

said that it was not the intention of Government to apply for an amnesty for any offences committed in the North West insurrection of 1869.

OTTAWA, April 8.
In the House to-day petitions asking for a Prohibitory Law were presented the signatures to which numbered nearly twenty thousand.

A message was received from His Excellency Lord Dufferin thanking the House for the address.

In reply to Mr. Cauchon, the Premier said his answer to Mr. Palmer yesterday was that the Government did not intend applying for a pardon for persons for offences committed in the North West at present.

The Prohibition Liquor Law petitions were referred to a Committee.

OTTAWA, April 9.
The excitement concerning Riel, and what Parliament will do with him, is unabated. It is generally believed that he is hiding in, or somewhere about, Hull Village, on the lower Canada side of the Ottawa river.

The House met at 3.30 p.m. Petitions were presented in favour of a prohibitory liquor law.

Rules of the election court of New Brunswick were laid before the House in accordance of statute.

Mr. Pickett presented a petition praying that the Government should for a prohibitory law be complied with.

The estimates were presented to the House of expenditures for the financial year ending 30th June, 1874, together with estimates for the fiscal year ending 30th June 1875, and statements showing the increase for such service; compared with 1873, and the following is the result, in so far as concerns the items of interest in the public debt, including Ontario and Quebec trust funds, \$5,559,793.21; charges of management, \$46,712.81; Civil Government, \$20,676.40; administration of justice, \$2,207; police, \$4,300; legislation, \$23,970; pensions, \$17,483.54; public works, chargeable to capital, \$706,293.44; public works, chargeable to income, \$246,244.28; marine hospitals and sick and distressed seamen, \$13,000; steamboat inspection, \$3,350; Indians, \$60,487; collection of revenue customs, \$83,729.75; excise, \$6,000; milling, \$30,000; weights and measures, \$30,000; inspection of staples, \$3,000; public works, \$787,200; post office, \$189,500.

The total estimated expenditure for 1874 and 1875 are \$42,025,416.15. The total estimated expenditures for 1873 and 1874 were \$34,685,906.91. The increase required for 1874 and 1875 is \$7,339,509.24. Thus, deducting \$5,752,651.05 to provide for the redemption of bonds falling due in 1874 and 1875 from the total estimates for 1874 and 1875, it would appear that there was an increase in the revenue and expenditures for the said year.

In answer to Mr. DeCosmos, the Premier said the Government could not say when the construction of the Pacific Railway would be commenced, as the surveys are not completed.

Mr. Orton moved for a select committee to inquire into what will be the best to conduce to the prosperity of agricultural interests. A long discussion ensued, the motion being finally carried by consent.

OTTAWA, April 10.
Nothing very new was elicited in the close of Clarke's examination, although almost every question was answered by the Speaker to be put.

The questions tend to show that Clarke was setting by the direction of the late Ministry in testing a warrant against Riel, and the late Ministry tried to get Riel out of the country. These questions were strongly objected to on the ground that they had no bearing on question of Riel's fitness to occupy a seat, but the Speaker ruled the question in order. Clarke stated that he never received any instructions from the late Ministry. After completing the judicial machinery in Manitoba the Ministry had never interfered in the judicial affairs of the Province. He never new of the late Ministry trying to get Riel out of the country.

Mr. Mitchell said that although these questions were entirely aside from the matter before the House, he hoped the fullest information would be elicited upon these points. As a member of the late administration he could state that no such efforts to get Riel out of the country were ever made or thought of.

In answer to a question Clarke said he had received several letters threatening his life if he took further action against Riel.

Cunningham annoyed the House by many very drunken questions.

Two Ottawa policemen were examined to show that they had warrants for Riel's arrest.

Bowell enquired whether, in view of the facts that had been elicited from the witnesses in reference to the member from Provancher, it was the intention of the Government to take any action with reference to the seat which that man held in the House.

The Government were the true custodians of the privileges of the House. He would like to know whether they had any intention to take any steps in the matter.

MacKenzie said that whatever course the Government were disposed to take they would not take the matter out of Bowell's hands.

Bowell argued that in the Sadler case after the facts had been elicited by an independent member of the House the Solicitor General moved for Sadler's expulsion, and in the late case of O'Donovan Rossa the Premier himself moved for his expulsion. As it was apparent from the answer of the Government that they did not intend to take any action, he gave notice that he would, on Monday next, move for the expulsion of Riel from the House.

Blake was in the House, but remained silent all through, when it was thought that the least he might do was to assist when technical discussions arose.

Among the Prohibition petitions to-day was one from London—sixty-six feet long, containing five thousand signatures.

Palmer, seconded by Mitchell, introduced a bill abolishing the Tarry Laws. He advocated free trade in money.

MacKenzie introduced a bill placing the construction of the Intercolonial Railway in the hands of the Government.

Dorion introduced a bill explaining the meaning of the words "competent magistrate," as occurring in New Brunswick. It extends to Registrars and others.

A debate took place showing the House to be favorable to the Northwest Geological Survey.

House adjourned till Monday.

The Committee on the Northwest troubles met to-day. The reporters and the public are excluded.

Petitions are coming in from various newspaper proprietors, for a reduction of duty from 15 per cent, as at present, to 7 1/2 or 8 per cent. Only \$40,000 came into the revenue of the Dominion from this source. It is claimed that, with a reduced tariff, the amount of revenue would be at least quadrupled, and at the same time that newspapers and the public will reap benefit.

OTTAWA, April 11.
A division will probably take place on Monday, on the motion for the expulsion of Riel. The action of Mr. Bowell has made it an open question, in which both members of the Government and Opposition will vote in accordance with their individual views. Sir John's continued reticence and absence from the House whenever the Riel question is up, has greatly exasperated his French supporters, as well as those who sympathize with Mr. Bowell.

The coming bill to the Governor General, and the promise to Mr. Bowell, promises to be a very brilliant affair.

The Canada Gazette to-day contains the following appointments: Mr. Thibault, Deputy Minister of Public Works, to be an Intercolonial railway commissioner; Vice-Aquila Walsh, resigned.
