St. John's, Nfld., July 1.—The budget presented by the minister of finance today shows a surplus for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1901, of \$78,000 and for the year ending June, 1900, \$258,000.

BIG FIRE AT STILLWATER.

Blaze Which Originated in Mill Destroyed Three Factories and Twenty-four Dwellings.

Stillwater, Me., July 1.—A most disastrous fire visited this town late this afternoon, destroying three mills and a large number of dwellings—24. It started in the fire room of the Kimball & Adams Lumber Mill and spread with almost incredible rapidity until all the buildings along the bank of the river for fully a mile were ablaze.

RUSSIAN WHO REPRESENTS THE CZAR HERE.

Distinguished Visitor. Calling at Principal Points in the Maritime Provinces.

HIS VIEWS EXPRESSED

In an Interview Monday--Tells of Possibilities of Supply of Part of Russian Fleet With Sydney Coal--Will Meet the Local Government.

GIFT TO BRITISH NAVY.

Announcement in House of Lords Respecting the Maine Given by American Ladies.

London, July 1.—The Earl of Shelburne, as Lord of the Admiralty, announced in the House of Lords today that the hospital ship Maine, which was fitted out by a committee of American ladies for the use of the wounded and sick in South Africa and which was later sent to Taku, when she took on board wounded and sick men of various nationalities, had been presented as a free gift to the British navy.

U. S. PUBLIC DEBT.

Statement of the Close of the Fiscal Year-- Decrease of the Debt in June.

Washington, July 1.—The statement of the public debt, issued today, shows that at the close of the fiscal year, June 30, 1901, the debt, less cash in the treasury, amounted to \$1,044,730,120, a decrease during June of \$17,737,374.

FELIX A BANKRUPT.

Famous Parisian Dressmaker Ruined at Exposition.

New York, June 30.—Felix, the dressmaker, has closed his doors in bankruptcy, says a despatch from Paris to the Journal.

MAY MODIFY THE KING'S OATH.

SPILLING "BOOZE" IN PROHIBITION CITY.

All Day a Stream of Liquor Flowed from City Building in Portland.

Portland, Me., July 1.—The six thousand dollar stock of intoxicants in the liquor store at the county building here, was considerably reduced today. The labels on numerous bottles and packages having expired, two special deputies were set upon "spilling," and nearly all day a stream of odorous liquor flowed across the cellar to the sewer trap.

Big Boston Fire.

Boston, July 1.—The pier of the Warren Steamship Company in Charlestown was burned today. The immense storehouse is a ruin and it is believed that about one half the pier will have to be rebuilt. It is estimated that the insurance reaches a total of \$187,000 and the underwriters share the loss will not be so much over \$100,000.

Kaiser Ordered Arrest.

Berlin, July 1.—During the race at Kiel in which the royal yacht was entered, a small German vessel crossed the starting line in front of the competitors. Emperor William ordered the captain of the vessel 24 hours under arrest. The captain obeyed but the next day he resigned his commission in the navy.

Boston's 3-1/2 Million Loan.

Boston, July 1.—The mayor's \$3,422,000 loan order was passed by the board of aldermen this afternoon 11 to 3. Alderman Norris being absent.

Can Literature Be Taught.

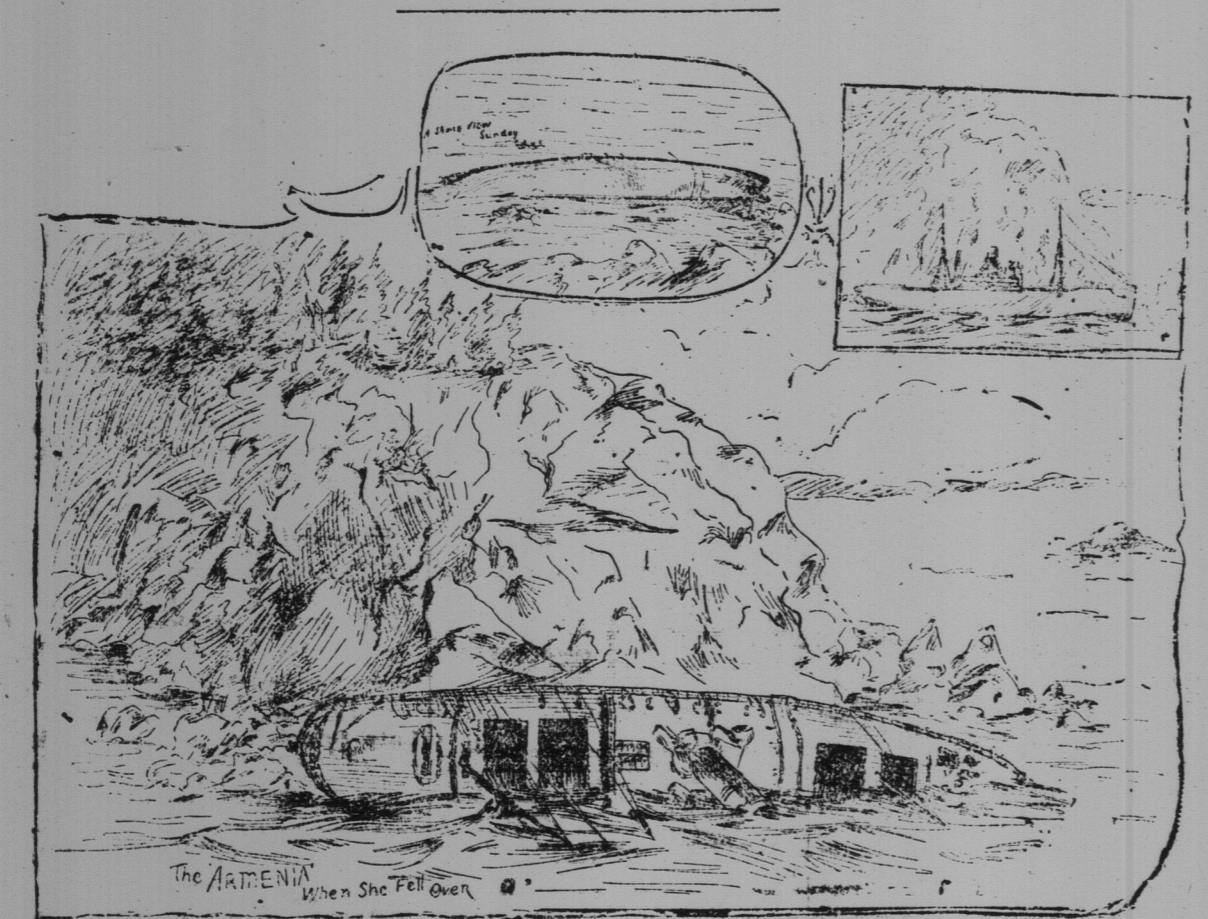

ARMENIA ASHORE IS A HOPELESS WRECK.

Anchor Liner Bound from New York Strikes Negro Head, Down the Bay, and Deserted by the Tide, Cants Over to Her Side.



The Anchor line steamer Armenia 2218 tons register, a hopeless wreck at Negro Head, seven miles below Partridge Island. She struck about 9:45 Saturday morning while seeking her way along the coast to St. John bound earlier in ballast from New York to load lumber and other cargo to Messrs. J. H. Seaman & Co., the agents of the line, and the tug Neptune and Lily reached the scene and made every effort to pull the steamer off. They were unable to move her. Finally, she was towed to the pier and the tug Neptune returned to the city, bringing up the mate, Mr. Alex. P. Hutchison, and the purser, Mr. Alex. Harrison, who reported the loss to the agents. The Lily took the crew on board.

terday afternoon was lying in the same position as on Sunday afternoon. Mr. Nash, of New York, superintendent of the Anchor line, arrived in the city, and in company with Captain Shanklin and Mr. J. T. Knight, of J. H. Seaman & Co., left for the scene of the wreck on the tug Neptune about 2:30 o'clock. Their visit was for the purpose of looking over the hull and surroundings. A large number of ladies and gentlemen took advantage of the chance of reaching the wreck by the tug. At Negro Head the wreck was surrounded by fishing boats. Some were engaged in picking up wreckage while others were employed giving sight-seers a good view of the ship. The party on board the tug chartered small boats and many boarded the wreck. These were enabled to walk along the port side of the ship, which part was away out of water. There was a large number of camera flashes both on the water and on shore and some very good pictures were secured. Mr. A. Clarke, the King street photographer, was on land and took a number of large pictures for Mr. Knight.

Captain Shanklin, Mr. Nash and Mr. Knight, with a number of other gentlemen, made soundings. In the death of Thomas Manion in Spencer, Mass. last week, there passed from earth a man whose history for the past quarter century would afford a remarkable example for a temperance lecturer. For 25 years, up to the time of his death, he had drunk over 55 barrels of whiskey, had been arrested 192 times, had paid \$2,027 in fines, and had spent nine years and nine months in jail for being drunk. Twenty-five years ago Manion had \$10,000 in his bank and owned real estate that was worth an equal amount. This property he had accumulated by hard work and sober and frugal habits. He always took whiskey and filled a glass which he had a call to the bar. As he bought a gallon of whiskey each week, it is reasonable to suppose he consumed it all during the six days he remained in the house. On Saturdays, assuming as a conservative estimate that he absorbed three pints, this added to the gallon regularly purchased makes his total weekly consumption of 5 1/2 gallons. He was a stout, narrow-shouldered man, but deep-bodied and very powerful and muscular.

The English Are Unmilitary. Partly from historical and partly, perhaps, from racial causes, the English are essentially unmilitary. They resent the cost of soldiers. They distrust military ideas. No government that ever existed in this country was more unpopular than that of Oliver Cromwell and his major generals. It is unpopularity left an indelible mark on English institutions. For many years it made it impossible to have a standing army. Even when the course of events made it necessary to concede that much to the military necessities of the time, it still remained a principle that the largest sense, the domination of the military idea in a state is calamitous. It tends, we believe, to destroy individuality and is a serious menace to individual liberty. -Monthly Review.

SOUTH AFRICA. Duke of Manchester's Debts Paid. London, June 28.—The Duke of Manchester made today what he hopes will be his last appearance in the bankruptcy court, as his creditors formally accepted the composition of 61 cents on the dollar, which offer was approved yesterday at a meeting of the unsecured creditors. Although the accounts showed that the unsecured debts are \$133,550, the trustees submitted that this sum could be scaled down to \$98,550, with assets amounting to \$30,000. During the course of his final examination today the duke reiterated that his failure was due to theatrical speculations, and said he had not gambled.

Boer Prisoners Brought to West Indies. Hamilton, Bermuda, June 28.—The British transport American, having on board the first ship load of Boer prisoners to be quartered on Darvel's Island, arrived today. The health officers only are allowed to visit the ship at present. It is rumored that there is much sickness on board.
