No later news has been received from Europe than that furnished by last English Mail. Intelligence however is daily expected by the Great Western, which vessel was to leave Bristol for New York, via Madeira, on the 11th ult., four days later than previous accounts.

On Friday last, about 9 o'clock, a fire broke out in a stable in a yard between Marlborough and Orange streets destroyed by fire which was caused by leaving a large quantity of wood burning in a stove. The fire extended beyond the roof of the building.

On Tuesday last, a dwelling house at Collingwood, near the Barrage, was destroyed by fire. The house was occupied by a family consisting of a father, mother, and two children. SOCIETY FOR PROMOTING CHRISTIANITY AMONGST THE JEWS.
The following communication from the Rev. J. Nicolson, is dated Jerusalem, Nov. 1, 1842:—
I have several interesting occurrences to report to the ecclesiastical department. The first is the Bishop's first confirmation here, which was held on the 5th inst., in which I mentioned instructions to candidates, and the same were read. To give the more solemnity and effect to this instruction, given in private, I had directed that they should be addressed by the Bishop also during the week immediately preceding the Sunday day of that sacred rite.
