

The doctrine of despair is being preached by some advocates of harbor commission. They say it is commission or nothing—that we cannot be worse than we are, and that this is our only hope.

The Commercial Club ought to jump on this doctrine with both feet, for the Club was organized as a protest against the knackers and the dispensers of doom.

Washington, March 2.—Exports of confectionery from the United States during 1919 increased tenfold over 1918, according to statistics compiled by the department of commerce.

Great Britain ranked first among the consumers of American candies. Exports to British ports comprising 34 per cent of the total shipments to the Orient also showed large increases.

The advent of American soldiers in foreign countries undoubtedly had much to do with the increased popularity of candy to which they were accustomed, the report said.



It is reported at Ottawa that Hon. J. D. Reid is to become president of the National Railway System in Canada.

The steamer Bear River, which has been frozen in at her home port in Nova Scotia all winter, freed herself from the ice yesterday and sailed for St. John.

Crown Prince Charles of Roumania intends to dissolve his morganatic marriage with Mile. Lambrino and has thus effected a reconciliation with his parents.

The Governor-General of Canada will be in St. John on March 13 to take steamer for England to attend the marriage of his daughter.

Demanding a forty per cent. increase in wages, nearly 20,000 steel workers are on strike in Wales.

Awaiting the result of legal proceedings now pending, the Cape Cod canal has been closed.

It has been ruled by the Board of Railway Commissioners that interference respecting prepayment of freight to points in the United States from Canada is not justified at present. Many shippers in Canada had protested to the board against the railway companies not accepting prepayment.

In the House of Commons at Ottawa yesterday Hon. Mackenzie King, in speaking to the address in reply to the speech from the throne, said that the present state of affairs in Canada could best be remedied by a speedy election.

He suggested that the franchise bill be given preference and passed at the earliest possible moment, and that then an election take place.

Sir Robert Borden, on his arrival in New York yesterday, had a conference with Hon. Dr. Reid and Hon. Mr. Callaghan, but none of them would give for publication anything which was discussed.

The French railway strike ended yesterday.

Sir Auckland Geddes' appointment as ambassador from Britain to Washington was announced in London yesterday.

The Franciscan Fathers, of the Roman Catholic faith, have purchased the historic Anglican Trinity church on Place Viger Square, Montreal, for \$125,000.

The vestry passed the motion of sale unanimously.

THE BUSINESS OF FARMING.
(Publication Branch Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.)
"Organization, co-operation and education are going hand in hand throughout the agricultural districts of the country," is the opinion of W. J. Rutherford, Dean of the Saskatchewan College of Agriculture, who expressed the following views in the Agricultural Gazette for January. He says: "Farming is not the independent self-contained occupation that it was a generation ago. Conditions have changed from the pioneer days, and production has not only to do with supplying the demands of the home but it must aim to create an export trade. Farming is a real business, and men who are not only skillful in the art and practice, but are versed in the science of agriculture. Farmers today are not content to know only how to grow good crops; they want to know also how to market them to good advantage. They are interested in the economic problems of their own communities and to a great extent in the problems of their country. Agriculture is both industry and commerce, and affects both the rural and the city population. The agriculturist of today is not merely a practical farmer but is necessarily a social worker. Rural communities have problems which require college trained men to solve."

MORE ADVANCES IN HARDWARE

(Hardware and Metal, Feb. 28.)

Numerous and important price changes have occurred in the hardware markets during the week and indications point in many cases to a situation developing where it will not be a question of price, but of getting the goods. Shortage of raw materials, delays caused by congestion on the railways, and other troubles are behind all this.

Price changes this week include advances in all lines of axes, Stanley tools, Corbin locks, brass valves, injectors and ejectors, clocks, some lines of building paper, curry combs, stove poker, boat nails, canvas gloves, brass metal polish, friction tape, barn door hangers, wooden pails and tubs, hose clamps, corn planters, wire solder, carbide grinding wheels, picture wire and one line of shears.

Higher quotations are effective also on galvanized iron, tin plate, copper and Canada plate. Wax candles are up half a cent. Refined iron and all steel bars have advanced.

An immediate advance of ten cents a gallon is expected in kerosene oil and other supplies of raw materials are forthcoming shortly there will be a temporary famine in this product.

Prices of rifles are likely to advance very shortly and further advances may be made in coal oil and gasoline.

SAYS MOTOR BUSES WILL OUST STREET CARS

Winnipeg, March 2-Motor buses will be the prevailing system of transportation in Winnipeg within seven years, J. G. Glasco, manager of the city light and power department, predicts. He said he believed the present street car system will be obsolete by that time and that rails would be removed from the streets.

"WHITE COLLAR" WORKERS AVOID WEDDED STATE

Newark, N. J., March 1-Clerical workers and "white collar" men in general are not getting married these days, according to City Clerk Egan, in charge of the marriage bureau. "The proportion is about one out of a hundred licenses granted. Of the last twenty applicants for licenses not one was a clerk. This, he believes, showed the need of a "middle class" for an increase in income.

His many friends will hope that his vacation in the south will have the desired effect of restoring him to robust health.

THE DRESS QUESTION. The Times has received several additional letters dealing with the question of a uniform for business girls, all protesting against the proposal. As the matter has been pretty fully discussed, and the proposal is not at all likely to take definite shape, it seems hardly necessary to continue a one-sided controversy, hence the latest batch of letters is withheld.

SAILED ON GRAMPAN. The C. P. O. S. liner Grampian sailed this morning for London and Havre with 97 cabin and 677 third-class passengers. Among the cabin passengers were: F. S. Scovil of this city, R. Booth of Halifax, Miss F. M. Derivas of Halifax and W. E. Hall of St. John. The last mentioned had with him a passport which was issued to him in London in August, 1917.

MILITARY EXAMINATIONS. The staff of military clerks took the examination in stenography and typewriting yesterday in preparation for their appointment to the permanent force of the Canadian militia. A short time ago there was an examination given in military subjects. Nine candidates took the papers yesterday under the supervision of Lieut.-Colonel A. H. Hill, assistant adjutant general for M. D. 7.

GETTING READY TO FLY. That air routes will be opened in the maritime provinces within a very short time was the statement made by the Truro Citizen by Capt. Laurie E. D. Stevens, vice-president and managing director of the P. Island Aerial Transport Co., Ltd. The principal route, he said, will be Charlottetown, Truro, Amherst, St. John, Parrishboro, Truro, Halifax and Sydney. It is intended to have aerodromes antedoned and a general passenger, mail and express service will be carried on.

A RECORD FOR SIXTY YEARS

February Snowfall Was 51.8 Inches — Mercury Was 8.5 Below This Morning — Twenty-Seven Zero Days Out of Seventy-Five.

February this year hung up a new record for snow fall that has not been exceeded for fifty-nine years, total fall for the month 51.8 inches. In addition to this 2.72 inches of rain fell, making the total precipitation 7.90 inches. Ten inches of snow is figured as one inch of water in the precipitation.

The previous high record for February in snow fall was in 1861 when 51.5 inches was registered; other outstanding figures for February were 1882, 50 inches, and 1878, 48.2 inches, making the snow fall record for the whole winter was in the season 1881-82, when 147 inches fell. In 1904-5, known as the winter of the big snow, the fall amounted to 96.4 inches, but during that year there was practically no rain or snow weather.

The thermometer this morning at 1 o'clock registered 8.5 degrees below the cipher, having dropped during the night from a maximum of 28 above yesterday. Since Dec. 16 to date the mercury has been below the zero mark on twenty-seven days, or more than one-third of the total number.

Clearing Services

Command to Quebec

Owing to the small number of troops now in England awaiting transportation to the clearing services command, under Captain Reed, to its headquarters in Quebec, preparatory to further demobilization of this department as the duties become less and some of the work which was carried out by these services will be taken over by Military District No. 7 about the last of the week. Captain R. L. Murdoch, officer commanding the casualty company in this district, will be in charge of the demobilization of the men as they come off the ships and will send them to their various districts. The medical services will look after the required examination of the men before they are demobilized; the district pay services will have the matter of pay in hand, and the assistant director of supply and transport for this district, Major R. Knox will look after transportation of the men. There will be a non-commissioned officer transferred from the clearing services command to the casualty company to retain the continuity of this branch of the service. Similar arrangements are being made in Halifax in connection with the clearing services command. It is understood that there are now in England only about 1,000 men awaiting transportation home.

DEATH OF JAMES F. MITCHELL TODAY

Numerous friends in the city will regret to hear of the death of James F. Mitchell, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Mitchell, which occurred about four o'clock this morning in the St. John Infirmary. Mr. Mitchell had not been in good health for some time and last Friday was taken to the infirmary where an operation was performed, but it was found impossible to save his life.

Mr. Mitchell was for twenty-five years employed with the mechanical department of the International Railway and was superannuated about four years ago. He enjoyed the esteem and respect of a large circle of friends, from whom sympathy will be extended to the bereaved family. He is survived by two brothers, Joseph, with the Canadian National Railway, freight department, and J. Joseph, store and metalware dealer, both of this city, and two sisters, Misses Sarah and Agnes, at home. The funeral will take place on Thursday morning at 9:15 o'clock from his late residence, 217 Waterloo street, to the Cathedral for requiem high mass.

FOR THE OPENING OF LEGISLATURE

The military authorities have completed their arrangements for the opening of the provincial legislature on March 11, and a salute will be fired throughout the district. The guard of honor being made up of members of the 21st Regiment, will face the main entrance of the parliament buildings and will receive Lieutenant Governor Pugsley with a royal salute, at the same time the band playing six bars of the National Anthem. The guard will remain at the entrance of the building during the speech from the throne, and on the departure of His Honor from the building the same proceedings will take place. A salute of fifteen guns will be fired by a detachment of returned soldiers under Lieut. Norman Cass. The ammunition and two of these guns will be sent from St. John. The guns will be placed on the bank of the river near the buildings and each gun will be manned by four men. A medical officer will attend during the firing of the salute.

MONCTON DEATH RATE

Moncton, N. B., March 2.—Moncton last month had the lowest death rate for February in a great many years. There were only twenty deaths in the city, compared with twenty-four in February last year. The average death rate for the last four years has been twenty-six. The number of births in February was seventy, while there were sixteen marriages.
