Ques. VI. *Who have died since last Conference?*

ANSWER.

1. ROBERT THOMPSON

Was born in the year 1835. In early life he was truly converted to God, and joined the Wesleyan Methodist Church, of which he continued a faithful and useful member until his removal to the Church above. Soon after his conversion he felt constrained by the love of Christ to seek the salvation of the lost souls of men, and his humble and earnest efforts in this work were followed by a good measure of success.

Impressions were soon made upon his mind that it was his duty to devote himself entirely to the work of the Christian ministry. To these impressions he yielded, and after laboring one year under the direction of the chairman, he was received on trial at the Montreal Conference in 1858. During the following six years of his life he gave evidence that his call to the work of the ministry was genuine, by humbly, zealously, and very earnestly calling sinners to Christ, until, in the midst of abundant labours, his health failed, and he returned home to await the further will of his Divine Master.

He had, at times, during his last illness, a strong desire still to live, to labor for the good of souls, but finding that this desire could not be gratified, he meekly submitted to God, and said, "Thy will be done."

Bro. Thompson's sickness throughout was marked by a firm trust in the merits of Christ's death as his only ground of hope. Religion had in him its full triumph, in giving him the victory over the ties and feelings natural to the varied relations in life, as a child, a brother, a husband, and a father; in the spirit of that religion he gave up all to Christ; and then his hope being full, his joys satisfying, his trials, pains, and labours ended, he quietly fell asleep in Jesus on the 15th of March, 1865, in the thirtieth year of his age, and eighth of his ministry.

2. REV. THOMAS BEVITT.

Mr. Bevitt was a native of England. He was born in Knotingly, Yorkshire, in the year 1796; and was born again in the year 1813, and adopted in the family of God. He immediately connected himself with the Wesleyan Metho-



dist Church, in communion with which he *lived and labored* until called to the Church triumphant.

In the year 1821, he emigrated to the United States of America, and entered the work of the ministry in connexion with the Methodist Church in that country. His first field of labor was the Potsdam Circuit, under the superintendency of the Rev. Benjamin Paddock. God owned their labours; and, in the space of three months, 400 souls were converted to God and added to the Church.

Retaining a strong attachment to the flag of his native country, in the year 1829 he sought a connexion with the Wesleyan Ministry in Canada; and was most cordially received and stationed in Kingston, with the Rev. E. Evens as his Superintendent. He subsequently laboured on most of the principal Circuits in the Province—filled the office of Chairman of a District—Secretary of Conference; and was finally chosen President of Conference, the highest gift at the disposal of his ministerial brethren, the duties of these Stations and Offices, he discharged with credit to himself, with satisfaction to his brethren, and with profit to the Church.

Owing to the loss of his sight, the growing infirmities of age, in the year 1856 he was compelled to superannuate, and to retire to his home in St. Catherines. Here he continued to preach, with his usual success, to the utmost of his abilities. His strong mental powers remained unabated to the last; though blind for nine years he still retained such a lively recollection of the Word of God and the Wesleyan Hymns, that when conducting public worship he would repeat whole chapters and hymns, with very great comfort to himself, and with pleasure and edification to the people.

On the last Sabbath of the year 1864, he received the long-looked-for dismissal, "Go thou thy way until the end be, for thou shalt rest, and stand in thy lot at the end of the days."

Mr. Bevitt was a man of strong powers of mind; a clear and forcible expositor of the Word of God; a very popular and successful platform-speaker.

As he lived unto the Lord, so he died unto the Lord. His end was peace.

### 3. WILLIAM DIGNAM.

William Dignam was born in the County Fermanagh, Ireland, of religious parents, through whose pious instructions, and the regular ministrations of the word, his

vigorous mind was early imbued with divine truth. He was converted to God when twenty-four years of age through means of a prayer meeting held early on a Christmas morning, as was the usage of the early Irish Methodists.

He emigrated to Canada in the year 1839, and was called to the ministry of the Wesleyan Church in the year 1840, from the Waterloo Circuit, and commenced his probation on the Plantagenet Circuit, Bytown District. Bro. Dignam was a good man, zealous for the cause of Christ, faithful in the discharge of his ministerial and christian duties; was respected and beloved by his brethren, and by the people among whom he laboured. In the spring of 1864 his health failed him; had to leave his circuit; his work was done. He received a superannuated relation at the last Conference, and in a few weeks after Conference ended his earthly career. He died July 22nd, in the fifty sixth year of his age, and in the twenty-sixth of his ministry. His end was peace.

4. JOHN NEELANDS. Obituary not received.

5. REV. JOHN BEATTY

Was born in the County of Tyrone, Ireland, in 1782. His early religious associations linked him to the Church of England, in the observance of whose ritualism he officiated as Clerk. In the 21st year of his age he was awakened to a sense of his fallen condition, and savingly converted to God through the instrumentality of the Wesleyan Ministry in his native land; and immediately afterwards united with the church of his choice, of which he was early made an acceptable Class Leader. Emigrating in 1807 to New York, he there continued to serve God as Leader and Steward, in the Methodist Episcopal Church, during a period of twelve years. Removing to Canada West in the winter of 1819, he settled in the vicinity of the "Credit," and cleared the farm now known as the "Meadow Vale." Here he opened his house as a preaching place for the Wesleyan Itinerants, and also for a Sabbath School, usefully employing himself as Leader and Local Preacher. In 1827, his usefulness induced the Presiding Elder of his District to send him into the more extended toils of Circuit labor; and at the Ernesttown Conference of 1828 he was formally received as a candidate for the ministry. In the specific work of the itinerancy, Mr. Beatty served

seven years; and as Agent, Steward, and Domestic Governor of the Upper Canada Academy, (now the University of Victoria College), he spent eight years of hard and active service.

The growing infirmities of age led to the superannuation of Father Beatty in the year 1842; but during the twenty two years intervening between that period and his decease, which were spent in Cobourg, he continued to promote in various ways, and in the fulfilment of several connexional offices, the advancement of the Church of his early and unabated choice. Methodical and punctual, coupled with wondrous perseverance, he evidenced a remarkable love for the means and ordinances of the sanctuary; and while stronger hands and younger hearts would shrink from the storm and the tempest, his place was rarely ever vacant in the pew or in the prayer meeting. Advancing years bowed the once hale and active man under the pressure of accumulating weaknesses; and when God's providence shut him up in the sick chamber, he turned heart and hopes to the Rock of Ages. On the 30th of June 1864, at the ripe old age of 82, this servant of God was dismissed to his reward.

#### 6. REV. BARNABAS HITCHCOCK.

The Rev. Barnabas Hitchcock, was born in New England in February, 1785. When a boy, his father removed to Lower Canada, and settled in the township of Stanbridge. He was awakened under the earnest and faithful ministry of the Rev. Hezekiah C. Wooster, and was converted at the age of sixteen, when it soon became manifest that he possessed talents for usefulness. He was licensed as an exhorter in 1811, and as a Local Preacher in 1823. Having gone into Vermont, and been employed in the itinerant ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, he was ordained a Deacon in 1830. After travelling three years in the States, he returned to Canada, and lived four years in Montreal, where he was useful in a remarkable revival of religion in that city. He was recommended to the Missionary Committee in 1835, and ordained to the office of the sacred ministry in 1838. Subsequently he laboured a part of the time in the itinerant work, spending the rest chiefly on his farm. Mr. Hitchcock was an active, energetic man and a lively, earnest, useful preacher. He had a clear, musical and powerful voice; and he rarely allowed bad roads, or storms, to keep him from his appointments. He was generally acceptable in the circuits in which he

laboured, and had many warm friends in various parts of Canada and the United States. He died in peace, in St. Armand, Canada East, on the 12th of October, 1864, in the eightieth year of his age.

## REPORT OF THE CHILDREN'S FUND COMMITTEE.

LONDON CONFERENCE, 1865.

The Committee of Children's Fund beg to report that after paying the claims of 721 children, and other lawful demands upon the Treasurer, there is a balance in Cash of \$209 50.

The number of children to be provided for during the ensuing year is 753, an increase of 32. The alternative presented to the Committee for the support of this number, is either to allow the full claim of \$30 a child with a rate of 40 cents per member, or to allow but \$26 a child, at the rate of 35 cents a member which with balance in hand, will enable the Treasurer to pay that amount.

The Committee have decided to recommend to the Conference the adoption of the latter arrangement, which though not completely satisfactory, yet is considered under all circumstances the most likely to meet the views of the contributors to the Fund, as well as of those who are interested in its preservation.

This recommendation the Committee do not regard as relinquishing the Disciplinary claim of \$30 per child; whenever it can by an increased proportion of membership to Ministers' children be obtained; nor as preventing the Balance of \$4 per child, being raised upon the circuits, wherever this is practicable.

The Committee request the re-appointment of the present Treasurer and Secretary.

**SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEES REPORT.**

Your Committee feel unfeigned pleasure in being able to report, that from every part of our widely extended work, are received cheering accounts of the increasing number, and greater efficiency of our Sabbath Schools.

The success which has been vouchsafed to this department of the work of God during the past year, has been such as to encourage the church to put forth still more vigorous efforts; until the Sabbath school shall be found as uniformly connected with every appointment in our circuit work, as the class or prayer meeting.

Your Committee feel most deeply, that very much of our future prosperity, as a church, depends upon our success in retaining the children of our own people among us; and that those children who have been solemnly baptized by our office and ministry, have very

special claims upon us,—and that some more efficient means ought to be adopted and enforced by the Conference, whereby they may be saved to the Church, and their moral and spiritual culture secured.

Your Committee therefore recommend, that the rule of Conference, requiring each Superintendent to keep and leave for his successor a register of all children baptized by him and his colleague, on the circuit, be enforced. And that these children be brought under the direct teaching of the Church either as scholars in the Sunday School, members of Bible or Catechumen classes.

There are various reasons why this Committee cannot look upon Union Sunday Schools (so called) with that favor with which some regard them. In them our people are often associated with those whose doctrines are not in harmony with the distinctive and peculiar teachings of our church. Methodist Catechisms and literature are generally excluded from them, while books of instruction of an opposite tendency are made use of. Mutual compromises are frequently made, whereby the most important and vital doctrines of Christianity cannot be taught. In view of such defective instruction we cannot hope for the conversion of the scholars: an object which ought to be the grand aim of all our efforts.

Your Committee further recommend the formation of Wesleyan Sabbath Schools wherever six or eight children can be gathered together, and as Superintendents of Circuits may deem advisable. It is also recommended that the Rule of Discipline, which requires "that the ministers and preachers shall use every possible exertion to introduce the Wesleyan Catechism and Sabbath School libraries into all the Methodist Sabbath Schools and families," be acted upon as far as practicable—"and that every Superintendent or his Colleague shall deliver at least one sermon at each appointment on his Circuit or Mission during the year on the im-

portance and advantage of Sunday Schools"\*—and that our own Sunday School Advocate, should be preferred to any other similar publication.

Notwithstanding the completeness of the Schedules, which afford very accurate statistical returns, considerable difficulty has been experienced in arriving at a knowledge of the real condition of our Sabbath Schools, for want of the written reports required to be furnished by Superintendents of Circuits; and they recommend that special attention shall be called to this subject by the Chairman at the annual May District Meetings, with a view to the increased efficiency of this very important work. Your Committee again earnestly urge the Conference to take into its consideration the propriety of appointing a suitable person who shall devote his time to the work of organizing Sunday Schools, and collecting funds of the General Union circulating our publications, and in every possible way promoting the interests of Sunday Schools in connexion with our church.

THE DEPUTATION FROM THE GENERAL CONFERENCE  
OF THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH OF THE  
UNITED STATES.

After the reading of the Address, and hearing the remarks of the Deputation, Revs. Dr. Elliott and Dr. Peck, together with their associate, the Rev. Dr. Eddy, of Chicago, it was unanimously

*Resolved*,—That the Conference has listened with affectionate and respectful interest to the Address of the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and to the brotherly sentiments and edifying statements of the Rev. Charles Elliott, D.D., and the Rev. George Peck, D. D., the honoured and venerable Representatives of that Body, and also of the Rev. T. M. Eddy, D.D. ; and that we most cordially reciprocate the expressions of brotherly sympathy thus addressed to us by, and on behalf of the great Methodist Episcopal Church ; and we reiterate the assertion of our continued oneness with them as parts of the widely extended family of Methodism, and of our cherished remembrance of our former indebtedness to them, and of our ecclesiastical connection with them, and desire to express our heartfelt sympathy and admiration in witnessing their enterprise and achievements in perfecting their institutions and agencies, and in carrying on the work of God, desiring to emulate their zeal and being encouraged by their successes.

*That* this Conference desires also to declare that it has rejoiced in the faithful adherence of American Methodism to the anti-slavery principles of original

Methodism, as expressed by the Rev. John Wesley and ever since professed by his followers in all parts of the world; and it has observed with unalloyed pleasure the important share contributed by the Methodist Episcopal Church to those influences and exertions which now wonderfully appear to result in the entire extinction of slavery in the United States,—a result of such vast importance to the religious, and social progress of mankind as to justify any amount of effort and sacrifice employed for its accomplishment.

*That* we desire also, earnestly to express our deep sympathy with the Methodist Episcopal Church and the friends of emancipation in the United States, in view of the awful calamity and unparalleled crime of the assassination of their late President, a man whose perfect kindness of heart, incorruptible integrity, and noble firmness under tremendous responsibilities, had won for him the esteem and admiration of all nations; and we pray that, by the all-sufficient wisdom of Providence, this deep national affliction may yet be overruled to the advancement of the national welfare and to the disappointment of wicked men.

*That* we praise God that our American Methodist brethren have been enabled to prosecute vigorously and successfully their great work as a Church, amidst the agitations and calamities of war; we devoutly rejoice before God in the termination of the American civil conflict, and the prospect of restored peace; and we pray that, by the blessing of God, such results may be secured from the late war as shall restore the integrity of the nation with a regenerated constitution, secure the welfare of the emancipated slaves, preserve the har-

monious relations of Britain and America, and advance the peace and welfare of all nations.

*Resolved*,—That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. Chas. Elliott, D.D., Representative from the Grand Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States, for the very excellent Address read by him to this Conference, and that he be most respectfully requested to furnish a copy for publication, for the information of the Conference and our people.

*Resolved*,—That this Conference has listened with great satisfaction and pleasure to the eloquent Address, and the highly important and instructive discourse of last Sabbath, by the Rev. Dr. Eddy, of Chicago. We return him our most cordial thanks, and pray that the Divine blessings and consolations may accompany him on his return to his country and home, and in all his future labour.

## REGULATIONS RELATING TO PREACHERS ON TRIAL, AND THE COURSE OF STUDY.

---

1. The Conference shall annually appoint, on the nomination of the Chair, a Board of 18 Examiners, whose duty it shall be to examine, on the prescribed Course of Study, all candidates for our ministry.

2. The work shall be divided into three sections—an Eastern, a Central, and a Western Section. The Eastern shall embrace all the Districts east of the Kingston District. The Central shall embrace the Toronto and Kingston Districts, and all the Districts lying between, including the Owen Sound and Barrie Districts; and the Western Section shall embrace all the remaining Districts in the West.

3. The Board of Examiners shall arrange themselves into three distinct Committees of six members each, and shall assign a Section to each Committee.

4. It shall be the duty of each Committee to examine the Candidates residing in the section allotted to it, to classify them according to their merits, and to give to each Candidate a Certificate as to the character of his examination, to be presented to the District Meeting.

5. No Candidate shall be recommended by any District Meeting, to be received on trial for that year, who does not produce a Certificate from the Examining Committee of the section to which he belongs. But the cases of all young men on trial shall be reported to their respective District Meetings.

6. The Examination shall take place in the month of March, and shall be conducted orally, and by the use of printed Examination Papers, and shall be open to all Wesleyan Ministers and Preachers.

7. With a view to convenience and economy, each Com-

mittee shall hold one or more Examinations in different localities, and the Chairman of the Committee shall give due notice of the time and place of these Examinations. The expenses of Examiners to be paid out of the Educational Fund.

8. All recommendations of Candidates to be received on trial shall be made at the February Quarterly Official Meeting, and the Candidates recommended shall appear before the next meeting of the Examining Committee of the Section to which they belong.

9. The District Meeting shall require the Superintendent of the Circuit from which any young man is recommended to be received on trial, to give a written statement of his religious character, talents, and usefulness, educational advantages and acquirements, employment and means of support, and such other particulars as the meeting may deem necessary; which statement shall be signed by him and recorded in the District Book, and in the Journal of Conference.

10. The District Meeting shall examine, as heretofore, all the Candidates in regard to their religious experience and belief of our doctrines, together with their general qualifications and suitability for our Itinerant work, and shall arrange them in three classes, according to their results of this Examination.

11. If in any given year the number of Candidates recommended by the District Meetings shall be greater than the Stationing Committee deem it prudent to employ for that year, the Examining Board shall meet at Conference, and determine who are the most suitable to be employed in our Itinerant work, and who to be placed on the List of Reserve: being governed by their own class lists, and those of the District Meetings.

12. All Candidates received on trial shall be required to have a competent knowledge of English Grammar and Composition, Geography, Elements of Rhetoric, Arithmetic, and General History; also of the Holy Scriptures, Wesley's Notes, and the first fifty-two Sermons, and Pinck's Analysis of the Old and New Testaments.

FOR CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY OF THE WESLEYAN  
METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA.

*All Candidates before being recommended to the Conference, to be received on trial, shall undergo a satisfactory examination in—*

Arithmetic, English Grammar, English Composition, and the Elements of Rhetoric (Quackenbos), the Bible, with Pinnock's Analysis of Old and New Testament History, Wesley's Notes on the New Testament, and Sermons (1 to 52), and Farrar's Biblical Geography.

*Note.*—The Candidates are earnestly recommended to make themselves familiar with Mr. Wesley's Works; but especially those portions of them which explain and defend our peculiar Theological tenets.

## FIRST YEAR.

At the end of the first year Candidates shall be examined on THE EVIDENCES OF CHRISTIANITY, and of the GENUINENESS, AUTHENTICITY, INSPIRATION, and UNCORRUPTED PRESERVATION OF THE BOOKS OF HOLY SCRIPTURE, and on NATURAL PHILOSOPHY, from the following

*Text Books* :—Watson's Theological Institutes (Part 1st), Wakefield's Theology (Introduction and Book 1st), Angus' Bible Hand Book (Chap. 1 to 3, inclusive), Ganot's Natural Philosophy, edited by Peck.

*Resolved*,—That all Preachers on trial, permitted to attend Victoria College, shall have a probation of five years, three of which, at least, shall be employed in travelling on a Circuit; and, except in the case of Undergraduates, the years of Circuit labour shall precede attendance at College.

*Resolved*,—That the Preachers on trial attending Victoria College, shall not be entitled to vote as members of the *Cobourg* District Meeting.

*The following regulations were adopted relative to the Superannuation Fund.*

1. Every Superannuated Minister, who shall have travelled effectively 15 years in our work shall be allowed \$8 per annum for each year of efficient service.

2. Any Minister who may locate, or shall have located and entered into secular business, and may subsequently be received into the Conference, shall not be allowed any claim for his services during his first period of labour.

shall be competent for the Board, upon the recommendation of the Conference, to commute with them by paying such sums as may be deemed equitable. This rule shall be limited to men of from fifteen to twenty years.

4. That men who may retire temporarily from the work on account of ill health, or accident, who while they receive from the Superannuated Ministers' Fund, according to their years, shall not be precluded from receiving aid to such amount as Conference may recommend, from the Contingent or Missionary Fund, as they may have been engaged in regular or Mission work.

5. Widows of deceased Ministers, who shall have travelled fifteen years and upwards, shall receive five-eighths of the amounts appropriated to their husbands.

6. Widows of deceased Ministers, who shall have travelled from ten to fifteen years, shall receive fifty dollars per annum.

7. Widows of deceased Ministers, who shall not have travelled more than ten years, shall receive forty dollars per annum.

8. *It was Resolved*—That the persons hereinafter named shall receive as follows:—

VERY DEAR BRETHREN.

Your affectionate and cheerful Address has been received by us with much thankfulness. It was heard by the Conference, and a large assembly of our people, with deep interest. Our honoured President—who is also yours,—has further confirmed your encouraging report by his testimony to the high tone of Christian feeling manifested in your late Conference, to the measure of enlargement and prosperity which crowns your labours; and to the bright future, both as to your Home and your Missionary work, which seems to open before you. May the effectual blessing of the Head of the Church rest upon every branch of your organization! While your main dependence must be upon him, you may rely upon our readiness to afford the assistance which you claim.

We deplore, with you, the comparative absence of those richer effusions of the Holy Spirit on which the increase of our numbers depends. The labours of Methodism in Great Britain, and throughout the world, have not resulted during the past year, in the usual numerical accessions. This fact has been the subject of earnest prayer and solemn conversation in our present

Conference. We have searchingly enquired into every direct or indirect cause, among ourselves, which might have contributed to thwart our efforts and cross our desires. The result has been with us, as with you, a determination to consecrate ourselves more fully to the service of the Redeemer, in the ministry of His gospel; and to concentrate our energies more prayerfully and steadily on the extension of His kingdom. You will join us in fervent hope that the coming year may be so abundantly blessed from on high, that the depression of the present year may not be remembered.

Meanwhile, we are not unmindful of the many reasons which we have for thankfulness. As it regards what may be called *material prosperity*, we have not only no cause to complain, but, on the contrary, every reason to rejoice. We have been able to disencumber our trust-property of a large amount of debt; and chapels and schools have been erected in almost every part of the Connexion. Our Educational work advances, notwithstanding many impediments. Above all, our missionary cause, the glory of Methodism has kept on its steady course. How entirely it commands the confidence, and engages the heart, of our people, has been proved by the offering of nearly two hundred thousand pounds to the Jubilee celebration. For your own contribution to this object we heartily thank you; and you will, doubtless, think we do no more than right by returning for your own service what you have sent to the general fund.

In all our thoughts of you, dear Brethren, we remember the blessed contrast between your condition and that of the neighbouring states, desolated by war in its most unnatural form. We rely on your patriotism, even as we are confident of our own; and are sure that you need no request of ours to continue your prayers for the pacification of America, the extinction of slavery, and the free course of the gospel on your Continent.

REVEREND FATHERS AND BRETHREN :—

Your parental Annual Address has been received and read with peculiar interest. The grief and sympathy felt throughout the parent Wesleyan Body in Great Britain and Ireland, at the sudden removal of your, and our honoured President, W. L. Thornton, have been felt with scarcely less intensity by our people in Canada, to whom Mr. Thornton had endeared himself by his powerful ministrations, his deep piety, his affectionate courtesy, his practical counsels. The sweet and hallowed savour of his brief visit and labours among us can never be effaced from our grateful recollections. It will be our aim, as it is our earnest prayer, to imitate his holy example, and share his glorious reward, while we have implored the Divine consolation in behalf of his bereaved family and colleagues in the service of the Church.

During the past year, notwithstanding the depression of commerce and trade, on account of the three years failure of crops, financial derangements, and losses by emigration, on account of the American Civil War, we have been enabled by the pious co-operation and liberality

of our people to sustain all our institutions; to erect a large number of commodious places of worship; and to report a small numerical increase in our membership. There is peace throughout all our societies; and in many of them there are revivals of religion. There is an encouraging progress of the work in British Columbia and Vancouver's Island; while in Hudson's Bay Territory the labours of our Missionaries have been crowned by the conversion of upwards of two hundred of the heathen and degraded Indians, to whom the Gospel has come in power, in the Holy Ghost, and in much assurance, and who have turned from dumb idols to serve the true and living God.

Our home-work is spread over a comparatively new and sparsely settled territory—much larger than that of Great Britain and Ireland. To provide its numerous poor and new, as well as old, settlements with the means of salvation, requires great exertions and labours on the part of our people and Ministry. This work, however, we have all along sustained without any extraneous assistance. We have also supplied men, and contributed largely to provide means, for the work in Hudson's Bay Territory and British Columbia, the Missions to which were undertaken in connection with the Parent Body, and with the assurance of its aid, without the continuance of which we are utterly unable sustain them, much less meet the new and pressing demands for their extension.

It will afford us great pleasure and we doubt not great profit, if you can appoint one of your own Body as our President, to preside at the next annual meeting of our Conference, to be held in Montreal; but in the event of your being unable to do so, (which we trust will not be the case) it may be advisable for us to elect one from among ourselves as provided for by the articles of Union. With much cordiality we nominate for your approval the Rev. Wellington Jeffers, D.D., as Co-Delegate.

We have pleasure in again bearing testimony to the faithful and efficient labours of the Rev. Dr. Wood, as General Superintendent of Missions, and hope you will still continue him in the office which he has so long and ably filled.

During our present session we have set apart by ordination to the work of the Ministry nineteen young men, who have passed their four years trial with much credit and usefulness. In the literary preparation of young men for the *full* work of the Ministry, our University College renders the most important service; while it continues with unabated success and usefulness, in imparting a superior Christian education to hundreds of youths of our congregations.

Our Female College at Hamilton, is also doing a great and good work, in educating upon Christian and Wesleyan principles, large numbers of the daughters of our people and friends.

Our session has been one of great harmony and high spirituality, the interest of which has been largely increased by the communications and ministrations of venerable representatives from the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States.

We go forth to our appointed fields of labour seeking a more copious baptism than ever of the Holy Spirit, resolv'd, after the example and in the spirit of our Divine Master, to go about doing good, and to spend and be spent in feeding the Church of God, and in extending its victories on every side. In this consecration and work, we solicit, as we are sure we shall have, an interest in your prayers and supplications.

REVEREND AND DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

We have received your friendly greetings, and have enjoyed pleasant intercourse with your representatives, our beloved brethren, Carroll and Nelles, and we cannot forbear to reciprocate the kindly message thus conveyed to us. Ye are beloved of us in the Lord, for we have not forgotten how ye were once of us, and went out from us not of your own desire, but because it was evidently for the advancement of the Master's kingdom, and our benediction went with you at our parting. We remember you are an integral part of the Wesleyan body of England, our common parent, with whom our intercourse must ever be more intimate and precious than with any other. We know that your mode of government is in harmony with that of the parent Church, and it is completely satisfactory to us, nay, it is even our admiration and joy. We are glad to know of the purity of your faith, of the fervor of your preachers, of the unity and prosperity of your churches, of the increasing efficiency and power of your schools

and of your missionary zeal. We are also glad to be so explicitly assured that there is no abatement in your devotion to an itinerant ministry and the class meeting, but that you are disposed to preserve in all their integrity, the peculiar instrumentalities that, by the grace of God, gave to Wesleyan Methodism its surpassing power. In all this we are with you, and by as much of the past, as well as the present, we are bound to you by peculiar ties. We receive your delegates in the same character and upon the same basis as heretofore; yet your own noble, christian hearts will, we are sure not deny us the pleasure of out-reaching the hand of christian regard to any that love our Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity and truth. Neither time nor circumstances have wrought any change in our hearts toward you, save to make us feel more deeply than ever, that as we have one Lord, one faith, one baptism, so we have one common interest; and your friendly deputation have been received upon the same footing and with the same warmth as in days past.

We need not say to you that the civil war which now afflicts our country engrosses much of our attention, and has materially modified many parts of our work. We are ourselves amazed at the new fields that have opened before us. The vast armies of the United States have elicited the purest affections and sincerest efforts of the Christian Church, and glorious harvests have resulted. In the victorious track of these armies we have found thousands of our fellow men, from whom the shackles of a most inhuman bondage have fallen, in perishing need of religious instruction. The great South which Slavery once snatched from us, is returning to our watchcare. The middle wall of partition is broken down, and we are there substituting a church whose Discipline now excludes the slaveholder for one that has blotted out even our chapter on slavery.

Our people with commendable zeal and liberality have

met the emergencies of the hour. Never were our benevolent contributions so large as at present, and never were personal efforts and sacrifices more cheerfully made for the good of souls. Our Church is nowhere declining but rather exhibiting unusual vigor and activity, and as a consequence receiving unusual blessings.

God is evidently on our side, and that the issue out of our present troubles is not to us doubtful. Ours is the cause of government as a divine institution; it is the cause of liberty, and civilization everywhere, it is the cause of the oppressed African, which, by a strange providence has become bound up with the nation's life. Your delegates to our body will inform you with what unanimity we sustain our government. Thousands of our beloved brethren, many of them of the ministry, have not counted their lives dear so that they might save their country.

We are grateful for your sympathy in this time of trial, and for your desire for our nation's unity. It would almost be pardonable in us to measure all other loves by the love that is borne to our land, and it would be difficult indeed for us to conceive that British Christians could look with any favor upon the establishment of a nation whose avowed corner-stone is slavery. We feel that the peace and well-being of this continent, the success of Protestantism and the evangelization of the world, will be promoted by fraternal relations between us as Christian Churches, so that our interests but second the promptings of our hearts in this interchange of Christian greeting.

We have therefore appointed three of the most honored and venerable of our number, Rev. Charles Elliott, D.D., and Rev. George Peck, D.D., and Rev. William Nast, D.D., to bear you this letter and to express in person our sentiments toward you, and our undiminished interest in your advancing work.

Since our last to you the venerable Nathan Bangs, D.D., whose name must for all time be identified with Canadian Methodism, has gone to his reward. His was the fitting end of so worthy a life, and we glorify God both for his living and dying.

We pray that God may bless you more and more, multiplying your numbers and your power, that you may more fully honor him who gave himself for us.
