almost terrible, but speed and the big gun have won. From "What the Power Means to England," by A. C. AID FOR PRISONERS OF WAR IN GERMANY NECESSARY CHARITY

Extract From Letter Showing That There is Great Need For Assistance

Mrs. R. O'Brien, who is in charge of the Women's Canadian Club fund for Canadian prisoners in Germany, has received from an interested resident of Gagetown the following extract from a private letter written by Mrs. Frederick Peters, wife of the ex-Premier of Prince Edward Island:

"October 22, 1915—You asked me about Your Prisoners' Comforts Fund. I hope people will not let such a necessary charity drop. I never realized until I came to England what awful privations the prisoners had to endure. They would starve only for parcels from England and some here none. It is specially hard for Canadian prisoners, far from home and friends. Winter is coming and thousands died from cold last winter and such a death! They need warm underwear, suits, overcoats above all boots. The prisoners of war committee, 7 Southampton street, Strand, London, W. C., will receive money and buy clothing and send it. This committee is connected with the American Embassy, and is absolutely reliable. Miss Martin, the head lady, is so capable. Clothing needs money hard to get here, especially for Canadians as naturally the English prisoners come first. The Canadian prisoners have nothing but what they stood in when they were taken. Think of the poor souls starving, and nearly naked. I do entreat you to try and keep the people interested. There is a splendid agency in Switzerland for sending fresh bread to prisoners which cannot be done from England as it gets mouldy in the three weeks it takes to go. Mrs. Grant Duff, the British Legation, Bern, Switzerland, is the address. She is the wife of the British minister and for a few shillings can send bread twice a week to many prisoners. They crave bread so much. Do lose no time in sending help. It is bitterly cold in Germany even now." It should not be forgotten by those who can give that the fund of which Mrs. O'Brien has charge, is still open and subscriptions are invited.

FOOD IN GERMANY

Germans Forced To Tighten Their Belts

BUT NOT STARVING YET

New Regulations For Sale and Use of Food Will Keep at Home Army of Officials Needed To Enforce Them

(Toronto Mail and Empire). It is well not to pay too much attention to the stories that come from Germany concerning the shortage of food. Some months ago Germany said she was starving, but later on we learned that this admission was a mere pretext sent to the outside world, and particularly to the United States, in order that there might be a protest against the British blockade. Germany is not starving yet; but her supplies of food are getting so low that the government has seen the need of conserving them. Government says how many times a week meat shall be sold in the restaurants. Government says whether food shall be prepared with dripping or without. Government tells the retailer the price at which he shall sell his goods. What does this portend in Germany? We know what it portends in Canada. If the German food regulations were in force here we should expect the German soldiers to appear on the next through train.

The Potato Regulations. A copy of the recent ordinance promulgated in Germany has been secured and literal translations are given below. The maximum price for potatoes in wholesale trade by the producer is 18 cents.

In the Prussian provinces of Brandenburg, East Prussia, West Prussia, Posen, Silesia, Pomerania, as well as in the Grand Duchies of Mecklenburg-Schwerin and Mecklenburg-Strelitz 65 marks (114.75).

In the Prussian province of Saxony, in the Kingdom of Saxony, in the Grand Duchy of Saxe-Weimar (excepting the county of Othleben on the Rhone, in the district of Blankenburg), in the Duchies of Saxe-Meiningen, Saxe-Altenburg, Saxe-Coburg-Gotha (excepting the county of Ronneburg), in the principality of Schwarzburg-Sondershausen, Schwarzburg-Rudolstadt and Reuss of the elder and younger line, 57 marks (114.27).

In the Prussian provinces of Schleswig-Holstein, Hanover, Westphalia (excepting the districts of Arnsberg and Recklinghausen), in the district of Schaumburg, in the Grand Duchy of Oldenburg (excepting the principality of Birkenfeld), in the Duchy of Braunschweig (excepting the district of Brakenburg and the district of Calverode), in the principalities of Schaumburg-Lippe and in the Free Cities of Lubeck, Bremen and Hamburg, 69 marks (114.75).

In the remaining parts of the German Empire, 61 marks (118.35).

The maximum retail price must not be higher than 1 mark 50 pfennigs (about 30 cents) per kilogram over and above the maximum wholesale price prevailing in the "price districts" into which the potatoes are sent for consumption.

Fixing Prices. The imperial chancellor is authorized under the establishment of price districts, to fix maximum prices for potatoes, which must not be exceeded by the producers in wholesale trade. The maximum price fixed for any one district applies to the potatoes produced in that district. The maximum prices apply to delivery of potatoes without sack and for cash payment on delivery; in cases where shipments are charged interest not exceeding 2 per cent, may be asked. The maximum prices include the costs of transportation to the nearest railroad station, and in cases of transportation by water the transportation costs to the nearest landing place of the ship or barge. Costs of loading also are included in the maximum prices. The maximum prices are to be investigated and tested by a commission of experts, the formation of such a commission and the procedure to be adopted by it to be determined by the imperial chancellor. The imperial chancellor is empowered to fix regulations governing the price

schedule for "middleman sales," both in the wholesale and retail trade.

The Days for Meat. There are half a dozen other paragraphs concerning the sale and consumption of meat and fat is taken up. Some of the provisions are as follows:

On Tuesdays and Fridays, meat, meat wares and edibles, consisting partly or wholly of meat, must not be professionally disposed to consumers.

This does not apply to the direct supply of the army and navy.

In restaurants and saloons or lunch rooms, as well as in club rooms and refreshment stations of any kind, there must not be sold:

On Saturdays, poultry, fish and other edibles, fried, baked or broiled with fat or lard.

It is permissible to sell the meat and edibles mentioned in the two preceding paragraphs in the form of sandwiches.

The following are to be regarded as meat in the sense of this order:—Beef, pork, lamb, mutton, and veal, as well as poultry and game of all kinds.

Meat-ware are canned meats, sausage of all kinds and bacon.

Fats are butter, butter substitutes, oil, artificial fats of all kinds, beef and pork fats, and mutton tallow.

An Army of Officials. It is well to bear in mind, too, that in order to enforce the provisions of these new laws a formidable array of officials is required. The police, spies, and magistrates necessary to carry out the decisions of the military authorities might well amount to an army corps.

The same criticism has been made in the past of the German government. Germans have secured efficiency at a tremendous price. Every third man is an official. Among the civilian or non-combatant population in Germany today every second man is an officer. Efficiency costs something even in times of peace.

In times of war it costs more. The Germans, if they are to carry into effect their regulations regarding the sale of food, will have to keep at home tens of thousands of men. Every new supplementary law means that a battalion of officials will not be able to oppose the Allies. In the end the German legislators may defeat their own country.

Premier Asquith will ask next week for authority to raise another million men, making four million in all. He is expected, at the same time, to announce the result of Lord Derby's campaign.

The United States has sent to Austria-Hungary a note asking for a disavowal of the submarine attack on the Italian liner Ancona, assuring that such an act will not be repeated, some degree of punishment for the commander of the submarines, and reparation for the American lives lost.

Requisitioning of the American steamer Hocking by the British government has been postponed for three weeks owing to complications which have arisen over the damage to her by collision with a British troop transport in Halifax.

Official announcement from London says that the Austrian reports of damage to shipping off the Albanian coast were greatly exaggerated.

The annual crusade meeting of the W.M.S. of German street Baptist church was held yesterday. In the afternoon there was an illustrated talk by Mrs. J. Robinson Vanwart on Women's Missionary Work and an address on Home Missions by Rev. J. H. Ganning. The service was by the Young Ladies' Guild and in the evening Rev. M. B. Fletcher gave an address on Bolivia. A solo was given by Dr. Percival Bonnell.

WHAT THE BRITISH FLEET HAS DONE

Some Instances of What Sea Power Has Meant in the Great War

It is hard for the landsman to realize that the silent pressure of sea power may decide the ultimate issue of the great war without any pitched and pitched battle whatever.

It has been said that one single error in the fleet might have decided the history of England; yet men have asked in wonder and scepticism—where is the fleet? What is it doing? Where are these boasted monsters of mystery that slip in and out of the fog, the watch-dogs of the empire, bound whither and whence we know not? But this policy of secrecy being maintained too rigidly? We, the public, have paid the bill; and it has been a whole of a bill—\$1,000,000 in 1900 for dreadnoughts, \$1,500,000 in 1905 for dreadnoughts plus some new wrinkles in guns and detailing and speed; \$2,000,000 in 1910 for superdreadnoughts, with such speed and hitting power as the world has never before known. We've paid the bill and whooped hussas, and trusted the fate of the empire to the fleet. What's the fleet doing? We have a right to know.

Just what the fleet means to England is best appreciated when you remember that the German naval base is less than 375 miles from London, or 500 miles from the Fifth of Forth, which is the base for the English North Sea Fleet. Put it another way! It would take the German fleet less time to reach England than it would take a New Yorker to hop on the train and reach Montreal. To be explicit, the fleets of the two greatest rival powers are only sixteen hours apart!

Maxim says that a European power could land 200,000 men on the Atlantic shores of the United States a month before a defensive force—naval and land—could be mobilized to repel invasion. If that danger exists for the United States,—8,000 miles, or ten days, away from hostile base,—how much greater is the danger to European powers at only sixteen hours apart!

What the fleet has been doing has already been guardedly answered by Premier Asquith. The fact that England has not been invaded is the silent work of the mysterious fleet; and it hasn't been negative work. It has been positive, though every move has been shrouded in mystery and secrecy.

The fleet has guarded the transport of 2,600,000 men. It has brought home more than half a million invalids. It has protected the carrying of 8,000,000 tons of food and supplies for Great Britain. It has made safe the conveying of 800,000 supplies and munitions to the value of a billion and a half dollars. It has patrolled the coast of the sea lanes of the world for a year and a half; so, though the most colossal war that ever broke out in the history of the world is so taken up with tango tests, hostilities, and fox-trot functions that they really haven't an evening to spare."

BOY SCOUT SAVES LIFE. Amescub, Dec. 7.—Prompt and intelligent work by Archie Dow, member of a local company of Boy Scouts, saved the life of Malcolm Milton, who was bleed-

ing to death from a gunshot wound. Milton had been hunting deer near Hampton Falls and the accidental discharge of the weapon severed an artery in his left arm. Dow, attracted by cries for help, realized that the man would bleed to death unless heroic measures were taken and with an improvised tourniquet checked the flow of blood. Meanwhile physicians were summoned and Milton was removed to a hospital in Exeter, N. H.

CARLSTROM FLIGHT MADE A PRECEDENT

Aviator Classed as Master of Vessel and Need Not Pay Duty on His Airship

New York, Dec. 6.—Aviators desiring to enter the port of New York from alien lands in their machines may do so now without fear of establishing a precedent, as far as customs law is concerned. V. Carlstrom, who a few days ago piloted himself through the air to New York and then flopped down on the Jersey Meadows near Ridgefield Park without having to subject himself to the mercies of customs inspectors, sent word to Collector Malone that he wanted to make an aeroplane "entry" and a "declaration."

Mr. Malone called his customs experts into conference, and it was finally decided that Mr. Carlstrom was the "master" of the "vessel" which he piloted into port, and inasmuch as his ship came in under her own power, she was not merchandise and therefore exempt from duty.

A peculiar feature of the case is that the aviator in flying from Toronto to New York landed at Binghamton, and the law provides that entry must be made at the first American port. In making his passenger's baggage declaration, the aviator said he carried no bags and trunks and that all of his extras were one suit of clothes purchased in Canada for \$30. He was not obliged to pay duty on this.

After this experience Collector Malone will consult with Secretary McAdoo in regard to the amendment of the laws to provide for the entry of aeroplanes, and for special inspectors to examine them.

CONSTANTINE IS GRIEVED AND HURT

Always More Attached to England Than to Any Other Foreign Country, He Says

A despatch to the London Times says I have had the honor of being received in audience by King Constantine of Greece. The king said that he had been deeply grieved and hurt by attacks upon him and by suspicious as to his intentions and sentiments. He had always shown his appreciation for the English people and English life, and was more deeply tied to England by relationship by affection and by preference than any other foreign country.

His one endeavor must be to act in the interests of his country and keep Greece clear of disaster. This necessitated a policy of neutrality. The pitiable condition of Belgium was always before his eyes. At all costs His Majesty's desire was to keep his country from sharing the perils and disasters of the great European conflagration.

The only circumstances in which he could consent to proceed to war were if there was certainty of victory so great that rewards would justify the sacrifices. From the very commencement the king had given most solemn assurance that Greece had no and never could cherish designs against the Allies.

The whole Greek nation in history and up to the present time had been friendly to England and France. That Greece, especially her king, could have been thought capable of treachery was an insult to the country and to its sovereign. Yet, in spite of this, he personally had been treated in a manner that caused him the deepest pain.

There was a party in Greece which had been always desirous of Greek intervention. These people never really grasped the situation or realized the dangers that intervention would lead to.

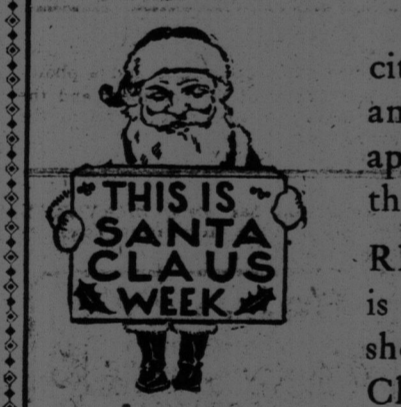
The attack upon the Dardanelles was a gamble which might or might not succeed, but Greece's position had not allowed her to run such risks, nor was the Balkan policy of the allies at any time a very definite one. Suppose Greece had joined the allies and suppose subsequently the allies had decided to reduce their action or retire altogether. In what position would Greece have been left?

ONE QUEEN WHO HATES GERMANS

Influence of The Dowager Empress of Russia SISTER OF QUEEN ALEXANDRA

Germans Blame Them Both For the War — Beloved By Russian People For Her Democratic Policy

In considering the influence exerted by women in present European affairs, little or nothing has been heard about the most important of them all, namely the Dowager Empress of Russia, whose sixtieth birthday occurred, on Nov. 26. There is no suspicion that her son the Czar is not absolutely committed to the policy of continuing the war until Prussianism is crushed and humbled, but if there were we might rest assured that his mother, who has great influence with him, would hold him steadily to the task, and that no temporary peace or truce would be agreed to by Russia. Empress Marie's influence is well understood in Germany, where she, jointly with Queen Alexandra, her sister, has been held responsible for the war. The Germans believe that her hatred of them is so great that for most of her lifetime she has been plotting to isolate Germany and draw together the nations of Europe for the purpose of attack when the opportunity arrived.

King Edward Blamed

Not long ago the Frankfurter Zeitung occupied considerable space in an effort to prove that the three great enemies of Germany in the past twenty years were the late King Edward, Queen Alexandra and the Dowager Empress Marie of Russia. The article pointed out that as long as Queen Victoria reigned there was great friendship and understanding between the Germans and the British; but that when King Edward undertook to substitute for the policy of "friendly relations" which had existed between France and Russia, he was threatening Germany and revealing his hatred for the nation. It is true that King Edward had no reason to love Germany, for when he visited Berlin on the occasion of his sister's illness he was subjected to the most scandalous and vicious attack by the German press, instigated by Bismarck, who had hated the dying Empress from the time she went from England as a mere girl. It is equally true that the Empress Marie has no reason to love the Germans.

Injured in a Riot

She was a girl at the time of Prussia's invasion of Denmark in 1864, when Schleswig-Holstein was wrested from her father's kingdom. She was indeed, injured in a Prussian-inspired riot at that time in Copenhagen. The riot, like many others, was originated by the Prussians to embarrass the Danish government and cause it to abandon all further resistance to the invasion. After smashing windows and doing other damage this particular mob encountered Queen Alexandra, the late King Christian was driving with his daughter. The carriage was stoned and she was thrown from the carriage and landed on the forehead, cutting a deep gash and leaving a scar that remains to this day to remind the Dowager Empress what she owes to the Prussians. It is pointed out by Cutcliffe Owen, who writes in the Pittsburg Dispatch that this was the only occasion upon which Empress Marie was ever attacked. Her husband and many near and dear to her have fallen to the weapons of assassins, but no Socialist or Anarchist ever raised a hand against her.

Russian News from Germany

This is because she is beloved in Russia and is known to have heartily supported every movement toward the lessening of relations upon popular government. If the outside world has a contrary idea of her it is because the outside world has received most of its impressions from German sources. It is pointed out that the German press has suited the purposes of Germany to the Czar and his mother and all the Royal family represented as cold-hearted despots. Moreover it suited these same purposes to maintain in the most absolute autocracy in Russia, because this meant the suppression of liberal movements, which again means freedom, order and revolt. If Russia could only keep busy in attending to domestic disturbances she would not be able to checkmate the succeeding German moves by which she was to be made a mere commercial adjunct of her aggressive neighbor.

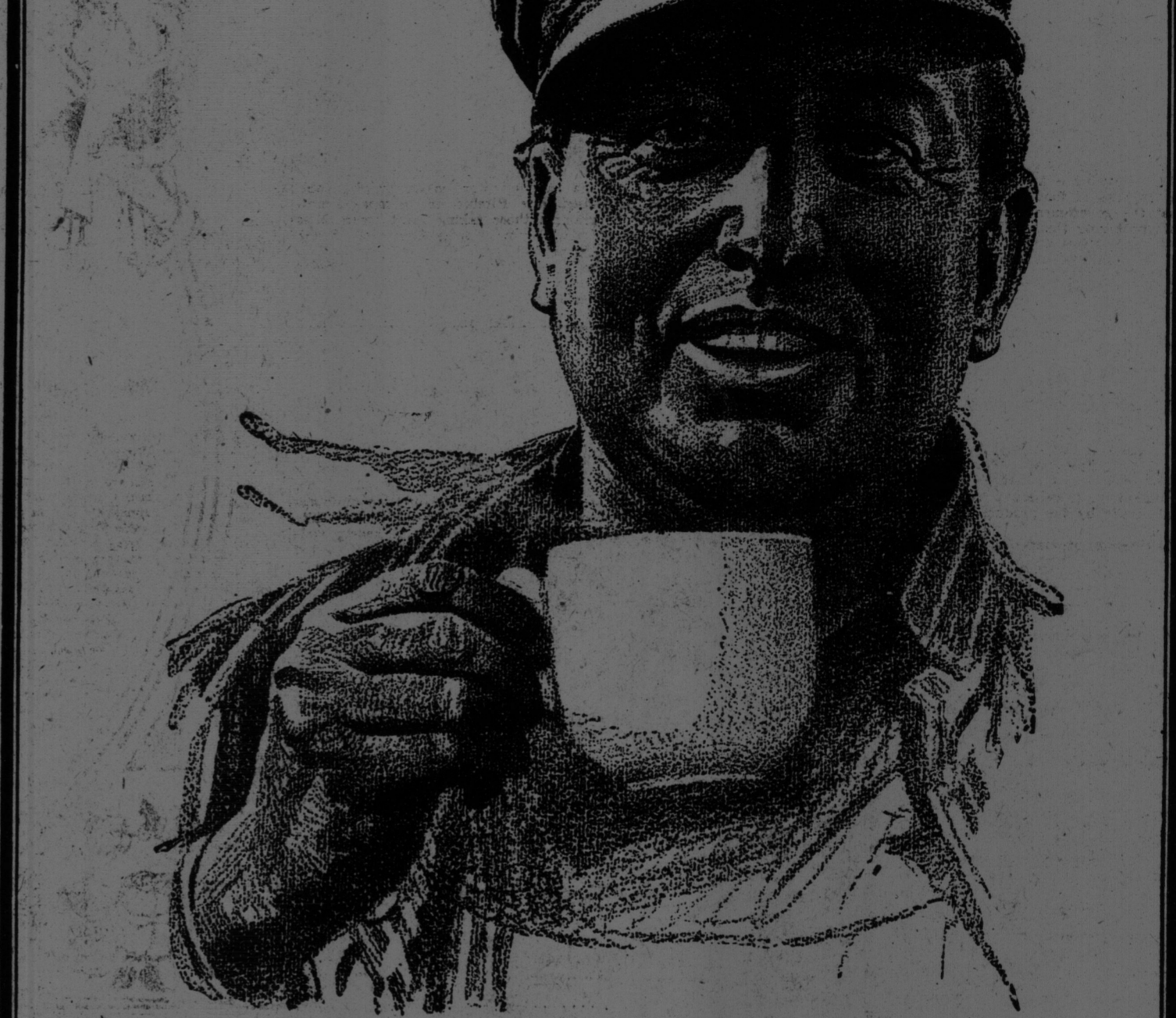
No More German Influences

It places every obstacle short of downright refusal in the path of reforms desired by the Czar, and hated the Dowager-Empress because she early perceived

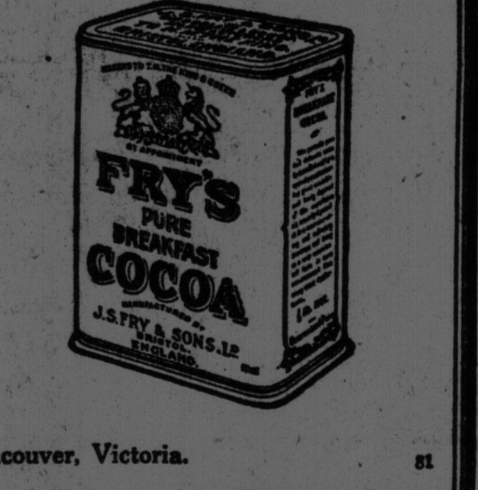

CARE OF HORSES ON FIRING LINE

How Wounded Beasts Are Returned to Service

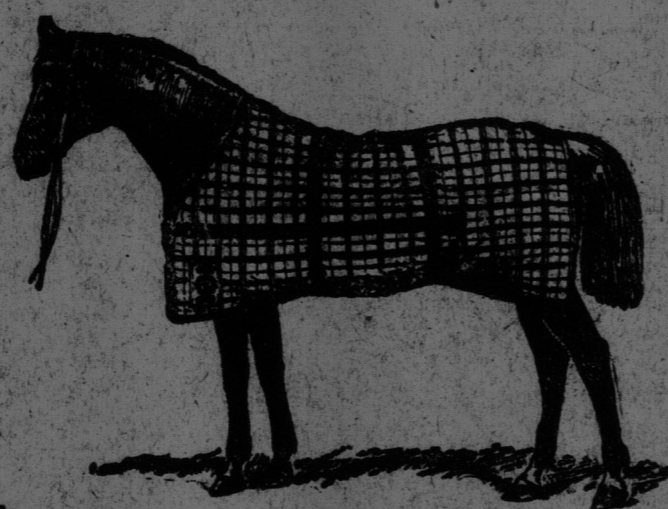
VETS WORK UNDER FIRE

Fifteen Thousand Horses Are Required With the Canadian Divisions in France

Ottawa, Dec. 8.—The number of horses used in modern warfare is surprisingly large. In each infantry division of twenty-one thousand men there are six thousand two hundred and fifty horses. While there are approximately fifteen thousand horses with the Canadian Army Corps in France, according to a statement issued today by the Militia Department.

The horses of a division are taken care of by twelve veterinary officers and one mobile veterinary section of 27 men. There is a veterinary officer attached to each of the different units that compose a division. The mobile section takes care of the horses in the firing line. The slightly wounded or indisposed beasts are cared for and returned to the front. If, however, the troops are on the move all injured horses are immediately collected and sent in groups and sent back to railroad from where they go by rail to the nearest veterinary base hospital. When they are fit for duty they are sent to the remount depot which re-issues them.

There is one Canadian field hospital in France composed of three hundred and eighty seven men and six officers. It has a capacity of 1,000 cases and the work which is done there is really remarkable. Horses which in previous wars and in civilian life would be destroyed at once are taken in and treated so successfully

Five hundred and ninety five treated eventually became fit for re-issue or to be used for easy duty. The men work under the most trying conditions, often exposed to the fire of

are being constantly brought to the front to replace them. During the second battle of Ypres, when the Canadians were pressed to their utmost, at no time was the supply of horses diminished at the firing line. As casualties occurred among battery and transport horses, reinforcements were rushed through the storm of bursting shells to take their places. Although the Canadian guns were within three hundred yards of the enemy, there never was a gun or a wagon lost in what is known as one of the fiercest engagements that has taken place in this war.

SOLDIERS' COMFORTS

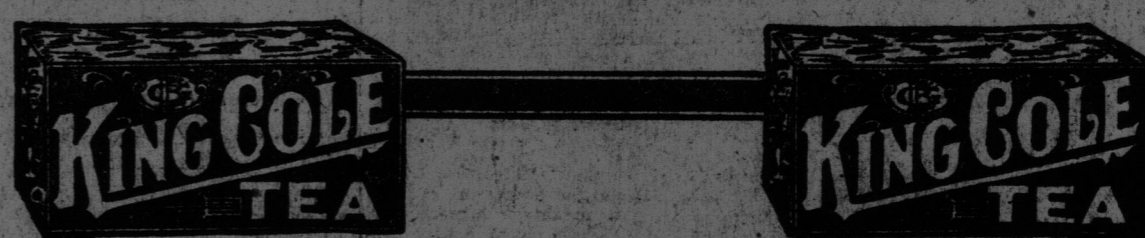

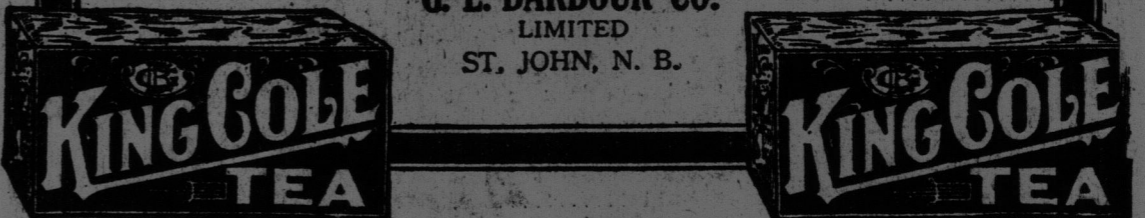

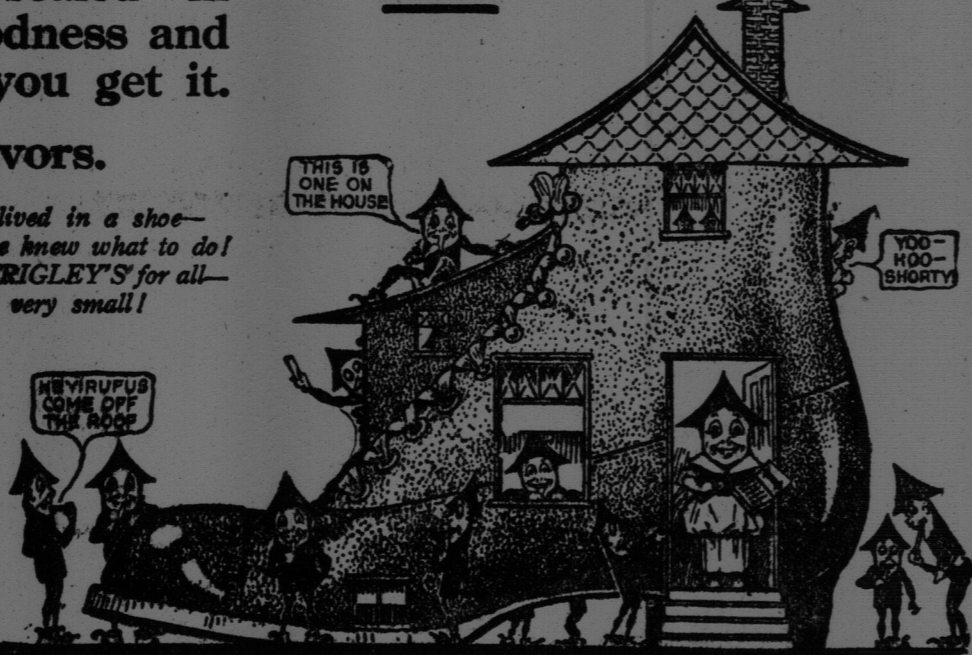

FOUND FRANKLIN POLAR RECORDS

Stefansson Discovers Data Left in 1853 by Party Searching For Famous Explorer

Ottawa, Dec. 9.—News of the discovery by the Canadian explorer Stefansson, of records left by one of the Franklin search parties on the same date, sixty-two years ago, is contained in the detailed report of his explorations received by the Naval Service Department. The records were those left by McClintock, an explorer who headed one of the parties

which went in search of Franklin in 1838. Curiously they were found by Stefansson on exactly the same date as they were deposited, June 15.

By another coincidence McClintock's records left in a cavern near Cape McClintock, tell of the explorer's intention to travel three days westward, in search of new land. Stefansson instead travelled three days north and made his discovery of a hitherto unknown land, as has been recorded.

In the cavern were various records, some of which were illegible. Those recorded the fact that McClintock's party were all well, had already examined the southeast coast and were about to proceed west. Stefansson is now in camp on the north end of Banks Land, if he has not already reached Prince Patrick's Island. At the latter place he expects to establish a winter base as far north as possible. In February he will start an exploring trip over the ice of Beaufort Sea.

New Orleans, Dec. 7.—Kid Williams of Baltimore, world's bantamweight champion, and Frankie Burns of Jersey City, fought twenty rounds to a draw in their battle for the title here last night. The fight was fast and furious throughout. Referee Ed Smith decided honors were even.

Each boxer weighed 118 pounds, ring-side. Burns forced the fighting in the first half of the bout and landed hard swings and stiff jabs at will up to the ninth round, when he seemed to tire and Williams became the aggressor.

Burns had the advantage in reach and in height, but in the 14th round the champion started a flying jab for Burns' head and landed frequently.

In the eighth, Williams rushed Burns to the ropes, but the challenger drove him back with left and right swings to the face and body and Williams dropped to his knees.

Later in the same round, Burns rushed the champion around the ring, landing at will to the face and chest. From that round on to the finish, with the exception of the 17th, however, Williams appeared to have the better of the fighting.

The champion seemed stronger and fresher when the final gong sounded and the referee declared it a draw.

Burns seemed to exercise better ring generalship and boxed cleverly, landing frequent uppercuts and pounding Burns' ribs until his body was red.

Williams won first blood in the 18th. The challenger seemed to have the better of the first six rounds. The eighth and 17th, the 10th, 11th, 16th and 19th were considered even and the champion was favorite for the rest. Williams was a 7-to-5 favorite in the betting.


