Those who are affected by the above by-laws are warned that they go into effect from Jan 23, 1919; The wording of the bylaws in the records of the town is much more lengthy than is here epitomized, and cover a great many points. The town clerk, the town treasurer or any alderman will give full information pending the time when the bylaws can be printed in book form. a copy of which will be accessible to any rate payer.



Dear Editor: At the January

This to be dedicated as a special memorial to all the men who enlisted and crossed the ocean for the purpose of fighting for the liberties which were bought for us with the blood of our forefathers and that a room in that part of the hospital be set apart for the souvenirs captured from the enemy; that a record of all who laid down their lives and particulars of the battle. date, etc., and those who were fortunate to return, the date of sailing, or some such thing be kept in a book. Or, better still, each locality might raise a special fund and pay for a memorial window, the names of the men who laid down their lives in said war, inscribed thereon, and thus answering a twofold purpose.

Raising More Grain in Place of Potatoes

HARD AND SOFT SOAP FULL DIRECTIONS WITH EACH CAN

It is expected that New Bruns wick potato growers, providing that they do not find themselves in the same boat as their competitors across the Maine border will benefit by a movement now in progress in Aroostook county greatly reduce their potato apreage and raise more grain. The high cost of fertilizer and labor and unsatisfactory prices for the tubers are given as the reason for the proposed change. Aroostook raises from 17,000,000 to 22,000,000 bushels of potatoes yearly. The growers there claim they must have \$3 a tarrel or quit the industry. Many farmers are cancelling orders for fertilizer which is quoted at from \$69 to \$96 a ten. Formerly it sold at from \$25 to \$40 a ton.

Severe Ice Storm.

Last Friday a severe sleet storm swept over the country and left trees, fences and buildings heavily coated with ice. A great amount of damage was done to the lines of the Farmers' and N. B. telephone companies, and to the Western Union. Wires were down in all directions and all telephone and telegraphic service was interrupted. Crews worked all day Sunday repairing the damage, and in a remarkably short time all the companies were giving their usual good service.


