My Dear Friend,-No doubt you have thought me very unkind in not writing to you before, and I guess you think. out of sight out of mind, but such is not the case with me, as I often think of the good times we had while I were with you, and I hope before long to have similar good times.

We are having fairly nice times here. and one would hardly know we were at war, but for seeing trainloads of wounded come in, and a guard we do every day, for our boys parade the streets just as if we were in Canada, but they won't do that when we get up the line, which, by the way, I hear we are going to do the end of this month. The sooner the better, for we shall take our turn in the trenches we are only Army Service Corp by name, because we do our wards just like the regular army. From that I have seen, and by "boys" I have spoken to from the trenches, give this war, over in June or July, for the "Huns" cannot last much longer, as Continued on Page Thirteen.

The association, it is reported, also warned against certain goods that were peing accepted through middlemen

because of the poor quality. Premier Borden, when asked concerning this correspondence, stated that it was confidential. Later the Manufacturers' Association told him that it should be brought down as the manufacturers had nothing to hide. This was not done, and to a large extent the Conservatives . have alienated the organized support of the association.

Can London Have Both the Fair and Big Khaki Camp?

This Question Will Have To Be Debated As It Appears That Guelph and Goderich Are Both Anxious To Secure the Soldiers.

Two other places in Western Ontario are aggressively conducting a lobby at Ottawa in the hope of securing the concentration camp for this district. Guelph is ready to offer considerable inducements to secure the camp, and Goderich is also making every effort to have the military forces enlisted in this district taken to the lake shore for the summer at least.

While Landon's chances of retain ing and adding to the force now stationed here are good, there is a probability that a conflict of opinion will arise over the question of hold. ing the Western Fair. Recently The Advertiser stated that the genera opinion was that the fair should be held but that was before it was realized that the holding of the exhibition this year might conflict with the forming of a concentration camp in the city. 

ARMS EXPORTS DEFENDED

The Prohibition of Shipments Would Be Distinct Breach of Neutrality.

[Canadian Press.] Washington, April 21.—The reply of the United States to the recent memorandum from Count Bernstorff, the German ambassador, dealing with exportation of arms to the Allies will be delivered today to the German embassy. Secretary Bryan made this announcement today, but would not discuss the details of the reply

Secretary Bryan declined to say whether the reply accepted the ambassador's memorandum as from the German Government or as an expression of Count Bernstorff's personal views. The reply, however, gives it official recognition, leaving the question of its authority between the ambassador and hi Governmen

Probable Contents. There is understood to be a friendly logical and legal discussion of the points raised by the ambassador, taking issue with the statement that the United States has accepted Britain's alleged vioattention to the various notes presented by the state department to London, asserting and defending the rights of neutral governments to conduct trade in everything short of contraband, and even to ship food supplies to the civil population of fighting nations.

London, April 10, (Correspondence of the Associated Press.)-War work for women has its official limitations, since the home secretary refuses to grant licenses to women who have successfully passed the examinations required of drivers of motor vehicles. The reason the home secretary gave to the applicants was the public's alleged lack of confidence in women drivers.

"Could he not leave the public to decide that " asked Miss Phipps, president of the National Federation of Women Teachers, in an address before that body in London the past week.

A Deadly Insult.

Miss Phipps aired other grievances
against the Government, in which she had the sympathy of the teachers. The legislation closing the liquor houses to women until 11:30 a.m., and not to the men was based on the lie, she said, that most of the drinking was done by soldiers' wives. This she considered a deadly insult to the women. Discrimination in the matter of wages existed in the factories furnishing munitions of war, she charged, as men received more pay than the women for equivalent



> CHAPTER XI PEAS AND BEANS.

[By Professor Spade,]

No garden is complete without peas and string beans. The only difference in the two, botanically, is that peas are hardier and a cool season while warmer weather is required by the more tender bean. Atmospheric nitrogen goes into the making of both and if any amount is to be grown it is advisable to use a fertilizer containing this quality.

Garden peas are easy to grow. They do best in spring rather than in the hotter months, and also thrive in the fall from late-sown seeds. Even before freezing weather is past peas may be sown. They should be planted from three to five inches deep. The peas is one thing that will thrive best in a soil that is not too rich. A strong soil tends to make plants run to vines and delay the crop. Sewings may be made at intervals of six to ten days throughout the growing season to obtain a continuous crop.

For the early crop the dwarf varieties are ideal. In handling the taller and later kinds the grower will do well to practice pinching in the excessive growths. This assures a larger and

quicker yield. Two or three cultivations during the growing season are usually sufficient peas. They can be sown from six to eight inches apart in rows. The plants should be from three to four inches apart in the rows. If the dwarf varieties are grown, each plant will tend to support the other. "It has zeen a century since the boundary line between the United States and Canada was established, and yet both countries are more prosperous today than they were a hundred years This country shares the larger of North America with several Spanish-speaking republics, and there is no reason why there should be any dispute between them in a century or in many centuries. The idea that a nation can grow only geographically is as un-American as it is untrue." Said It Before.

Admiral Peary on reading the above mment declined to comment upon or discuss it, but pointed out that he first presented the idea "that the entire North American world segment is the eventual destiny of the United States" in a public address in London in Noer, 1903, when he said:

'The attainment of the North Pole is particularly an object for American pride and patriotism. The North American world segment is our home, our natural, ultimate destiny. Its bounds are the isthmus and the pole. We are negotiating for the isthmus. We must find and mark the pole."
