
Roseate Picture of a New Transatlantic Steamship Scheme.

New York, March 11.—An editorial will be published to-morrow in the Seaboard giving an outline of Austin Corbin's latest soheme of swift steamers from Montauk Point, L. I., to Milford. By the Subsidy Act recently passed in Congress Mr. Corbin has been able to excel all plans for transatlantic steamships, and inritermore the editorial says he will begin operations at once.

The idea is to build eight first-class steamships of 12,000 tons each, all to be of steel, to be constructed in American ship-yards, and to be capable of making 24 knots an hour. By there ships it is hoped to make the distance between Montauk Point and Milford Haven, 2.781 nautical miles, under fivedays. From New York a train of vestibule cars will take the passengers in two hours' time to Fort Pond, N. Y., where the deep water will allow the heaviest draught ocean steamships to run close in shore. ROOM FOR REJOICING.

Probable Early Settlement of the Bohring Sea Trouble.

Washington, March 11.—The Behring Sea negotiations have taken a favorable turn, and it is reported that the Governments of Great Britain and the United States have at length reached a basis upon which to settle their difficulties.

London, March 11.—The Standard, commenting on the Behring Sea papers, says: "Both nations will rejoice to know that the differences have narrowed until they have reached a shape at which both sides can agree to arbitrate."

The Times says: "It is difficult to imagine that Mr. Blaine can persist in keeping the quarrel open after Lord Salisbury has accepted the bulk of his own proposed terms for a conference, or can make it a grievance. The terms declined have been shown to be manifestly unjust to England. The result of the Canadian election following the popular reaction against the new tariff law in the United States may induce him to reflect that more success is to be gained by fair and amicable dealing than by high-handed actions and tall talk.

Probable Early Settlement of the Behrwing Sea Trouble.

Washington, March 11.—The Behring Sea negotiations have taken a favorable turn, and it is reported that the Governments of Great Britain and the United States have at length reached a basis upon which to settle their difficulties.

London, March 11.—The Standard, commenting on the Behring Sea papers, says: "Both nations will rejoice to know that the differences have narrowed until they have reached a shape at which both sides can agree to arbitrate."

The Times says: "It is difficult to imagine that Mr. Blaine can persist in keeping the quarrel open after Lord Salisbury has accepted the bulk of his own proposed terms for a conference, or can make it a grievance. The terms declined have been shown to be manifestly unjust to England. The result of the Canadian election following the popular reaction against the new tariff law in the United States may induce him to reflect that more success it to be gained by fair and amicable dealing than by high-handed actions and tall talk.

TUPPER'S ATTACK ON THE GRAND TRUNK. It is chronicled of James I. that being r

quested by his old nurse to make her son "a gentleman," he answered empahatically, "I'll mak' him a baronet gin ye like, luckie, but the de'il himsel' couldna' make him a gentleman,

Of Sir Charles Tupper it may truthfully be asserted that his own wire-pulling and pipe-laying made him a baronet, but no power on earth can make him either a gen tleman or a statesman. Despite his declaration of four years ago that it was imprope for civil servants to become active partici-pants in federal elections, and notwith-standing that he and a large number of his family and relations are annually pocketing many thousands of dollars of money belongto the Canadian public, Tupper has for weeks been dashing up and down the Dominion traducing and lying about onehalf of the people. By appealing to the outlying Provinces

of the Dominion, with those tangible in-ducements that he knows so well how to dangle before the eyes of a needy elector ate, this Prince of Billingsgate has managed to secure a small majority for the party which keeps him and his following affluence, but that does not satisfy him. In a speech which he delivered at Amherst, N. S., on Monday last, he makes it abundantly evident that he is disappointed to find the Tory majority in the new House so small that rascalities such as have been tolerated by past Parliaments will now difficult of accomplishment. A man who had achieved a satisfactory ctory would be in better temper than it is evident possesses the champion stretcher of truth and good manners. His particular bete noire at the present stage is the Grand Trunk Railway and its managers. They are not prepared to sacrifice their interests, to bow down and worship at the haughty shrine of the Nova Scotia bully. They refuse to use their influence directly contrary to the best interests of their trust. They decline to shut their eyes and open their mouths while waiting to discover what the

dictator shall give them. Are they not right? Tupper tells them that Canada, in pursuit of the policy which it has applied free ly to other public works, has liberally subsidized the Grand Trunk, and has collected no interest on the original loan of \$15,000,-000. But he conveniently ignores the great service which this immense system of railways has been to the country, and he forgets that while the original investors sank many millions in the main line 35 years ago, they have as yet received no benefit from it, whereas not even a Tupper can deny that the Grand Trunk was of immense value in the development of old Canada and in enalling our farmers to get their produce

cheaply and expeditiously to market. What has been the recent policy of the Grand Trunk? Its management knows that on the maintenance of cordial relations with the United States-the freest possible intercourse between the two countriesmust depend the future of this great system, as well as of other through lines of railway. The Grand Trunk has \$200,000,-2000 of British money invested in the lines; of this \$50,000,000 has been placed in the States, chiefly in Michigan. Its lines in Canada extend to 3,119 miles, and in the

TURNING THE SCREW A LITTLE

TIGHTER.
Complaint is being made at various points along the international line that unduly high valuations are being put upon Canadian goods shipped to the United States. By some people this is thought to be a local circumstance, due to the ignorance of the United States customs officer. In reality, however, it is but the carrying out

of a new provision of the United States customs laws, designed to put a check upon under-valuation. It is an agency for helping the McKinley tariff to turn the screw a little tighter on the Canadian exporter, and so promote the policy of restriction which is seemingly so much in favor on both side of the boundary. How it works may be illustrated in the case of a horse purchased for shipment to the Detroit, Buffalo or New York market. The dealer, we may suppose, purchases the animal from a farmer at \$120, and if he succeeded in entering him at the same figure at the custom house the duty will be only \$30. But the customs officer under the new law may refuse to enter the animal at \$120, and place upon him instead a valuation of \$160. In that case the duty is calculated at 30 per cent., so that instead of the exporter paying a fee of \$30 to Uncle Sam's collector

s obliged to pay \$48.

It is by artifices of this kind that the McKinley tariff is bound to make itself felt in Canada, as our farmers will speedily discover when they have anything to sell which comes under the ad valorem rates But Uncle Sam learned this trick from our elves. It is one of the inventions of that distinguished statesman and economist Hon. Mackenzie Bowell.

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

DISTRESS IN IRELAND

Pailure of the Potato Orep and Candition of the Congested Districts.

Dublin, March 11.—The Irish Local Government Board has issued its long expected report on the failure of the potato crep and upon the condition of the congested districts. Among other things the report states that the districts in which the disease appeared comprise about half of Ireland; the disease is due to planting old Champion seed, the disease-resisting properties of which have been greatly weakened of late years. Continuing, the report goes to show that the small farmers are in good circumstances, but are confronted with a scarcity of potatoes, which is unprecedented in 30 years, causing the deepest distress in the congested districts, this distress being aggravated by the reluctance of the local shop-keepers to grant credit so early in the season, or before they are able to judge the harvest prospects.

Some of the Board's inspectors estimate the potato crop failure as equivalent to the loss to the people affected of their mid-day meal and the loss of a portion of their suppers for part of the year.

The remainder of this long report gives details as how the suffering poor should be relieved and showing that the distress is, as yet, on the increase. The relief applications are confined to the congested districts of the west, and to the laboring and fishing classes of the south, but it is, expected that the pressure for relief will become more general between now and the month of April.
