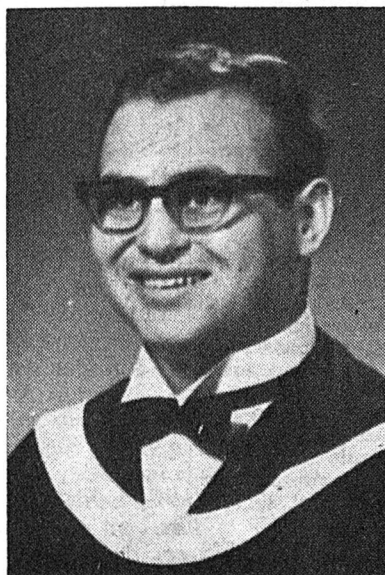

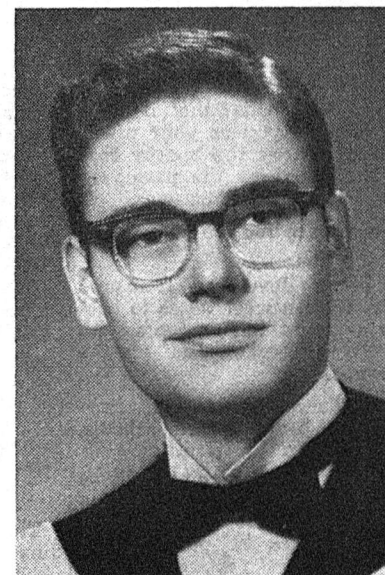

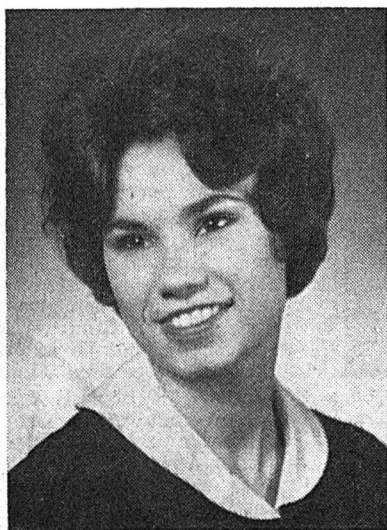

What is the purpose of student government? In the coming year this question will become increasing important.

I submit that the purpose of student government is to organize the Union so as to provide maximum opportunity for the expression of student interests.

The organizational structure of the Union set up many years ago has failed to adapt as quickly as necessary to changing conditions. Consequently Council has become partially isolated from student opinion. Clear lines of communication, authority, and action should be established between student government and the student body.

The problem of reorganization necessitates a new look at our present fee structure. As it stands, a certain portion of fees are automatically allocated to various areas of student activity. The result of this has been to freeze the allocation of finances while student interests have remained flexible and constantly changing.

If elected, I will direct a re-assessment of the entire fee structure as it relates to students' interests.

How are we going to prepare our Union for the "birth" of a \$2-3 million building?

The new SUB must be governed by Council policy. This would be guaranteed by setting up a SUB board which would become an integral part of the Union organization. A place on the Council executive should be found for the chairman of this board.

Next year promises to be challenging. We must meet this challenge by planning for tomorrow, today!

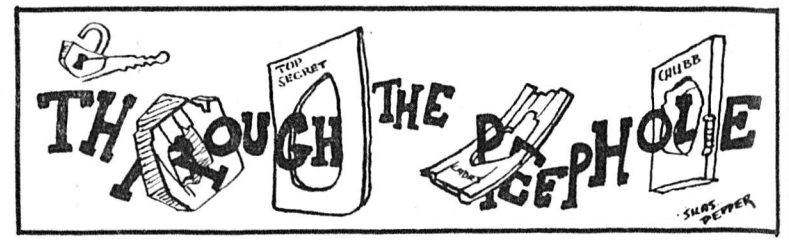

2. To continue the reorganization and planning of the Union structure in order to prepare for the immense developments of the very near future.
3. To revise the Union fee structure in order to return student fees to student control. We need intelligent budgetary planning instead of arbitrary allotments.

My candidacy, then, is founded on a strong belief in "quality" as opposed to "quantity" government. Successful and valuable student government depends on efficient administration, and not upon fee increases. With that thought, may I sincerely request your support on March 1.

Fellow students:

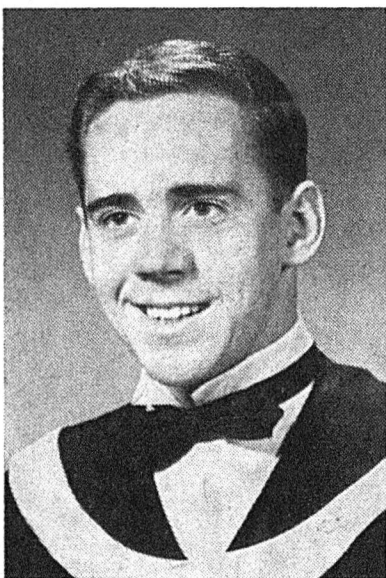

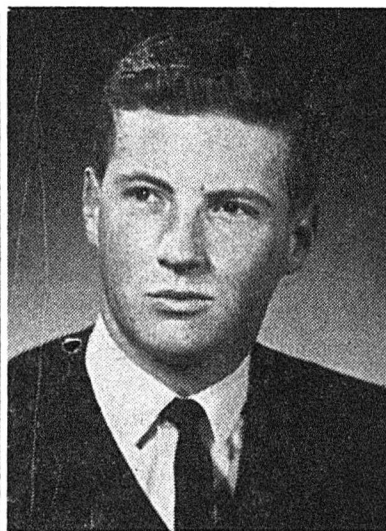

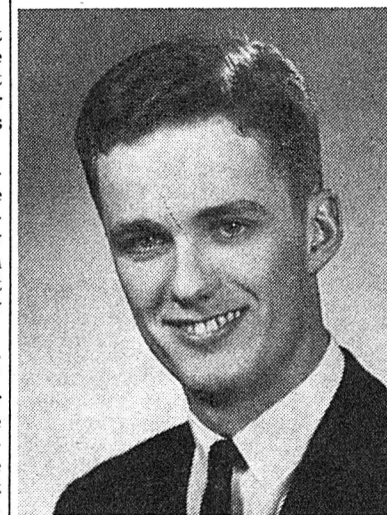

Secondly, I would like to thank all those who were willing to help me in the event of an election. I shall ever be indebted to their support and hope that I shall be able to fulfill their confidence.

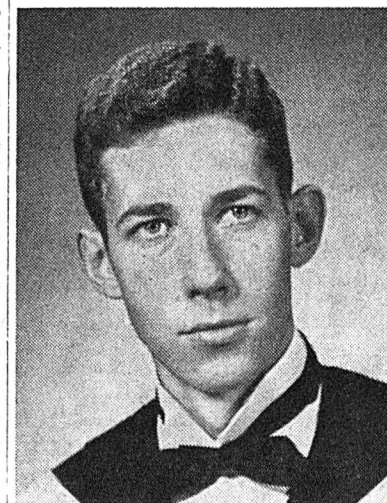

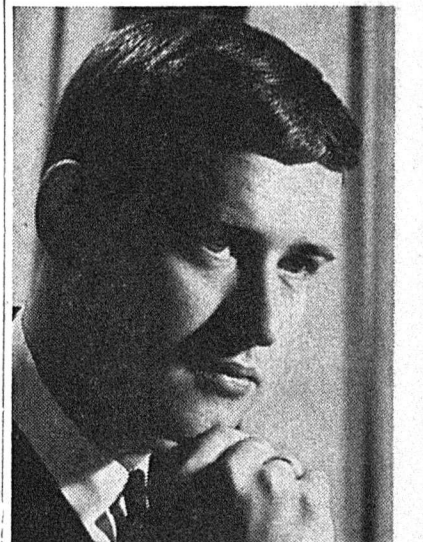
If elected to the position of NFCUS Chairman in the forthcoming election, it will be my policy to remedy this situation on the University of Alberta campus by putting into effect the following measures:

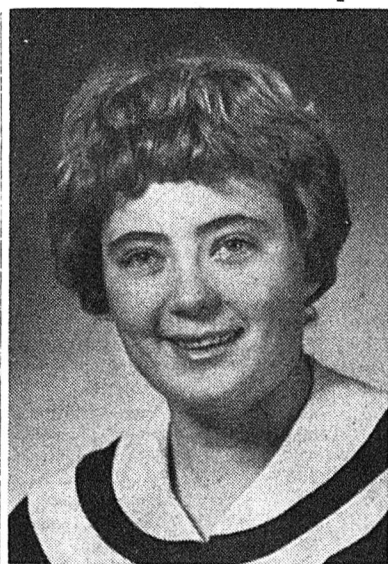
- increased and more effective publicity of the Women's Intramural program.

- better use of athletic fees for activities in which all women

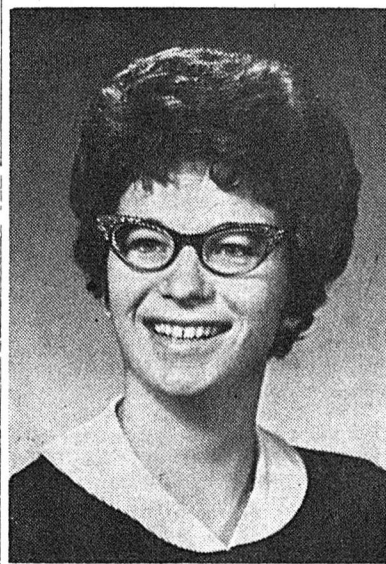

church's Young People's Association and secretary-treasurer of the Charity Council and Glee Club in her school.

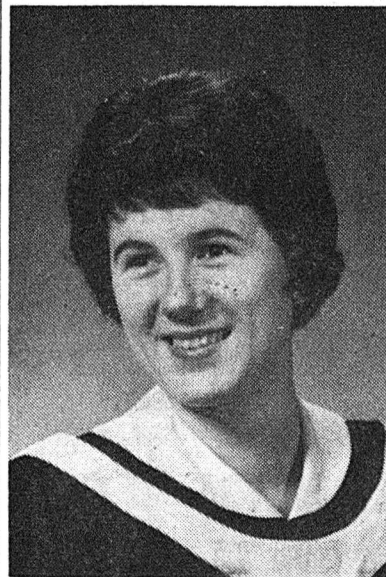

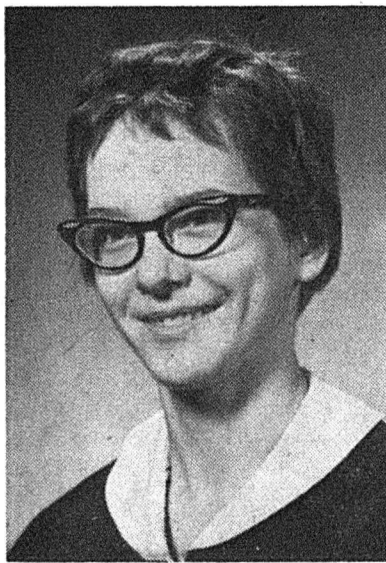

My assigned task is to outline my views on the present election campaign.

Before I begin, I remind you that this was written before nomination day. Further, by bylaw the Students' Union president is prohibited from any campaigning whatsoever. Also, most of my observations are directed to the Students' Council and Directors' Circle posts—including the faculty representatives which you will choose following the campus-wide elections.

1. The key consideration is that student government next year and in succeeding years must be **STRONG**. This year was one of transition in that SUB expansion, digging for money, new ideas, and re-organization of Students' Council for increased efficiency took a great deal of time. As well, we were faced with the unexpected death of Mr. Walter Dinwoodie, our business manager.

If anything, next year will be even more difficult as a new chief busi-

ness manager will have to be broken in, and final decisions made for SUB expansion.

2. Your representatives should be prepared to work with the SUB expansion committee. They must be ready to work to try to catch up in some measure to the knowledge now possessed by that committee. Otherwise, next year's council could be handicapped to the extent that no progress could be made on the building.

3. Your choices should have some knowledge of NFCUS, if Alberta is to play a strong role in our national federation. Each students' council is the NFCUS council for each Canadian university.

4. Hard workers should be elected. They must be intelligent, able to get along with others, and ready to lose a few points from their high (preferably) academic averages.

5. Finally, I must disagree with the editor of the Ubysey who thinks campus politics should be mere "fun." I am the first one to appreciate a keen sense of humor, or any type of "fun" you'd care to name. There is indeed room for humor in student government. Evaluation of new projects undertaken this year will have to be made; for example, the switch of the year book contract from Edmonton to Winnipeg to save \$10,000; the holding of a Blitz Day for the United Campaign Fund; whether the charter flight to Europe is worth while; the Directors' Circle for Students' Council; incorporation of the Students' Union; the TGIF dances; use of IBM facilities for student activities; joint council meeting with Calgary; student housing investigation. Many improvements can be made.

Negotiations should continue with the graduate students over fees, as their \$5 pledge is only "interim" and will increase in accordance with their interest in SUB facilities. Finally, preparations must be made for a first rate National NFCUS Congress here next fall.

This is just part of the picture. Therefore, you can see why I ask you to elect a strong student government for next year.
