NEW BRUNSWICK FARTHEST NORTH

Good Radio Work by LeRoy L. Fenderson, Jacquet River.

There are at present from 600,000 to 1,000,000 radio telephones receiving sets on the continent of North America, according to United States Secretary Hoover. A year ago the radio phones were scarcely past the experimental stage and were understood and operated by only a few persons who were looked upon by the public as dealing in a commodity closely allied to the occult. The spread of the science was remarkable, and, to-day, it is said there must be taken immediate steps for regulation of wave lengths so as to prevent interference with amateur's business messages. If the instruments continue to multiply, as fast in the next two years as in the past year, the air will, unless some regulations are passed, become a weird jangle of sound, according to some experts.

Many instruments have been installed in the city and the surrounding country. So far what is believed to be the "farthest north" phone is operating by J. LeRoy Fenderson, at Jacquet River. Mr. Fenderson has a very delicate receiving set which enables him to pick up messages from a great distance. He has heard messages in code from Europe, musical concerts from Chicago, 1,500 miles distant, trade messages from New York, and a variety of communications from all over the continent. He has received many interesting letters from writers and officials in the United States, thanking him for advice of communications received, which have proved very valuable to the scientists as far as the instrument is concerned. A north has made, reports to them. Armstrong Perry, well known scientific writer and author of radio programs, a personal friend of Mr. Fenderson, writes that he is well known in Washington, and that he has been mentioned by several officials of the Public Health and Naval Service, Mr. Perry, in his radio program, has mentioned that articles have been sent to him, and that he has been asked to write for them.

The United States Public Health Department sends out a regular programme three times a week and Mr. Fenderson, according to officials of the department, the most distant operator from Washington, making reports on these. He received a letter, a short time ago, from C. C. Pierce, assistant surgeon general, thanking him for his reports.

One very pleasant feature of the work is the receiving of musical concerts, in which the best of music, vocal and instrumental, is transmitted into the air to be heard by an invisible audience. The Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company, from their Newark and Springfield plants, send out these concerts frequently, and a variety of other messages. All these are received clearly at Jacquet River and Mr. Fenderson has received several letters from officers of the company, thanking him for the interest shown.

IN REMEMBRANCE.

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C. N. R. OFFICIALS ARE WELL PLEASED

Announcement in Reference to Autonomy for I. C. R. Good News.

The policy of the King government in giving the Maritime Provinces local autonomy in the management of the C. N. R. with headquarters at Moncton was received with favor to-day by local officials of the railway. The opinion was expressed that the change would first of all allow of railway business being carried on with greater efficiency, less loss of time and expenditure of money.

Under the present system officials seeking authority on railway matters out of their jurisdiction make application to Moncton; the request is then forwarded to the eastern division headquarters, Montreal, and finally to Toronto, where the matter is considered and a reply sent back over the same route. A short time ago a request by a local concern for about \$20 worth of rails had to be made by the roundabout route and ten days elapsed before a decision that should have been given in short order was able to be given.

Under the present system millions of dollars in railway contracts were being spent in Montreal and Toronto, the Maritime Province manufacturers being frozen out.

Thriving car works at Amherst and Halifax had been forced to shut down for lack of business as cars and equipment were purchased in Upper Canada.

Trainmen as a unit are enthusiastic over the proposed change in management.

THE ICE.

The river is still holding firm, although it is said for teams crossing.

BRIEF SKETCH OF RESPECTED CITIZEN

Mr. Archie McCurdy of Dalhousie Junction Talks of Old Times.

Archie McCurdy was ninety-seven on the twenty-third day of October, 1921. He lives with his son Daniel McCurdy at Dalhousie Junction, N. B. It was there that I found him and the old gentleman spoke feelingly about the long ago.

He was born in Arran, Scotland, and came to this country in 1832, when but seven years of age. His father was John McCurdy and his mother Katie Cook.

The landing was made at Dalhousie, and he remembers a woman, upon sight of the four or five houses of the place, exclaiming, "well, well, this is Dalhousie."

The family first settled at Charlottetown, but remained there for only six years, when they moved to Maple Green. Archie's brothers were Lachlan, John, William and Thomas and his sister Maggie.

At twenty-eight Archie married Elizabeth, daughter of John Caldwell, help you.

QUEBEC PROVINCE HAS GOOD LAWS

Migratory Birds are Permitted Now to Make Their Annual Travels.

Quebec, April 8.—The enforcement of strict regulations affecting fish and game in the province have been responsible for a much improved hunting season, according to officials of the sportsmen's Fish and Game Protection Association. The spring hunting has now practically disappeared it was also stated, and the game wardens have been given strict instructions to not allow any violation of the protective legislation. The Migratory Birds Convention Act to prevent the killing of migratory birds in Canada is now being rigidly enforced.

Cap Tourmente, two miles from St. Joachim enjoys the unique distinction of receiving the visit every May of a flock of ten thousand snow geese coming up from the southern states. They spent some time here, then leave for the northern region. In the month of September they again return to Cap Tourmente and after two months leave for the South to take up their winter quarters. For years this flock is anxiously awaited by sportsmen, and last year "interesting moving pictures were taken of the flock. There has been no slaughtering of those birds with the result that the flock is increasing each year.

Five boys and six daughters were born to them. Two boys, John and Daniel died young and two were later named after the deceased children. The other children were: Catherine, Margaret, Mary, William, Edith, Rebecca and Ethel.

Mr. McCurdy was evidently a strong, able man and speaking of his work in the woods and heavy timber, he said: "There were no puny that could beat me with the axe."

Of crops, he raised wheat, barley, oats, buckwheat, said he, "I had here in the house of buckwheat flour, nine barrels." "We raised our own flour and had it ground below Black Landing. Of stock, he said: "Generally kept two horses and ten head of cattle."

"Of schools—"There was one Rogers that 'taught' school here. "I mind that I dined the school master and three him down on the floor. You see, he came and took my books and gave them to a girl, I went and took the books back and he came and took them again and I flew at him."

"I joined the church when Rev. Stevens was the minister. He used to come from Campbellton.

About smelts, "My gracious, we used to go up to the head of tide and take down boat loads of smelt and put them on the land. We now see the value of them."

About church going—"They used to come up from Black Landing to Campbellton for the sacrament. They would come Saturday and stay here over night, and go the rest of the way Sunday morning. It is twenty-two years since Mrs. McCurdy died.

Mr. McCurdy has a mind wonderfully clear and enjoys speaking of the past. He has good health and hearing. His sight is failing but he looks forward to that beautiful vision which never fails.

BATHURST OPERA HOUSE DESTROYED

Fire was Well Under Way Before Discovery and Impossible to Save Building.

Bathurst, N. B., April 7.—The Bathurst Opera House was completely destroyed by fire early this morning, involving a loss of many thousands of dollars.

The blaze, which is believed to have started about two o'clock, was well under way before being noticed, and it was impossible to save the building. A residence belonging to Joe Branch nearby, was badly scorched on one side, but the firemen saved the building from a total loss.

The origin of the fire is unknown.

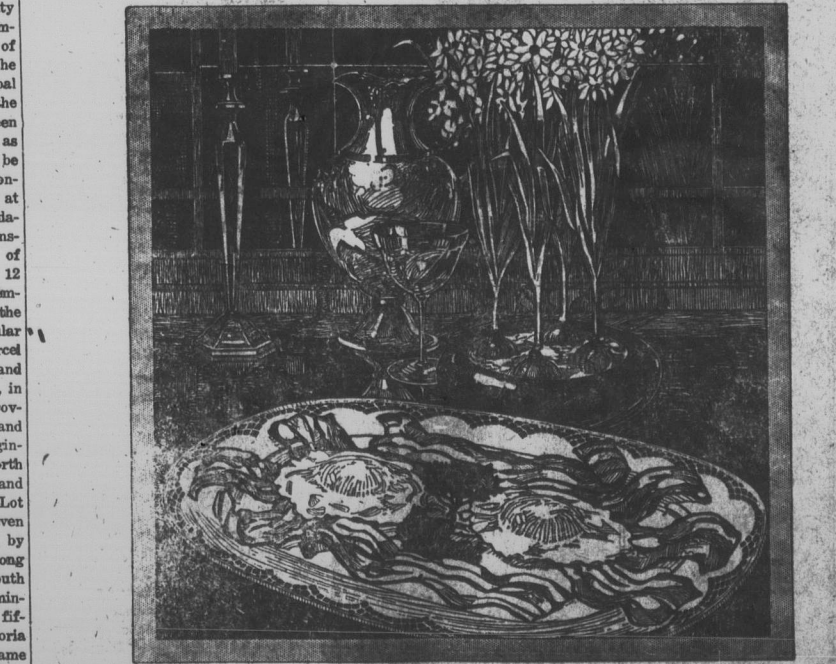

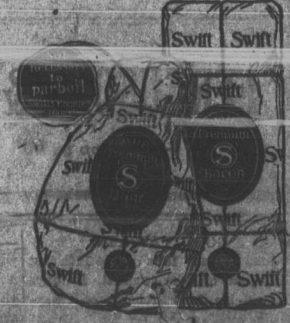

THE OUTLOOK AT GENOA.

The eyes of the world are now turned

to Genoa. The great economic

conference opened none too propiti-

ously and it appears that the sound

common sense and resourcefulness of

Premier Lloyd George saved it from

disaster in its very inception. By bring-

ing up a disarmament proposal which

is not on the conference agenda, the

Russian Soviet Foreign Minister caused

a clash with M. Barthou of France,

but the British Premier proved equal

to the occasion and, by a stirring ap-

peal to the representatives averted the

menace.

At this early date it is difficult to

hazard any definite conjecture as to

what the accomplishments of the

great economic parley will be, but

after two stormy days during which

the conference ship has progressed

without mishap, reports give promise

that at least a fair degree of success

will crown the efforts of the attend-

ing statesmen.

Certain facts serve to brighten the

prospects even to the most skeptic.

Lloyd George and Premier Facta, the

presiding officers of the conference,

give promise of being equal to any

difficulties which may arise, and the

conditions of the Combes resolutions

and the agenda have been accepted by

all nations represented. It is true that

Russia and France are grumbling over

personal grievances and are not very

fraternal in their relations, but at the

same time most of the powers have

abandoned war hatreds and it is ex-

pected that the irreconcilables will be-

come more tractable as the confer-

ence proceeds.

That the conference has a colossal

task before it is quite evident. Thirty-

one different nationalities are repre-

sented—thirty-one nations whose in-

terests clash at many points, and with

little in common except the fact that

all are suffering from the economic

chaos occasioned by the war. More-

over, this is the first gathering at

which both groups of the belligerents

take part on at least nominal terms

of equality. The Washington confer-

ence was a veritable test of the

ability of statesmen to agree on any

thing; but the result was gratifying.

At Genoa the test will be much more

severe. Much will depend on the

spirit of the debaters. If the same

atmosphere of fraternity and broad-

minded consideration, which prevailed

at Washington, can be achieved at

Genoa, incalculable good will be the

inevitable result.

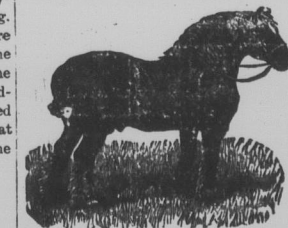

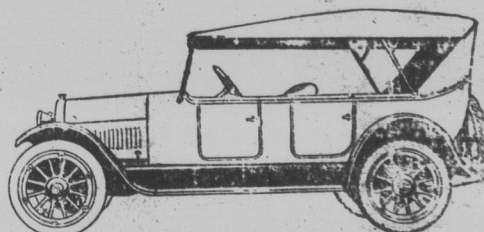

TOWN BILLS UNDER DISCUSSION

Bill to Allow Issue of Debentures Agreed to As Amended.

Fredericton, N.B., April 8.—The House in committee on Friday afternoon agreed to bills relating to the village of Bodney, to amend Municipality Act relating to the Town of Newcastle, to authorize the town of Sackville to issue debentures, to amend the act incorporating the town of Moncton, and an act to enable the board school trustees of the city of Moncton to issue debentures.

The committee next went into consideration of a bill relating to the town of Campbellton, and some amendments thereto recommended by the municipalities committee. The bills ask authority to issue debentures to the amount of \$250,000.

Mr. Martin having approved of the issue of debentures by a plebiscite, and also of the vote election subsequently held, had a right to know why the bill had been amended.

Mr. Richards said that he understood that the promoters of the bill favored the amendment as it stood. He had personally drafted the amendment at the request of one of the members for Restigouche.

Mr. Hayes said that the amendment was based on the recommendation of the members for Restigouche. He was not aware that any question had been raised as to the illegality of the plebiscite.

Mr. Martin said that the change had been made in the bill without the town authorities of Campbellton having been consulted. This did not seem to him to be right.

Hon. Mr. Michaud said that the committee had heard a delegation representing both sides of the question and had afterwards decided to make the amendments.

Mr. Martin said that when the delegates from the town returned home they were under the impression that the bill would go through as originally drafted. Now the committee had been informed that the change had been made on the recommendation of the two members for the county.

DEMONSTRATION OF NEW TRAIN STOP

Mr. G. H. Metzler's Invention Tested Before Officials; Movies Taken.

"Necessity is the mother of invention" and by reading newspaper accounts of railroad accidents last Mr. George H. Metzler, of Halifax, but formerly of this city, and a son of Mr. W. A. Metzler, Union Street, to invent his silent signal which may be the means of hundreds of lives being saved from needless accidents.

Mr. Metzler has spent two years on this invention and on Wednesday afternoon demonstrated it before a number of railway officials and interested citizens.

The test which was made Wednesday proved to be a decided success.

An engine which had been fitted up for the test, pulling three heavy passenger coaches, was used.

The device is an upright of iron which is clamped onto the top of the rail by means of hand turned clamps.

The upright supports a vertically placed metal bar and a socket for the danger flag. The whole device weighs about nine pounds and stands about 30 inches in height. It is so constructed that the flagman can place it in position in less than one minute. On the pilot of the engine was placed a 16 inch lever in the air valve and when the vertically placed rod on the device comes in contact with the lever on the valve, the force of the collision automatically opens the air valve and at the same time causes the breaks to work on the entire train and throwing the iron signal clear of the track.

Two tests were made, the first with the train travelling between 15 and 20 miles per hour. In this instance the train was brought to a standstill within the length of the engine and two cars.

The second test was made at the speed of approximately 30 miles per hour, the engine working steam when it struck, and a full stop was effected within the engine length and four car lengths.

It is pointed out that the advantage of this new signal is that it eliminates the possibility of the engineer failing to see signal lights, or hear torpedoes intended to warn him of danger at night. If he fails to see these in an emergency the train plunges on to destruction but with the new signal in position, that is impossible, as it brings the train to a quick halt whether seen or not.

It was an event that attracted much attention and Mr. Metzler was much encouraged by the demonstration and wishes to thank the officials for the kindly way he was treated and who made the demonstration possible.

In discussing the invention with a Transcript representative, Mr. Metzler stated that the new device if adopted would not do away with signals now in use, but would be a big boon in foggy and stormy weather. He stated that the device on the pilot of the engine was not a temporary one as the proper valve could not be applied in time for the test. Nevertheless the temporary one was highly successful and did the work required of it.

It is pointed out that the iron frame of the device may be struck with great force and not hurt.

Mr. W. G. MacLaughlin, Halifax, the Photo News photographer, was present and secured pictures of the occasion for his company.

Mr. Metzler has demonstrated his invention before the Exhibition of Railway Appliances in Chicago.

General Superintendent J. C. O'Donnell and many prominent local officials witnessed the test in Moncton on Wednesday. Transcript.

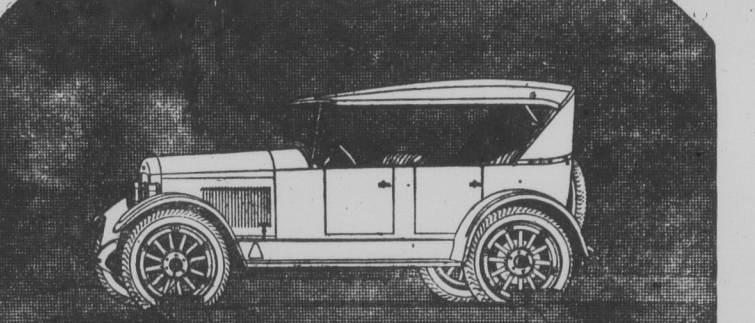
