Looking For Big Liquor Stock Here

Story of \$60,000 Dollars Worth Stored In City For Bootleggers

Not Able To Find It

Inspector Wilson Before Public Accounts Committee—Government Opponents Not Able to Find Flaw in Matters Under Inquiry

(Special to Times) Fredericton, N. B., April 17—No better tribute to the efficiency and honesty which has marked the present administration of public affairs could be given than the absolute absence of serious criticism by opposition members of the Public Accounts Committee, which held its final session this morning.

An affidavit to the effect that the wine is all on hand and signed by two responsible citizens, was presented to the committee this morning in answer to his allegations.

Another critic was silenced as effectively, Dr. Taylor of Charlotte has been making allegations regarding the condition of the road from St. George to Second Falls. He was confronted this morning with the chief engineer, "Isn't the road better than it was before we took charge?" asked Mr. Hill.

"Oh, yes, it is a thousand times better," Dr. Taylor replied, "but it might be made still better."

Mr. Dymart reported that the committee had no power to compel the attendance of witnesses but could secure such authority by resolution of the legislature.

Mr. Smith of Carleton said that should have the power. He had pointed out what looked like an irregularity in the wine-licence matter and the minister of public works should have moved to secure the witnesses.

Mr. Legge said he would like to have the man here. The chairman announced that an affidavit had been prepared by the committee to the effect that the wine is all on hand at East Florenceville.

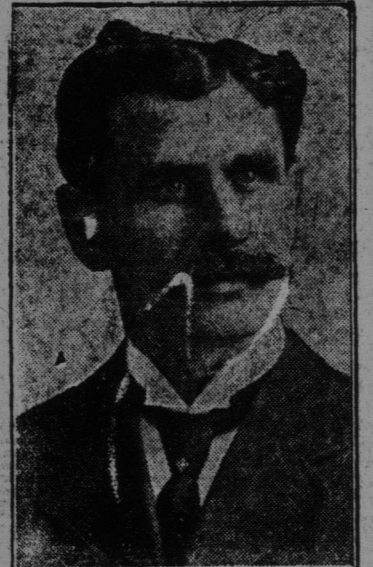
Mr. Smith said that it must have been replaced. He could prove that when he made his statement in the house there was a shortage.

Road matters were taken up and B. M. Hill, chief engineer said in reply to Dr. Taylor of Charlotte that a supervisor was supposed to see that the men employed were kept at work, but when a supervisor had several jobs in progress he could not be on every job all the time.

Mr. Hill said that the supervisor's bill showed that he worked only seventy days while the men worked 100 days. Dr. Taylor said that the road under discussion was a disgraceful piece of work; there had been no proper supervision.

Mr. Hill said that he had kept in touch with the work and that great improvements had been made. Everyone around there said it was much better than it had been before the government changed.

BELGIUM AND THE KAISER

"Small Satisfaction to Lock Him up For a Few Months," Says Delegate

Paris, April 17—The Belgian delegation to the peace conference yesterday informed the Associated Press correspondents that if a commission desires to arraign General Baron Von Manteuffel for the sack of Louvain, General Von Schroder for the murder of Capt. Fryatt and General Van Sauberweil for the execution of Miss Edith Cavell, all the necessary documents will be forthcoming.

"But Belgium does not seek revenge," said the general secretary of the delegation. "It wants only justice."

Regarding the former Emperor William, the general secretary said: "It would be small satisfaction to look up the Kaiser for a few months in the Saint Gille prison, and those who have reported that such revenge has been offered Belgium as a solace for her wrongs have sadly misunderstood the Belgian character if they thought it would be acceptable."

"The only case in which the personal responsibility of the ex-emperor for a criminal act committed in Belgium could be established beyond doubt is in the atrocities attending the deportations of civilians and compelling them to do forced labor in Germany. In this case his responsibility is unquestioned."

Canada's parliament will resume sessions on next Tuesday afternoon. The Swiss people will be called to decide by a referendum whether the country will join the league of nations.

King Ferdinand of Bulgaria, a telegram from Prague says, has asked the Swiss federal authorities for permission to reside in Switzerland.

Ontario's Toll Roads. The province has purchased the Coburg and Port Hope toll road, about five miles, for \$6,000. There are still about sixty miles of toll road in Ontario, and about forty miles of these relics of barbarism radiate from Ottawa.—Toronto Globe.

Died on Train. Yarmouth, N. S., April 17—James A. Miesner, sixty-two years old, died suddenly, following an attack of neuralgia of the heart, on board a westbound D. A. R. express yesterday afternoon en route to his home in Lawrence, Mass.

MAY THREE PROBABLE DATE London, April 17—(Reuters)—In connection with the march through London of the overseas troops, which has been provisionally fixed for May 3, the king with other members of the royal family will stand in the forecourt of Buckingham Palace to inspect and take the salute of the troops.

OUTBREAKS AND MASSACRES BY THE TURKS ARE FEARED

Matters Taking a Serious Turn and There is Grave Anxiety—Young Turks Planning to Regain Power

London, April 17—It is feared here that the situation in Turkey is causing grave anxiety. Internal disorder is rife, according to reports from Rear-Admiral Webb, R. N., at Constantinople. It is feared there will soon be outbreaks and massacres of the Armenian population on a large scale.

The situation at Smyrna, where the Turks and Greeks are ready to spring at each other's throats, is typical of the situation throughout Turkey. Bands of brigands are dominating the country, even within a few miles of Constantinople and committing atrocious murders.

The committee of union and progress, the young Turk organization, which was driven from power in Constantinople as a result of the Allied victory, is reported to be secretly conducting an energetic reorganizing movement.

London, April 17—Eighteen hundred persons, including 400 women, were murdered by the Bolsheviks at Ufa, one of the principal cities in the Orenburg district, near the Siberian border, according to a telegram from Omsk, received in official quarters here.

Despatches from Omsk dated April 8 and received on Tuesday announced the massacre by the Bolsheviks of more than 2,000 civilians and near the town of Osa, to the north of Ufa, in this district.

WOULD BAR IMMIGRANTS FOR THREE MONTHS. Halifax, April 17—At a meeting of the executive committee of the Home Affairs and Immigration committee, it was resolved that the Dominion government be urged to suspend immigration into Canada for at least three months in view of the unsettled conditions now existing in the country, and the fact that the men of the Canadian expeditionary force are now returning for demobilization.

HOLY THURSDAY The impressive Holy Thursday ceremonies took place this morning in the Cathedral. His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc officiated. Rev. Louis Guertin was high priest, Rev. Wm. Duke, deacon; Father Hannigan, sub-deacon; Rev. A. T. Allen, master of ceremonies; Rev. Miles P. Howland, singer; Revs. W. L. Moore, R. B. Fraser and H. L. Coughlan, deacons for the holy oils, and Rev. J. B. Gaudet and Rev. M. O'Brien were also in the sanctuary. The Most Blessed Sacrament was borne in solemn procession to the choir; the Virgin's Chapel, there to remain for the adoration of the people until the Good Friday Mass of the Sanctification. The Benediction was chanted in the Cathedral last evening.

Death of Former M. P. P. Quebec, April 17—Aldair Lanctot, attorney-at-law of Sorel, formerly member of the legislature for Richelieu, died last evening at Sorel.

PROLOGUE TONIGHT IS THE OUTLOOK IN FREDERICTON

The Power Bill This Afternoon; Last Big Item

Legislation Authorizing Retiring Allowance to St. John Police Magistrate—Action to Help N. B. Soldiers in Tower of London

Fredericton, April 17—Prologue to this evening is the general expectation with regard to the legislation. Whether it will be in time to permit the members to catch the evening trains is a matter that probably depends upon the amount of time devoted to the N. B. Power Company bill. There are eight or ten other bills to pass the committee of the whole but they are not expected to take much time.

The house did not meet until almost 12:30 for the morning session but an hour devoted to steady work resulted in the recommendation of a large number of bills. Among them was a St. John measure authorizing the payment of a retiring allowance to the police magistrate upon agreement in the event of his resignation.

Another of general interest was that to permit soldiers, whose names do not appear on the lists owing to their absence to vote at city, town and municipal elections.

The power company bill will be before the house in committee of the house this afternoon. Action on behalf of the New Brunswick soldiers charged with complicity in the Rhyol camp riots and now in the Tower of London awaiting trial was taken this morning when Premier Foster introduced a resolution urging delay in their trial until counsel and witnesses can be on hand and that witnesses be sent to England at the expense of the Dominion or the men brought to Canada for trial.

British Take a Hand If Measures Fail

General Plumer Acts In Strike Situation In Germany

Spreads Too Near To Cologne He Orders Men Back to Work Under Threat of Serious Consequences—German Troops With Artillery Marching on Munich—Reports From Other Places

Cologne, April 17—In consequence of the spread of the German strikes to the Cologne district, Lieut.-General Sir Herbert Plumer, in command of British forces on the Rhine, issued a proclamation yesterday ordering the immediate return of the men to work and threatening the strongest measures against persons promoting or countenancing strikes in the British zone of occupation. The general offered military mediation if other means of settlement failed.

Lay Siege to Munich. Berlin, April 17—(By the Associated Press)—Large forces of Bavarian troops with artillery and mine throwers began an advance on Munich on Tuesday morning, according to the Tagblatt, but it is unknown whether a decisive battle has as yet been fought. It is assumed the government will wait until an adequate number of reliable troops have been placed about the city. It is reported that in fighting around the railway station at Munich there have been 150 casualties.

SWITZERLAND REPORTED TO HAVE RECOGNIZED THE GERMAN GOVERNMENT Berne, April 17—(Havas Agency)—The Swiss federal council, it is reported, has decided to recognize the new German government, on the ground that it was elected legally by the national assembly, which was chosen by the votes of the people.

N. S. BRAKEMAN KILLED New Glasgow, N. S., April 17—John Milligan Brakeman, a C. N. R. brakeman, died this morning as the result of injuries received while working on a freight special at Campbell's Sliding. While shunting, he fell from a car and the wheels passed over his body. He belonged to New Harbor, Guysboro county.

MAYO AT HEAD OF U. S. FLEET Washington, April 17—Admiral Fleet T. Mayo, commander of the Atlantic fleet throughout the war, has been designated by Secretary Daniels as commander-in-chief of the United States fleet.

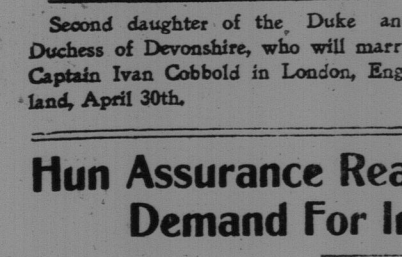

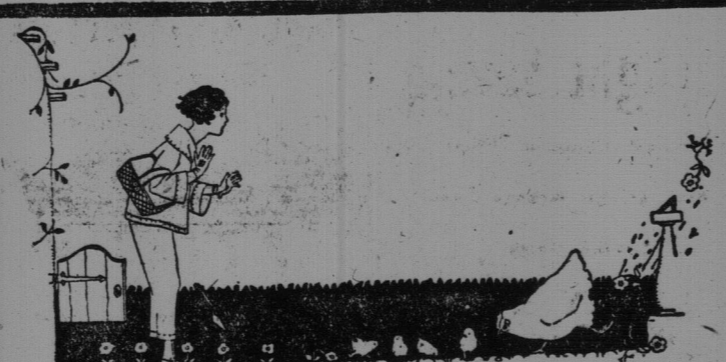

Mr. Smith asked about an item of \$516.99 for the Pinkerton Detective Agency of Montreal for the enforcement of liquor law.
Liquor Matters
Rev. W. D. Wilson, chief inspector under the prohibition law, was summoned and said that because of reports that \$80,000 worth of liquor had been stored in St. John for the use of bootleggers he had employed a detective to locate it. The man had worked for a time in the plant where these men were supposed to be operating. As a result of his investigations a large number of convictions were secured, resulting in fines of \$1,500 or \$2,000. His work had proved worth while although he did not find the \$80,000 stock. The information he had received came from one of the most prominent officials of St. John.
Regarding the report that a carload of liquor seized in Madawaska had disappeared, Mr. Wilson said this was entirely incorrect. Not a bottle was missing.
In reply to Mr. Smith, Mr. Wilson said the officials were after a man at Fort Fairfield whose house was located on the boundary line but had not been able to catch him with the goods in the Canadian half of the house. All the others who had been selling there now were in Maine and were afraid to return.
The chairman suggested that it might be better if members of the public accounts committee were not required to serve on other committees so that they might have more time to devote to the work on accounts.
The work of the committee was completed and their report will be presented this afternoon.

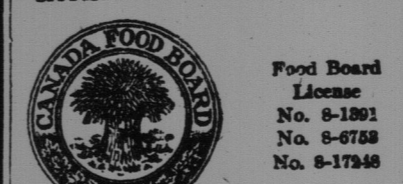

OFFICIAL STATEMENT ON SITUATION IN INDIA

London, April 17—The India office last night issued the following statement regarding the situation in India: "Official reports are to the effect that all is quiet at Amritsar, Lahore and Bombay. At Virangam there have been serious disturbances. Government buildings were destroyed and an Indian revenue officer was killed, but order has now been restored. "There were slight disturbances in Calcutta on the eleventh and twelfth. The military was called out and fired on the crowd and six persons were killed and twelve wounded."

WATCH THE VOTE.

When the Currier bill was before the Corporations committee the New Brunswick Power Company had at least five representatives on the spot, and the company has maintained a strong lobby in Fredericton not only during the discussion of the bill but before it came up in the House.

In point of organization and real work the city was completely out-generalled. It allowed the company to have pretty much its own way so far as lobbying was concerned, and leading business interests of the city instead of being outspoken, left the vote to be done by others or not to be done at all.

This, however, does not excuse the members of the legislature. It is up to them to consider what the effect of bills they pass may be, not only upon a particular locality but upon the interests of the people in every municipality now and in the future.

ONTARIO HOUSING REPORT

The report of the Ontario Housing Committee is a bulky volume filled with most valuable information, including the standards for inexpensive houses adopted for Ontario and typical plans of the same.

"The inequity of our land system thrusts itself upon the notice of even the most careless observer. It huddles families together in down-town tenements, and defends its action on the ground that 'hub value must be maintained'.

The commission does not hesitate to say that there must be a reform that will prevent land speculation at the expense of the home-seeker, and adds that expropriation of land may be necessary in municipal housing schemes, contending that there should be no distinction between land needed for railways and land needed for houses.

"Where surveys have been made it has been demonstrated that there is 25 to 30 per cent more tuberculosis in tenement houses districts of every city than in the individual houses. Recently a study of two contrasting districts was made in Cleveland and one of the results was

the showing in actual figures of the relationship of disease and death to insanitary dwellings. One district was in the old crowded business section of the city. The other was in the outlying section and near some manufacturing plants. The rents in both were practically the same.

As an interesting supplement to this report we may quote the following paragraph from the Toronto Globe concerning what is actually being done in Ontario:

"A score of Ontario municipalities have already taken advantage of the federal and provincial housing legislation. They have adopted by-laws and qualified for the loans advanced by the provincial government on municipal security. They have not waited for housing companies to be formed, but will go directly into the business of building houses, feeling that public enterprise must do what private enterprise has failed to do.

AN EXAMPLE

The technical school in Amherst has closed after the most successful and best attended session in its history. There was a largely attended formal closing with presentation of prizes. The classes included students in elementary English and arithmetic, bookkeeping, shorthand and typewriting, both elementary and advanced, dressmaking, mechanical drawing, automobile operation and elementary electricity.

Mr. Lloyd George in his speech yesterday gave the assurance that at no time during the peace conference has there been a misunderstanding between France and the United States. He had previously made it clear that there was no misunderstanding between Britain and the United States.

BRITISH PAPERS ON LLOYD GEORGE SPEECH

All Agree That It Was Parliamentary Triumph

Divided as to Substance—Some Have Condemnation, Some Hearty Applause—Approval of His Rejection of Military Intervention in Russia

London, April 17.—While opinions are divided regarding the substance of the address of Premier Lloyd George before the House of Commons yesterday, there is general agreement by the London press that it was a great parliamentary triumph, as, indeed, was shown by the rousing cheers of his audience and the expressions of individual members in the lobby.

With the exception of the Laborite and Northcliffe newspapers, none of the morning journals condemn the premier's statement wholly, while several warmly applaud it. These admit that he revealed nothing of the peace terms, but they do not complain that he did not.

The Express declares its full belief in the premier's statement that his pledges will be found embodied in the peace terms and says that he retains the complete confidence of the nation.

The Graphic is equally favorable and says, incidentally, that Lloyd George's statement "justifies the assumption that President Wilson has abandoned his opposition, or alleged opposition, to the sterner views of those powers which suffered most in the war."

Those who attack individual members of the peace conference when the chief concerns of everybody is the public interest, are condemned by the Chronicle, which says: "If the peace terms eventually disappoint any sane expectation, the

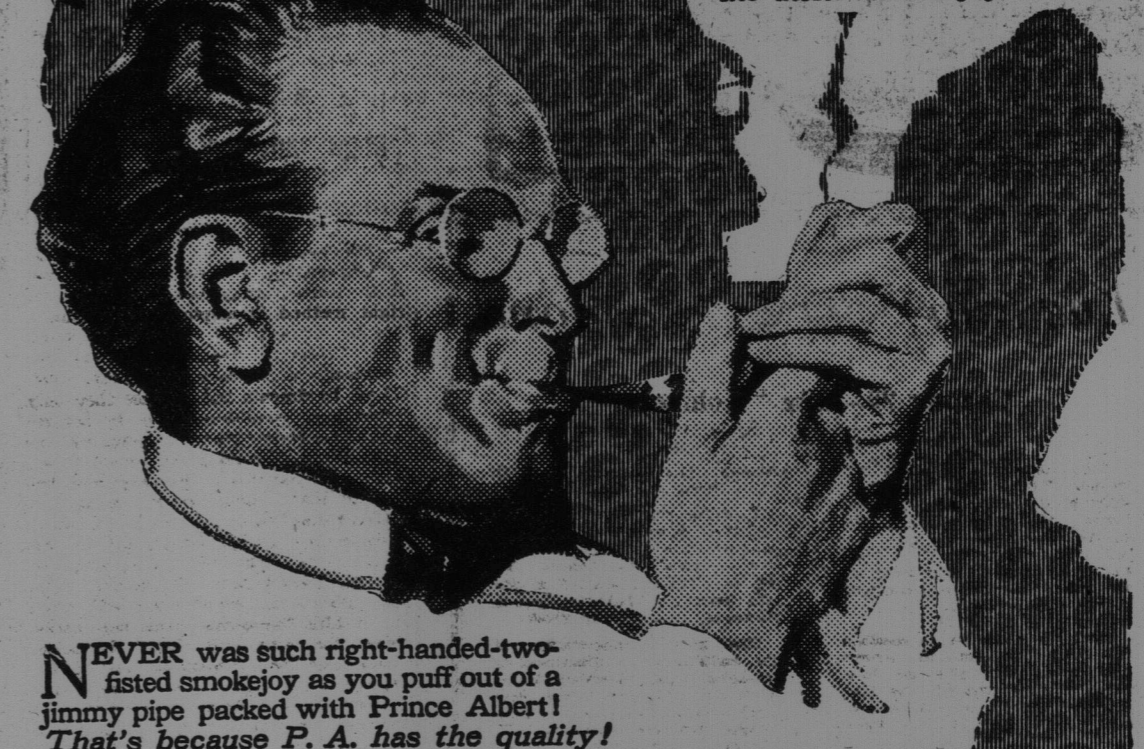

usable tonnage is in the form of waste paper. It so happens that waste paper is our worst refuse nuisance. If carried to a dump it has to be burned, and unless burned promptly it flies back all over town. Yet it must have occurred to everyone that it took a lot of hard work to make this paper and it seems a pity to destroy it.

Under an organized system of collection it would not need to be destroyed. The suggestion is that such a system should call for it at house or factory at stated intervals, and that the user pay for it in War Saving Stamps or Thrift Stamps.

A start on this plan has already been made in certain places by the Savings Division of the First Federal Reserve Bank of Boston. It needs to be extended to every city of New England.

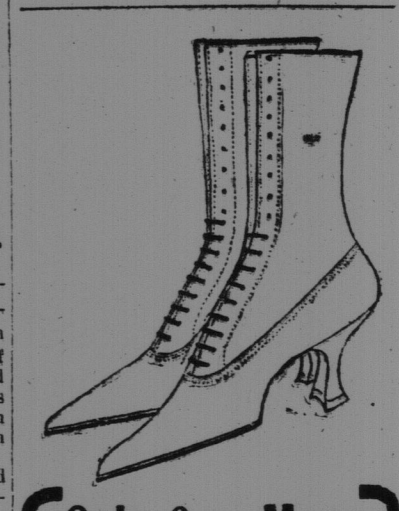

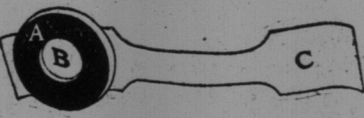

PARLIAMENT TAKES THE EASTER RECESS

Ottawa, April 16.—Parliament has adjourned for Easter. A feature yesterday was the return of Hon. Frank Cochrane to the house for the first time this session. There was a rumor that Sir Robert Borden would be elevated to the peerage as Baron Grand Pres. Dr. Michael Steele of South Perth secured from Hon. A. K. MacLean a pledge that a committee would be appointed to weed out incompetents and agitators from the civil service.

PROHIBITION REFERENDUM BILL IN PASSAGE THROUGH ONTARIO LEGISLATURE

Toronto, April 17.—Premier Hearst's bill providing for a referendum on the continuance of the Ontario temperance act received second and third readings in the legislature last night, after it had been debated for three hours by the house.

Defaulters under the M. S. A. and persons convicted of seditious or treasonable offences during the war, are disqualified from voting or from holding public office in Ontario for a period of ten years, under a measure introduced in the legislature by Attorney-General Lucas.

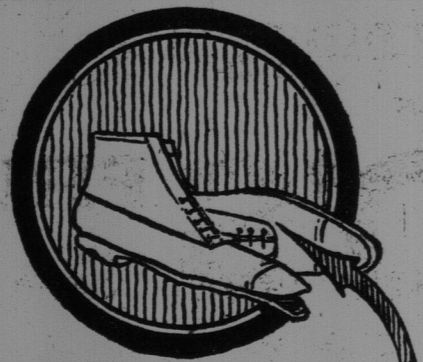

NEW DESIGN IN FLOWER LAY-OUT IN THE SQUARES

Something of What is Planned—Considerable Destruction Has Been Done by Thoughtless Ones

The public squares and old burying ground are to be radically changed in decorative floral design the coming season. Some familiar beds and plots will be converted into plain green sward, while former grassy places will blossom forth in all the gay colors usually seen in our park places.

It is understood to be the plan of the city's horticulturist, H. E. Goid, to make this new display particularly pretty, and his scheme for re-bedding King and Queen squares and the burying ground includes some departures which will undoubtedly be much appreciated by citizens generally. Since Mr. Goid and his industrious assistant have had charge of the city's landscaping, places there has been a marked improvement not only in the up-keep of the parks, etc., but in their beauty, both as to blossom and scheme.

At the northern side of the old burying ground at the present time between twenty and thirty thousand plants are well sprouted under glass so that when June arrives the setting out will be proceeded with promptly and lavishly. In the meantime, alteration of the former layout of beds, etc., will be proceeded with.

After Mr. Goid has eliminated unsightly and unhealthy trees, and has performed some rather remarkable surgical feats upon others that have reclaimed them in their venerable state for a few years more as memories of the early days.

In spite of this conservation of tree life there is a constant display of carelessness and a spirit of wanton destruction on the part of small boys and children generally with regard to the younger trees. In the old graveyard along the Times is informed that four specially selected ornamental trees planted on the embankment on Carmarthen street hill, have, since last fall, been ruined by children mounting the bank and swinging on the tender growths. On the south side of King Square some other young trees have suffered at the hands, not only of children, but once in a while of adults as well, especially during band concerts and on parade occasions.

The city gardeners are very much discouraged over the lack of community spirit shown by the rising generation with regard to public flowers and trees, and in the new scheme being laid out for summer it is being found necessary to plant tall iron fences with extra stout stakes to insure large central beds from invasion by children.

The ornamental fountain in the old burying ground is in a partial wreck because of childish deprivations last fall. The large freestone rim of the basin, located on the ground, has been broken for a space of several feet just the same as a shattered china bowl might be. This is not only a matter of considerable expense when repairs are to be made, but it is a disgraceful sight in a civilized community.

The Times understands that with regard to the trespass of children on the graves of Loyalist ancestors and the damage to tombstones and general upset in consequence that the public gardeners have no right to interfere other than to warn the children off. In the matter of straightening up the graves and preserving the cherished relics, this is a matter for either the families of people buried there or such organizations as the Loyalist Society or Historical Society. In the meantime a considerable number of the graves have been desecrated and the whole historic area neglected.

GRAND ORANGE LODGE

L. A. Palmer Grand Master—
Several Resolutions Passed

At the meeting of the Grand Orange Lodge yesterday afternoon the following was adopted:

"That the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick endorse the attitude of the most worshipful sovereign grand master, H. C. Hocken, M. P., in his criticism of the civil service commission as at present administered, and this lodge is of the opinion that the civil service act be amended so that all appointments should be more equitably made."

"I was decided to send to his excellency the governor-general of Canada for transmission to their majesties expression of regret at the death of His Highness Prince John. Past Grand Masters Wallace, A. J. Armstrong and Douglas McArthur will attend to this. A committee was appointed to bring in a resolution that will enable the grand lodge to constitute as honorary members those of the order who have done their bit overseas. A copy of a telegram sent to Dr. Edwards, M. P., for his efforts for a national school system in Canada was adopted."

A resolution was passed requesting each primary lodge within the jurisdiction to guarantee if possible an annual subscription towards the maintenance of the yearly grant of \$2,000 to the proposed Protestant orphanage.

Another resolution set forth that "This body place itself on record as being strongly in favor of mother's pensions, and that the premier of this province, Hon. W. E. Foster, be acquainted of the passing of this resolution."

A bill to provide for the appointment of a commission to investigate and report on the matter of teachers' salaries was introduced by the premier. The commission will include representatives of the government, executive, the opposition, the board of education, school trustees and teachers. The leader of the opposition heartily supported the measure.

While the afternoon session was a short one, the members found time for a protracted discussion on the proposal to grant crown lands on which fuel might be cut for municipal homes. The bill was amended by reducing the amount of land for each county from 500 to 250 acres.

In the evening a still longer debate occurred on the bill to prevent the spread of smallpox by requiring owners of lumber camps and mills to see that their men were vaccinated.

The minister of health amended the bill by the provision that it would not be effective until a year after it had been passed and it went through.

When the amendments to the liquor act were under discussion Mr. Baxter asked if the government intended to provide for appeal by defendants against convictions, but the attorney-general said that they had decided to make no amendments of this nature at present in view of the possible plebiscite.

A government bill was introduced to-night to give returned soldiers a right to vote at local elections prior to their names being again placed on the lists in the usual way.

The Lanarkshire highway bill was rejected on account of the representations of the large number of residents who had opposed the proposal to issue bonds for \$100,000 especially for a scheme the details of which had not been sufficiently disclosed.

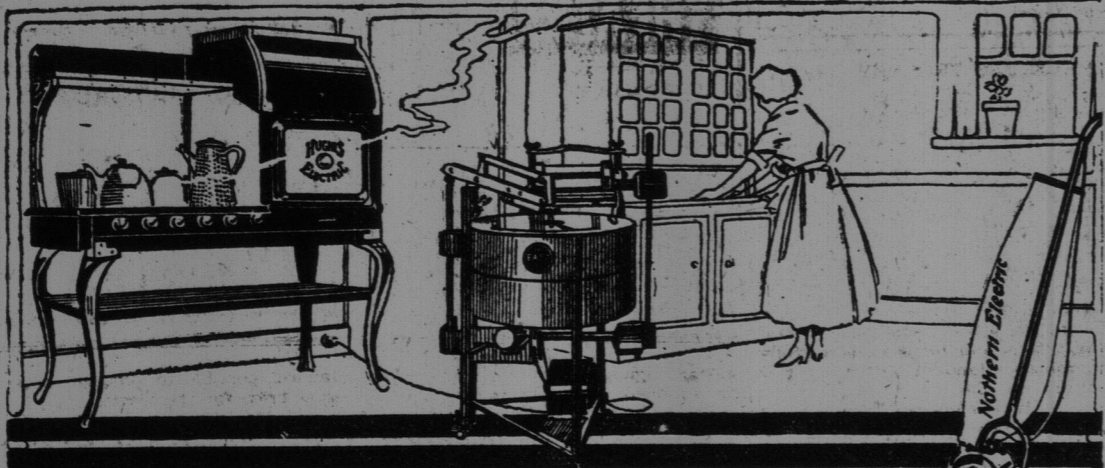

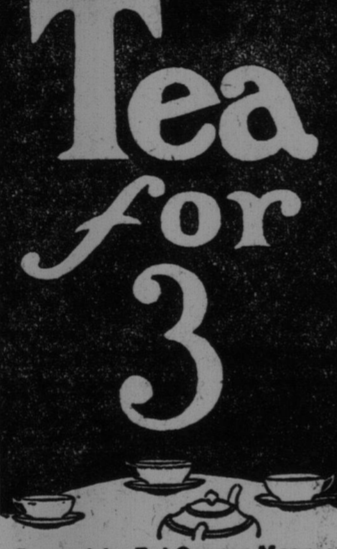

TRACKLESS TROLLEY CARS

An Innovation That Pleases the People of Weymouth, Mass.

The idea of operating trolley cars without iron or steel rails is not entirely new. It has for some time been known that large and comfortable automobiles can be propelled by electricity over the surface of improved modern highways.

It has, though, remained for the town of Weymouth, Mass., to establish a commercial system and compete successfully with ordinary standard systems. It is explained that the enterprise is by no means a trolley service. The power is furnished through two trolley wires which may be connected with any private or municipal electrical plant. Under these conditions the delay in cars meeting on a single track is eliminated. The cars are lighted and heated by electricity supplied directly from the trolley wires. They are equipped with solid rubber tires; or, if desirable, ordinary pneumatic tires may be utilized. As the cost of laying and maintaining metal tracks is eliminated, the low cost of upkeep and overhead charges makes, it is

A party of naval and military officers have inspected the ground in the vicinity of Red Head camp with a view to utilizing it for a landing ground for airships. The site was considered suitable.

Halifax Echo: The dense fog of yesterday considerably tied up shipping in the harbor. At least two steamers, the Wearbridge from Gibraltar and another steamer, thought to be the Frankmore from St. John for bunker coal, were off the harbor in the fog.

He is a grandson of the late Sir Kassimir Gzowski of Toronto, and is married to a daughter of Brigadier-General St. Pierre Hughes of Kingston, Ont.

CARLETON MATTERS.

As a result of matters being brought up at a meeting of the west side board of trade last night, Commissioners Fisher and Thornton said this morning that they were willing to refer the matter to the council to visit the sections of West St. John where lighting and general street conditions are alleged to be inadequate. The need for a better water supply was also brought before the meeting last night.

CITY MACHINERY.

A four-horse road grader recently ordered for the city through the public works department has arrived. It was manufactured by the Sawyer-Massey Company of Hamilton, Ont. Commissioner Fisher said today that the machine is used for grading and crowning streets and roadways and may also be used for cleaning gutters and scraping snow and ice beds.

NEW BRUNSWICK WHEAT.

Donald Fraser of Fraser Companies, Ltd., Plaster Rock, is among the visitors to the city today. Mr. Fraser in addition to his lumbering business, carries on extensive farming operations at Plaster Rock. Last season he produced 2,000 bushels of high grade wheat. He had it ground into flour at the mill at Bristol, Carleton county. The output amounted to about 850 barrels. Its superior quality was attested by the fact that it found a ready sale when placed alongside of high class brands.

A REUNION.

Lieut.-Col. F. A. Good is officer commanding all troops going to England on the Scandinavian, and he will also be in command of troops on board a transport bringing returned soldiers back to Canada. Lieut.-Colonel Good was entertained yesterday by Captain Clews of the S. S. Montezuma. They are very old friends and at the outbreak of the war, Colonel Good was in charge of some 500 horses which were taken to England on the old Montezuma. On that voyage not one per cent of the horses were lost. Captain Clews is one of the original Canadian Pacific skippers and has had a distinguished career in mercantile and military circles. He was in charge of the freighter Montreal when she was torpedoed during the war.

DEATH OF FREDERICK A. PETERS, FORMERLY OF ST. JOHN

Fredrick A. Peters of Vaneboro died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Albert Jones, of Allston, Mass., of fracture of the spine, caused by a fall down a flight of steps. It is thought that the fall was due to a shock. Mr. Peters was born in St. John on Aug. 8, 1837. He attended the schools here and at the age of 21 went to Vaneboro, where he lived more than sixty years. He was interested in mills and general lumbering operations, always serving as foreman of any job upon which he was employed. His life was of the type that counts for good in any community.

Mr. Peters' wife, who was before her marriage Sarah Steward of St. John, died seven years ago.

The body was taken to Vaneboro from Allston on April 9, accompanied by his daughter, with whom he lived, and two sons, Herbert of Charlestown and James of Somerville. Another daughter, Mrs. Ida Glaspie of Superior, Wis., arrived Friday morning. The body was taken to the home of Mrs. William Brothers, another daughter, living here.

Funeral services were held from the Methodist church on Saturday at 2 p. m. Mr. Peters belonged to Ashley Lodge of Free Masons at McAdam Junction, N. B., and members attended the Masonic services in a body. The funeral director was R. E. Swaney, and the bearers were Masons. The floral tributes were many and of great beauty.

MAY GET AWAY ON OCEAN FLIGHT THIS AFTERNOON

St. John, Nfld., April 17, (8 a. m.)—Greatly improved weather conditions may tempt the airmen to fly this afternoon. The storm is over, the sky clear, and with a light northwesterly wind blowing and a temperature of twenty degrees of frost conditions are not unfavorable for flying.

The detectives were in that vicinity, working on a case of attempted breaking and entering, and were traveling through the woods near Pokioik, when their attention was attracted by a man coming through the woods.
