

Correspondents can only conjecture what happened at yesterday's meeting of the British Cabinet, but it is no se cret that a crisis cannot be staved off much longer. The protectionist and the free trade members of the Government are at the parting of the ways A truce was called pending the fiscal inquiry, but the report of the commission will be the signal for action. If Mr. Chamberlain is not supported by the Premier he must withdraw from the ministry. If Mr. Balfour stands by him, the Chancellor of the Exchequer and the Duke of Devonshire must go, as they have pledged their adherence to the present fiscal policy. The other Ministers have avoided any public expression of their opinion and are free to take their choice. In any event, the disruption of the Cabinet is inevitable It is not probable that even if Mr. Balfour and Mr. Chamberlain stood together they could survive the hostility of the Unionist free traders and carry on the Government for any destrians against the bicycle and the length of time. An appeal to the country would speedily follow. The Administration, even with Balfour at the head, would be in an equally precarious position with Chamberlain on the outside, playing a lone hand. Chamberlain's personal following in the House of Commons would swamp the Government's majority, and his strength in the country would mean a disastrous defection from the Unionist party in a general election. 


