## CHAMPIONS AND OTHER SKATERS WORKING OUT; LILY LAKE TRACK SCENE OF GREAT ACTIVITY

Visiting Champion Skaters and Local Speedsters Enjoyed Fine Sheet of Ice Yesterday—Hundreds of Fans Witnessed Filers at Work—The Officials, Programme, and Arrangements Complete for the Big Meet—Prominent Officials and More Skaters Arrive Today.

Up icy hills and down glassy hollows, climbing and sliding, hoping for the best and preparing for the worst, all roads led to Lily Lake and the big oval speedway yesterday, for every skating fan who had a leisure moment to spare.

The great and general interest being taken in the meet was demonstrated by the number who were out to see the skaters in action. There were over five hundred spectators in attendance around four o'clock, and over a thousand must have gone out at some time during the day.

It was not only young school boys or school girls who ventured out, but prominent business men, and mothers of families were there, as well as the younger sporting element, despite the treacherous weather.

The smooth bottle like surface of the lake only overruled the streets that led to it, but so cautious were the skaters that they were not to be taken in by the smooth surface.

Some of the skaters yesterday seemed to pay much attention to any particular system in working out.

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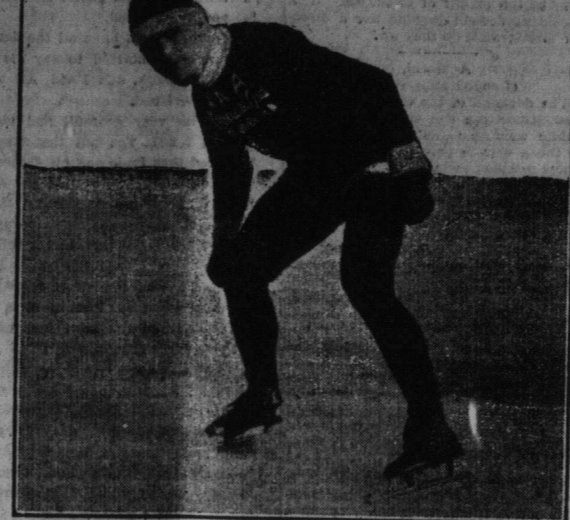
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## CHARLES GORMAN

The last of the outside skaters are expected to arrive in the city today. Many will include George Pickering, of Paterson, N. J.; West, Decker, and Paul Foreman, of New York; William Steinmetz, Roy McWhirter and Fred Buengden, of Chicago, accompanied by J. J. Fitzgerald, president of the International Skating Association; Russell Wheeler and Joe Vosberg, both of the Montreal A. A., and W. E. Roughton, who will act as official starter and holder, their trainer, and possibly Harry Thorne, of Toronto.

Russell Wheeler is the Canadian National Champion. He led at the Canada meet in Montreal last year with 90 points, taking first in the 220 and the 440.

McWhirter got second place in the International Championships at Lake Placid, securing 90 points, coming first in the half mile, the 220 and in the 440. It was in the 440 of this meet that Charlie Gorman established the world's record for that distance, 27.25 seconds.

#### IRELAND'S GOVERNMENT.

Dublin Castle, which for the last century or more has been the seat of the government of Ireland under English control, has now been turned over to a government chosen by the Irish people themselves. This is an incident of such magnitude, that if it could by any means be communicated to generations of dead and gone Englishmen and Irishmen, would cause them to turn in their graves. However, it marks the beginning of an era which, it is the earnest hope of all friends of Ireland, will prove to be one of lasting prosperity for that country, a result which should not—and will not—be difficult of attainment if Irishmen themselves will only cooperate to make it so.

Many knotty problems, political and otherwise, are involved in the transition of Ireland to the status contemplated by the recently adopted treaty. De Valera, after he and his adherents had walked out in protest against the nomination of Griffith, returned after the vote to declare himself ready to support his successor as President of the Dail, but not as the head of another Government. Griffith on his side agreed that the republic must be kept going until a Provisional Government should have been set up, but took the practical view that it was for the Dail, having voted for the treaty, to take the necessary measures for carrying it into effect. If De Valera had not resigned he would not have asked for his resignation, but having been elected he felt bound to help out the treaty into operation; whether he should be the head of the Provisional Government could be decided later at a Parliamentary election.

There seems to be no insuperable obstacle to such a double function; history, indeed, is full of examples of the fusion in a single person of titles derived from quite different sources, and both practical and metaphysical difficulties have often been resolved in this fashion. The Dail may indeed represent only the republic, but having voted for the treaty it is bound, if it is not to stultify itself, to go on with the necessary steps for setting up the Irish Free State. For the Dail to be at odds with the Provisional Government would be a great misfortune, and it would much simplify matters for the President of the Dail to be also the head of the Provisional Government. But on all these matters Griffith has shown himself singularly free from dogmatism, and the calm reasonableness of his attitude is promising.

Civil officials in Hamilton are again urging amendments to the Ontario Motor Vehicle Act to compel automobile owners to carry insurance. What they mean by this, evidently, is not insurance on the car to protect owners in case of accident. It is a guarantee policy that would make a well-established company liable for the damage to others caused by a collision, or negligent driving. The ownership of cars by so many persons who have no assets, and therefore are irresponsible financially, makes such provision desirable.

The driver or owner of every motor car takes risks every time the car travels the streets. Not one autist knows when he goes out, whether he and the car will arrive home safely. Just around the corner, a big accident may be waiting. Often a careful driver, financially responsible, suffers heavy loss through the carelessness or fat-headedness of some other auto driver from whom damage cannot be recovered. The pedestrian public are protected only by the possibility of a fall term for negligence. If those owners who have no assets wherewith to make good a just claim for damages had to be bonded, they would probably be much more careful in their driving. The companies would soon find out their risks, and refuse accommodation to reckless owners.

Some of the States across the border have regulations requiring owners to establish financial responsibility, by bond or otherwise. It may seem a harsh method, but when so many cars are in the hands of persons who can suffer no civil penalty save damage to their machines, it seems almost necessary.

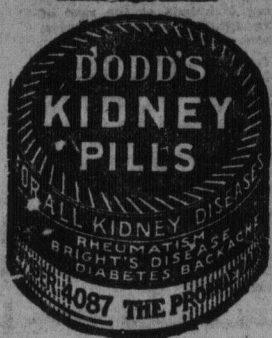

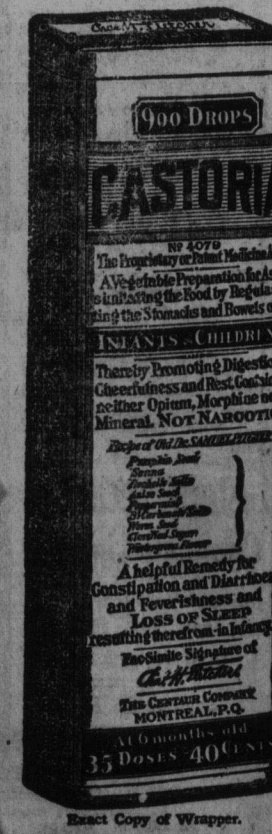

Winnipeg, Man., Jan. 16.—Many entries have been received and plans completed for the Manitoba dog marathon which is to be run from Dauphin, Man., to this city, via Fortage in Prairie, a distance of 213 miles, in connection with the Winnipeg Winter Carnival, Feb. 6 to 11. One thousand dollars has been offered in prizes, divided into \$500 for the winner, \$300 for second place, and \$200 for third. The race will start on the first day of the carnival and conclude here Thursday, Feb. 9.—Night shelters and checkers will be provided in the towns along the course.

In order not to bar a number of contestants, the Alaskan hitch has been prohibited because it means large teams. The Strath hitch—with the dogs driven one in front of the other—will be permitted and teams are limited to not less than four and not more than six dogs. Among the entries already received are some from Gladstone, Dauphin, The Pas, Norway House, Gimli, Riverton and Winnipeg, while numerous enquiries concerning the race have also been made by prospective contestants.

## Returned Soldiers As Scout Masters

Winnipeg, Man., Jan. 16.—Canadianizing of 10,000 foreign boys in Manitoba through the efforts of returned soldiers, as a "living monument" to their comrades who fell in battle, is being considered favorably by provincial Boy Scout headquarters. Palestine Now In A State of Flux

Mrs. Rosita Forbes Believes That Muhammadans as a People Are Soon to be Regenerated.

London, Jan. 16.—Mrs. Rosita Forbes (Mrs. McGrath) is contemplating a sojourn in America in the spring.

"It is not out of mere adventure and curiosity that I have travelled so much in Muhammadan countries," Mrs. Forbes explained to a representative of The Christian Science Monitor.

"I believe, among other things, that Palestine should not be given to the Jews, not only because the population is 52 per cent Arabian, but because the Jews are not agriculturists and Palestine is a farming country.

When word came last summer that the Allies had determined to support the Emir Faisal, Mrs. Forbes, who had just returned from her trip to Katana, once more put on her Arabian costume and went into Syria, where, during the month of August, she wandered about alone and collected political opinions.

She returned to London, where she is now staying at the Hotel Cecil, and is expected to leave for the West Indies and the East Indies in a few days.

Donation To Natural History Museum

Major General Macdonnell Contributed Three Articles Which He Gathered in West Africa.

On the eve of his departure from St. John, Major-General A. H. Macdonnell made an interesting donation to the Natural History Society by contributing to their collection three articles which he gathered while serving with the British forces in West Africa. These gifts consist of a war drum, a tom-tom and a gun-powder pouch, used by the natives of Southern Nigeria, West Africa, and will soon be on view at the Natural History Museum.

Perhaps the most interesting of the collection is the war-drum, which is nothing more than a wooden box, measuring 17 by 16 by 12 inches, carved in peculiar design and surmounted by an animal carved from wood and supposed to represent a "Mere Cat," which is a wild but not ferocious animal found in that part of Africa. To the "Mere Cat" are attached several wooden birds which are supposed to represent parrots. All the work on the drum was done by hand. The drum itself is used by the natives of the bush country of Southern Nigeria, as a means of communication between tribes at some distance apart, in the construction of the box there is a wooden shelf about 1 1/2 inches thick which has been hollowed out and when this shelf is struck with the approved type of hammer, a sound is produced which resembles the noise made by a wood-picker at work on a tree. By means of this drum and by using a code of their own, the natives of one tribe can communicate with those of another 100 miles away.

The Mayor And Citizens' Committee

All Papers in Connection With Hydro Matter Will Be Presented—Council Will Look After Taxpayers.

The Mayor said yesterday morning that he had just had an opportunity of reading the newspaper accounts of the meeting held on Thursday night, and the apparent action of the citizens' committee in favor of municipal ownership for the extension of this work and the industries involved in the same.

From the newspaper accounts, this meeting represented some fifty persons, some of whom might not be taxpayers, and as there would be some 17,000 taxpayers who were not there, he felt in duty bound to say just a word or two, to the effect that those who were not there could rest assured that every effort was being made to get a correct interpretation of the whole situation, and that immediately definite information was available on this subject, it would be presented to the public, and all papers in connection therewith laid on the table, but that until such time as this information would all be available he had hoped that every one might realize that the only interest the City Council had in front of them were the taxpayers, and so far as he was concerned, and he felt sure so far as the rest of the Council were concerned, although he did not care to speak for them, that no one was tied up in any way to anybody whatever in connection with this matter, but that everyone had absolutely in mind the taxpayer, and when all the facts are ready to present whatever way shows a fair situation, he could assure them that that is the way the council would act.
