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INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

This Home is open to destitute children under two years of age, but it is not a Foundling Asylum in the ordinary acceptation of the word. Personal application for admission must be made by the parent or guardian of the child, and if the management find that suitable accommodation can be had for it elsewhere, it is not received. The classes of children admitted are :

- (1) Those whose mothers are dead, or insane, or in hospital or prison ;
- (2) Those whose mothers enter with them as nurses ;
- (3) Infants whose mothers are in service, and who pay for their children's board according to their wages ;
- (4) Deserted children sent by order of the Mayor of Toronto.

Whenever there is room, and the mother is willing to enter, she is permitted to do so. It is in the interests of humanity as well as morality that a refuge, such as this, should be open, where mother and child may be admitted together, all other doors being closed against them. The first impulse of the poor women who have been discharged from the Hospital, with a two weeks' old babe in their arms, is to leave it anywhere, with any one who will relieve them of the burden ; but on no account is it wise or right to free the parent of the responsibility resting on her. So dependent are these helpless little creatures for life and health, during the first few months of their existence, on a mother's love and nursing, that it is a cruelty to deprive them of these, if attainable. With time better feelings come, and soon mother and child are bound together in bonds that cannot easily be broken. When desertion, coupled with exposure of a child by the individual, is reckoned a legal crime, there can be no question that a Christian community is guilty of a grave moral offence when they continue to neglect obvious means of removing causes of death and suffering among young children. When a mother's culpable neglect causes the death of her child, it is called infanticide ; and society must also avoid culpable neglect, or share in a similar reproach.

The following are the classes of mothers who are received as nurses :

- 1st. Widows.
- 2nd. Deserted wives.
- 3rd. Destitute, friendless girls, mostly of the class of domestic servants, who, utterly unable to provide for their infant children, would, without the shelter afforded by this Home, have been compelled to beg in the streets with their children, or been forced to abandon, or even tempted to destroy them. Such have been employed in the establishment as nurses, cooks or laundresses, and when discharged have been furnished with situations, which many are now creditably filling.

A PRAYER FOR THE INFANTS' HOME.

O GRACIOUS God and Saviour, who has promised that when two or three are gathered together in Thy Name, Thou wilt meet them and answer their petitions, mercifully look on us Thy servants, and grant us Thy blessing.

We thank Thee that Thou hast put it into our hearts, and those of others, to care for these little ones whom we are gathering into this Home.

We thank Thee for the measure of success Thou hast bestowed on our efforts; and we pray Thee still to bless and prosper our humble endeavours to save both mothers and children. May we not grow weary in our labour and love, and do Thou increase the number of our helpers. Enable us by Thy grace to persevere against all discouragements, and to feel ourselves, and to show to others, that Thy blessing rests with us. Fill our hearts with zeal on behalf of these helpless little ones, that we may do them good.

Gracious Saviour, who, in the days of Thy flesh, manifested Thy goodwill to little children, rebuking those who would have kept them from Thee, bless those who may be admitted to this Home from time to time. If their lives are spared, may they live to Thy glory; or, if Thou seest fit to remove them, take them to Thyself, since Thou hast said, of such is Thy heavenly Kingdom. O Lord, hear us and bless us, and give us, we beseech Thee, a right judgment in all things, for the sake of our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.

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INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

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TWENTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Twenty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Infants' Home and Infirmary was held in the Home, 21 St. Mary Street, on Friday, October 27th.

His Worship Mayor Shaw presided.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. Dr. John Langtry.

The Managers' Report was read by the Secretary, Mrs. Wright.

The Treasurer, Mrs. Boulton, presented her annual statement.

The Medical Report was made by Dr. G. B. Smith, and the Work Room Report was read by Miss Greig.

Short speeches were made in the course of the meeting by His Worship the Mayor, Sir William Howland, Rev. Dr. Milligan, Rev. Dr. Thomas, Mr. David Walker, Mr. Cecil Gibson, Mr. S. Dillon Mills, and Mr. W. B. MacMurrich.

The re-election of the Managers, with the addition of Mrs. Homer Dixon's name, was proposed by Sir William Howland, and carried.

The meeting was closed with prayer by Rev. Dr. Langtry, after which the Managers, with their guests, dispersed to partake of refreshments, and to pay a visit of inspection to the Home.

MANAGERS' REPORT.

The Managers of the Infants' Home and Infirmary have much pleasure in presenting their Twenty-fourth Annual Report to the public.

It has been an uneventful year, inasmuch as we have had no serious epidemic among the mothers or children: no changes in the *personnel* of the officials of the Home, but on the contrary, unanimity and a oneness of purpose which has secured to the inmates the greatest possible benefit. We have also had no changes by death, illness or removal in our list of Managers.

For all these benefits and for the success which has attended our efforts to help the poor friendless infants and mothers, we thank the Heavenly Father, who has put it into our hearts and those of others to care for these little ones.

The statistics for the year ending September 30th, 1899, are as follows:—

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43 of the infants were children of married parents, and 9 were foundlings—a much smaller number than is usual of the latter class.

The highest number of children at one time in the Home was 86, and the lowest number 53.

In every Annual Report of the Managers an effort has been made to present to the public some idea of the lines upon which we work, showing that our first idea and aim is to save infant's life. To do this we insist upon the rule that when possible the mother must come in with the child. Thus the natural food and proper care are secured for the child, and the mother has comfort and warmth in her time of delicate health, and further, the bond between the mother and infant becomes so strong that all fear of desertion, which is such a common sin with women in their distress and friendlessness, is nevermore thought of.

Yet this is one of our rules, which though we think it so beneficial to mothers and infants, nevertheless causes us a very great deal of trouble and blame.

People so often wish to have an infant admitted to the Home while the mother may go to service, and cannot understand why their request should be refused, forgetting that we have no paid nurses in the Home, that the mothers must come in and take care of their baby, and also of some little other unfortunate—perhaps a foundling or a motherless babe—in return for the shelter and maintenance which she and her child receives in our Home. This rule applies to *unmarried* women. Exceptions to it are made in the cases of married women who have perhaps a family of small children and a husband, who from illness or want of work, cannot support them; also poor widows and deserted

wives. Any of these who wish to leave their infants in the Home while the mother goes to service are very willingly helped.

When our ladies are collecting for the Home they are sometimes told by people whom they call on that they do not care to contribute to the Infants' Home, as it encourages vice.

We who know the thought and experience expended for so many years in working out the rules of the Home, so as to best help poor ones who have fallen, succour and befriend them in their time of need and distress, cannot help feeling sorry that our work is by some so misunderstood, and it is for this reason that we endeavour year after year to tell what our work really is. Probably the best answer we can give to this objection is that our strict rule is *only* to admit unmarried women with their first child, a doctor's certificate affirming this being necessary before admittance is granted.

The key-note of our weekly meetings is usually a very sad one, as every Tuesday brings its quota of distressed ones to deal with. Generally three or four girls, often as young as fifteen or sixteen years, bringing in their arms their fortnight old baby, nearly always friendless and homeless, and glad to seek the shelter of the Home in their time of trouble. Oftentimes it is a married woman, who, borne down by the stress of poverty and sickness, comes into the Home with an infant, having perhaps placed older ones in suitable homes. Or perhaps it is a widower left with a family of four or five little children, who pleads for an infant to be taken in, and to this last class of applicants we feel that our Home is a great boon, as a man bereaved of the mother of his children is, indeed, in a most helpless condition, and the question,

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"What is to become of the baby?" seems an almost unanswerable one to him, until some kind friend suggests the Infants' Home.

To see the bright and encouraging side of our work one has only to take a walk through the wards where the bonny fat babies do credit to the wise system of nursing adopted in the Home, and the mothers have a healthy, contented appearance, very different from that which they bore when they entered.

Another source of our happiness comes from such incidents as the following, copied from the minutes of the year:—

"Letter from M. S. full of gratitude for the shelter and happy home."

"C. S. called and said she could never forget the kindness she received while an inmate of the Home."

"Myrtle, a child adopted from Home, brought back by delighted parents to show how she had grown."

"A gentleman who some years ago had adopted a child from the Home called and presented a cheque for \$100 to the Home, as a tribute of thankfulness for the happiness he had experienced in his adopted daughter."

"Mr. and Mrs. V., who some months before had adopted an infant, brought baby to Home to tell how pleased they were, the husband remarking that he believed that it was the best baby that ever lived."

"A gentleman called at Home inquiring for more particulars of the birth, etc., of a girl who had been adopted from here some years ago, and said that her adopted mother had lately died, leaving her \$12,000."

In the monthly report for June, Dr. Spencer suggested that some improvements be made to the Infirmary. As

this was the room where all the delicate, ailing infants were kept in the daytime, he thought it advisable and necessary to secure more space and admit more light and air. At a special meeting held to consider this matter, it was decided on the advice of Mr. Dick, to take down the wall between the Infirmary and a large room adjoining, also to have an additional window made at either end. These changes were at once carried out, being completed in August. The two rooms were thus converted into one large airy room, filled with sunshine and light, and which has met with the approval of all the medical men connected with the Home.

Of Mrs. Jordan, our Superintendent, too much cannot be said for the wise and efficient manner in which she has discharged the onerous duties incumbent on her position. The Managers know that it is one requiring a great amount of tact, wisdom and firmness, and fully appreciate the fact that Mrs. Jordan exhibits all these qualities to an unusual degree. Her able and assiduous assistants, Miss Scott, Matron, and Miss Sylvester, Head Nurse, must also receive their meed of praise.

Our thanks are most cordially tendered to the Medical Staff for their untiring care and devotion gratuitously rendered; many a little life has been saved by their prompt attention.

Our grateful acknowledgments are due to Dr. Pearson and the clergy of St. Luke's, and to Miss Jellatt, who has kindly presided at the organ, also to the Misses Gillespie, Miss Saunders and other ladies, for services and classes held with the women, and to the ladies who have met with Mrs. Hodgins for sewing on Monday mornings, the result of which will be given in the Work Room Report.

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It was with very deep regret that we heard of the death of Sir James Edgar in August last.

He was one of the active friends of our Home in the earlier days of its existence, helping most energetically in its organization, and was the solicitor for eight years, from 1876 to 1884. During that period he answered the many calls made on his time and knowledge with the greatest generosity and promptness.

A clever man says that no good work can be done without enthusiasm. That we may have enthusiasm, and by the conviction of the value of our work inspire others with it, and so add to our already large list of warm and true friends, is our earnest hope for the year upon which we have entered.

MEDICAL REPORT.

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN :—

Following is the report of the Medical Staff for the year ending September 30th, 1899.

There were 177 babies in the Home during the year. This includes those who were inmates at the beginning as well as new admissions. Amongst the latter were nine foundlings, an unusually small number when compared with other years, when from fifteen to twenty were admitted. These have always added materially to our death-rate, but this year other causes have tended to keep it up.

During the year there were fifty-one deaths, which represent about the same rate as that of the preceding twelve months, viz., twenty-eight per cent. The most frequent causes of death were syphilis, tuberculosis, malnutrition, and meningitis, these being responsible for sixty-five per cent. of the total. Should the removal of those suffering from the two first mentioned diseases bring grief to the thinking world? One child developed scarlet fever, but the disease did not spread.

An epidemic of chicken pox attacked fifty-six out of eighty-five infants then in the Home, and while not directly responsible for any fatalities, yet hastened the end in the case of four or five children who were in a somewhat debilitated condition. This was the only contagious disease which visited us during the year, with the exception of the case of scarlet fever.

The largest number of deaths occurred in February,

March, and May, representing more than fifty per cent. of the total, while the hot months of July and August, usually dreaded by city parents on account of ailments common to the season, were responsible for only about five per cent. This shows the great care exercised in the feeding of the infants.

Of the mothers admitted during the year it was noted that an unusually large number were below par in health, so that, instead of being able to follow the general custom of nursing another as well as their own child they were frequently unable to do more than partially nurse their own. For this reason we have had a higher mortality rate than usual amongst mother fed babies. In less than two weeks after admission, five of those debilitated mothers were taken ill—two with typhoid fever—and had to be taken to the hospital for treatment. We are glad to be able to report that all recovered.

We are pleased to congratulate the Board of Management on having enlarged the ward known as the Infirmary—a most desirable improvement—and to express our thanks and appreciation of the uniform courtesies extended us by them and the officers of the Home.

CONSTITUTION
OF THE
TORONTO INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

I.

The name of this Institution shall be "The Infants' Home and Infirmary of Toronto."

II.

The object of the Home shall be to receive and tenderly care for the children of wet nurses, the daily charge of infants whose parents labor away from home, the charge of destitute children under two years of age, entrusted to its care by any municipality in Ontario, and the care, medical attention, and nursing of sickly and dying infants.

III.

The parents or guardians of children admitted to the Home shall contribute to its funds such amount as shall be decided upon by the Committee in charge. In case of total inability of parents to pay any money, the matter shall be dealt with at the discretion of the Committee.

IV.

The entire management of the Home shall be vested in a Board of Managers, consisting of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary, and thirty other ladies, who shall be assisted by an Advisory Board of three gentlemen.

V.

The officers and other members of the Board of Managers shall be elected at each regular Annual Meeting of the Society, according to the resolution adopted and recorded February 1st, 1898.

VI.

The Board of Managers shall have power to alter and amend the Constitution and By-Laws of the Society, provided one month's notice be given of any contemplated amendment. They shall have power to transact all business in the Nursery, saving the investment or sale of any property belonging to the same, for which purpose the presence of ten Managers, including three officers, shall be necessary, as well as the assent in writing of the Advisory Board.

VII.

Three gentlemen shall be elected at each regular Annual Meeting to act as an Advisory Board. They shall be consulted in all matters of finance, especially in the investment of funds.

VIII.

In case any vacancy shall occur by the death or resignation of any officer, member of the Board, or Advisory Board, before the expiry of the term of office, the Board of Managers shall thereupon elect a person to fill such vacancy for the unexpired period of the term.

IX.

The funds necessary for supporting this Home shall be secured by annual subscriptions, donations, collections, and other means.

X.

The Annual Meeting shall be held the first Tuesday in October, or as near that date as possible.



RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

I.

Regular meetings of the Board shall be held on the first Tuesday of every month, at 11 a.m.

Special meetings may be called upon an order from the President, or at the request of any three members.

II.

All meetings shall be opened with prayer as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present (five to constitute a quorum), including one of the officers.

The following order shall be observed:—The Secretary shall read minutes of preceding meeting, which shall be signed by the President; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read a general report of the condition of the Institution.

The Treasurer shall present her account of all moneys received and expended during the past month, to be audited and signed by the President; or in her absence, by one of the Vice-Presidents.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping accounts of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her before the meeting of the Managers, to be signed by the President.

IV.

A committee of the whole to be called Committee of Investigation and Admission, shall meet on all the Tuesdays of the month following the Board Meeting at the hour of 11 o'clock a.m., their proceedings to be reported to the General Board once a month. At these meetings five Managers shall form a quorum, the weekly visitors inclusive. In the absence of the President and Vice-Presidents one of the Managers shall take the chair by vote.

V.

When the Board shall have been called to order, all conversation shall cease.

VI.

One member only of the Board shall be allowed to speak at a time, and then only on the business of the meeting. The Manager having the floor shall address herself to the chair.

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BY-LAWS.

I.

The Managing Committee shall meet monthly, or oftener if required; shall see to the proper treatment of the children, and secure the proper discharge of their duties by the matron and nurses.

II.

The Secretary shall keep a full record of proceedings, summon meetings, and discharge the duties generally that pertain to the office of Secretary, under the direction of the Committee. She shall prepare an annual report of the condition, progress, and prospects of the Home.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys belonging to the Institution, and shall keep accurate account thereof with vouchers. It shall be her duty to deposit all receipts, from whatever source, in a chartered bank to the credit of the Institution, from which account withdrawals shall only be made by cheque, signed by the President and Treasurer; she shall also keep in the same or another chartered bank an account to be called the Maintenance Account, in the name of the Treasurer of the Infants' Home, which account shall not exceed \$500 at a time, and shall be opened and replenished from the General Account. Withdrawals from the Maintenance Account shall be made by cheque of the Treasurer only.

IV.

The Physicians of the Home shall be appointed by the Managing Committee, and shall have the entire medical control of the Home. All applications for positions on the active staff must be accompanied by satisfactory recommendations as to skill and fitness, and to be submitted to the staff for approval before being placed on record. No child or wet nurse shall be received permanently without their examination or approval.

V.

The Home shall be provided with as many healthy wet nurses as possible, each nurse to be entrusted with two infants, the term of service to be at least six months, or as much longer as the Board may determine.

VI.

Only a certain number of babies shall be admitted to the Home to be cared for at the same time, the number to be determined by the medical officer.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHERLESS CHILDREN.

Application for the admission of children must be made to the Weekly Committee, which meets at the Home, St. Mary street, every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock.

No child over two years of age will be admitted, unless by special permission of the Committee.

Infants pay \$5 per month, children who can walk \$4, unless remitted by the Committee of Admission. Children from outside municipalities double fee.

Every child admitted must be examined by a physician.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHER NURSES WITH CHILDREN.

1. Each woman admitted must nurse and feed a child in addition to her own, unless otherwise ordered by a physician.

2. Each woman admitted must give her services to the Institution for as long as the necessities of her own child, or her charge may require, in return for board, lodging, and clothing for herself and infant, and before any woman is permitted to leave the Home the particulars of her case shall be laid before the Board by the Superintendent.

3. Her good conduct during her residence in the Home will secure her the assistance and recommendation of the Lady Managers in obtaining, when she leaves, a desirable situation.

4. Each applicant (whether child or woman) who shall have received a permit to enter the Institution from the Committee, shall be referred to the Visiting Physician, who, if he concur in the admission, shall order the Lady Superintendent to have the name, age, condition, etc., of the applicant entered on the record, and registered as an inmate.

5. No unmarried woman admitted, except with her firstborn.

PARTIES WISHING TO ADOPT BABIES

Must send to the Home certificates stating that they have the means of bringing up a child, and that they can give the child a Christian education. Inquiries will be made at once relative to the parties applying and those recommending, and if the result of these inquiries is deemed satisfactory, the applicants will be notified that they can come and make their selection from such children as are deserted and dependent on charity, and not visited by parents or friends for six months, then the necessary papers will be filled in ready for their signatures.
