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Golden Wedding of Sir Charles and Lady Tupper

OTTAWA, Oct. 9.—Few events of a social nature that have taken place in Ottawa in the past, have been attended with more general interest or looked upon with more kindly than the celebration yesterday by Sir Charles Tupper, Bart., and Lady Tupper, of their golden wedding. Golden weddings are a rare occurrence in most communities, and it is not to be wondered at that when a statesman who has been identified with the political interests of Canada and her provinces for nearly half a century, and has occupied the position of Premier, celebrates fifty years of wedded life, the interest in the event extends beyond the boundaries of the capital and even of the country.

The event was observed in two parts. Between the hours of four and seven p. m., Sir Charles and Lady Tupper were "at home," at their residence, 22 Cooper street, to receive the congratulations of their numerous friends.

After seven o'clock the affair was entirely of a family nature. Those congratulating Sir Charles and Lady Tupper were Mr. Laurier, Sir Oliver Mowat and Sir Henri J. Lacombe. Presents being received by the baronet and his wife by every member of the family.

The gift of the family to their parents took the form of a handsome service of gold plate made in Montreal. The ornamentation of the different pieces consists of a kind of hand laid pattern, the latter being emblematic of Sir Charles's native province. On the larger articles the dates "1846-1896" for Charles Frederick Tupper, and the monogram "C. F. T." are inscribed in open work at the top of each, the whole producing a very rich and elegant effect.

In the afternoon Sir Mackenzie Bowell read the congratulatory and eulogistic address from the Conservative members of the Senate, and Mr. George Taylor, chief Opposition whip in the House of Commons, another member of the Conservative members of that body. 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
