### SUFFRAGISTS HEAR SOCIALISTS SPEAK

Opinions Not Especially Complimentary to Present Day Women, Expressed at Socialists Mass Meeting.

Those who had a penchant for bouskeeping would be given an opportunity to manage apartment houses where the industrial workers and their interests to the home. Instead of stopping at home some of them attended the meeting of the socialists last evening and even took part in the discussion which ranged round the world and back again though it occasionally gave opportunity for a word in favor of the suffraged movement. One of the socialist speakers tried to justify the militant tactics of the English suffragettes, pointing out when men went after suffrage last century they had to destroy a great deal of property, and burn the castles of many landiords before the government recognized that they really wanted the franchise.

Another speaker said that the back ward state of New Brunswick industrially, the fact that the census figures showed that labor here was neither so productive or so well paid as in other parts of Canada, accounted for the indifference of the great majority of women to the suffrage movement. He pointied out that with the progress of the modern industrial revolution the old industries carried on by women in the home had been transferred to the factory, and that women, if they were to do as much of the world's work as they used to should work in factories.

The modern woman was rather pampered; she did not have the rigid training of the era of home industry, and might be somewhat deficient in intelligence on that account. A survival of an old sentiment made the average man think it a disgrace to have





JOKE HOCKEY AT FREDERICTON.


