An electric car dashed down a hill at frightful speed, left the track, broke a telegraph pole and shot into a saloon wreeking both itself and the structure it struck. As a result of the collision two people are dead, six are injured beyond recovery and nearly 40 more are hurt, many of them dangerously.

DAIRY DOINGS.

Result of Inspector Millar's Visit to Norfolk County.

Pasture and Cows Dried Up-A Dozen Cheese Factory Patrons Fined for Watering and Ekimming—A Little Scheme.

Mr. T. B. Millar, inspector for the Dairymen's Association of Western Ontario, returned to this city Saturday from visiting the cheese factories in Norfolk

tario, returned to this city Saturday from visiting the cheese factories in Norfolk county.

The recent drought has affected that district as much as any part of Ontario. The light, sandy soil became very parched and dry, causing the pastures to dry up and leaving nothing for the cows to eat but the withered grass and whatever vegetation there was that could withstand the dearth of rain. Consequently the cows supplying milk to the cheese factories began to dry up and the milk supply to fall off very much. The price of butter also went up to a high pitch at this time, rendering it very difficult for some patrons of the cheese factories to maintaintheirmoral equilibrium and keep their ruputation for honesty and fair-dealing unscathed. Such was the case with a dezen of the patrons supplying milk to the factory, and sad to relate, one of them a defender of her Majesty's laws, forsooth, a justice of the peace. These parties thought it would be a mark of superior business ability and unequaled shrewdness if they supplemented the returns from the cheese factory by adding water to the milk (possibly to wash the dirt out) before it was sent to the factory and by taking off that nasty, vellow-looking stuff, called cream, which always gathers on the top of milk when set down for any length of time, or by taking only part of the milk from the cow and sending it to the factory, for fear, no doubt, that the cow might feel badly if all the milk were taken away from her at once.

Experience is golden, and possibly many will profit by the visit of Mr. Millar to Norfolk and refrain in future from endeavoring to reap a prefit out of their neighbors by watering or skimming milk supplied to their cheese factory. A great many people are under the impression that one-half of the fine imposed, when a charge is made by Mr. Millar for tampering with milk, goes into the treasury of the Dairymen's Association of Western Ontario, which pays Mr. Millar a regular salary for his services, and consequently he is quite independent of the number and amount of the fines imposed.

HISTORICAL RED-LETTER DAY. Everybody confesses that the passage of the bill granting local self-government to night was a great event in the history of

No more important legislative enactment has been put on the statute book of the Imperial Parliament during the hundreds of years that the peoples of Britain and Ireland have been endeavoring to understand one another.

The bill provides that the Irish people shall manage their local affairs, as we in Ontario do, and that their decrees shall not be subject to the revision of outsiders, unless they are proved to be out of accord with the charter now conceded to them.

We do not lose sight of the fact that able

politicians oppose any change from the anomalous condition of affairs that has kept Ireland in a state of unrest and has made or abroad, discontented with the treatment consideration of the measure which has now passed the representatives of the people, Mr. Gladstone and his associates have been met with the cry that the direst results would flow from their message of conciliation and good will. Students of history must be amused at this style of argument. Who does not know that the opponents of reform and progress have ever found a refuge in this cry of "the fearful future" when argument failed to convert the majority to their views ? The British Con servatives have resisted under similar pleasevery progressive measure brought for ward by the Liberals.

They were sure the Reform Bill of 1832 would rain the country, but it became law. And the country survived.

They were certain that free trade would bring the country to woe. But free trade was brought about. And Britain prospered and advanced as she kad never done

They were absolutely assured that the disestablishment of the State Episcopal Church of Ireland would destroy that church and bring the country to civil war. The Church of Ireland was disestablished, and its present ministers tell us that it has more than held its own in the reputable and independent position which it has

ccupied since 1868. False prophets every one of them have been in the past with regard to the effect of reforms upon the fortunes of interests affected by them. And so, one feels safe in prognosticating, will they be proved when Ireland has its legislature, and the first step is taken towards the thorough relief of the Imperial Parliament from discussing and prenouncing upon purely local questions affecting any part of the United King-

But even if the Home Rule Bill were defeated-if the avowed coming verdict of the House of Lords were to become the decree of the country as well, what would the opponents of the reform substitute for it? Are they prepared to have perpetuated the state of affairs that existed prior to 1885, when the British democracy, headed by Gladstone, Morley, Rosebery and Aberdeen, took their case in hand, and offered the solution which is now before the world and which has been accepted as fair by the overwhelming proportion of the Irish race?

That is the question. The Conservatives have one answer for it; the Liberal dissidents have another; the united demo-

In its construction there were used 1,700,000 bricks, 2,000 tons of stone, 2,000 barrels of mortar, 1,000 loads of sand, 1,000 barrels of Portland cement and the estimated cost is \$40,000.
