





Mr. Graydon has been more or less worrled over the pavement, owing to the delay in completing it. His pavement troubles, however, are not at an end for this season. He has the York street pavement still on his hands. Although the work between Talbot street and the York street bridge was started some months ago, it is still far from comple-tion, the delay being occasioned by the failure of the contractors to get brick from Ohio. Brick has already been laid on the north side of the street as far west as Thames street, but on the south Mr. Graydon has received a letter from the brick manufacturing company in Ohio, stating that a consignment of 92,000 not a brick has been put in place. bricks had been shipped a day or two ago, and that it would reach London at an early date. 


