

Quebec. May 29.—A full equipment of ambulances supplied by the city of Quebec, the city of Levis, and the Army Medical Servics Corps was waiting in readiness at Levis when the special train arrived at eight o'clock, and the passengers were immediately disembarked and transferred to the waiting ferry scamer, which had been moored at a special wharf to facilitate the transfer to the Quebec side.
