MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS.

The offices of Mayor and Reeve having been filled by the return of J. W. Scott and Mr. T. E. Hay by accolamation, the municipal contest this year was confined to the Deputy-Reeveship and the Ward elections of Councillors. Although there was considerable interest taken in the elections, nothing akin to excitement was exhibited. The result of the contest for the Deputy-Reeveship was a matter of considerable surprise, even to those who were best acquainted with Mr. Hacking's activity as a canvasser. The majority which he succeeded in rolling up over Mr. Fennell—a gentleman of auperior ability and who is eminently fitted to occupy the position of Deputy-Reeve—is no doubt largely owing to this vigilance in the part of Mr. Hacking in canvassing for votes. Another illustration of the effect of a vigorour canvass, or of the disadvantage at which a candidate places himself who does not resort to this method of securing the support of the electorate, is furnished by the election in the Centre Ward, where a gentleman who has occupied the chief positions of honor at the disposal of the ratepayers during the greater part of the time since the incorporation of Listowel as village and town, failed to be elected as Councillor. It would be casting a reflection upon the intelligence of the electorate of this Ward to suppose that other reasons than that Mr. Campbell had neither sought the position nor solicited the support of any of the ratepayers, had caused him to be left in the minority. The successful candidates in the Centre Ward are Messrs. Heppler, Freeman and Bradley. In the East Ward, Mr. William Hess heads the poll. The large interest which the firm of Messrs. Hess Bros. have at stake in this town is sufficient of itself to entitle them to a representative at the Council Board; but and judgment will not be amiss in aiding in the management of the business of the town. Dr. Nichol still retains the confidence of the electors of the East Ward, and has been returned by a large vote. The remaining candidates, Messrs. Martins

The state of the control of the cont Seasonable Information for Tillers of the Soil-To obtain a supply of winter eggs, we must have the obicks out in March or April. Legherns and some of the smaller breeds will de in May or the first of June, but the Brahmas and Cochins must come off early, that they may have the full season for growth. The Asistics are generally good layers in winter, and need less artificial heat, as nature has not furnished them with any ornamental appendages which suffer by exposure to frost. For them it is not necessary to spend large sums in warm buildings. What they can dispense with in this respect they demand in feed, which must be given regularly. The feed must be kept up and varied with animal and vegetable diet. The supply of water must never fail. We must feed and feed a long time before the eggs will come. Any breed of hens will consume an enormous quantity of feed before commencing to laybut after having once begun they will not require, or even take so much grain. When Jaying their great craving is for vegetable and animal substances, and crushed clams or oyster shells. Fowis that are regularly trained have certain proportions of the day for their different feeds. My birds require their shells at night, as well as their greens and their grain in the morning, and always fresh water. Treatment of Sheep Rot.

The fellowing appears in the veterinary column of the London Field:

Rot in sheep is perhaps a more serious form of parasatic disorder than husk er 'worm in the throat,' oven if it is not so widely diffused. As we have explained, the manadyis due to the ravages of the flake (Distoma hepatican) in the liver, the worms being introduced in the inchoate state in the bodies of fresh-water molluses, which are swallewed by sheep when feeding in water meadows or wet lands, when drinking from stagmant pools. The progress of the liver rot is slow or rapid, necording to the circumstances in which the animals are placed. If the flukes are few in number, and the food of the pasture is of tolerably good quality—and especially of the flock-master, aware of the character of the Land, has taken the precaution to sup-

his chief reliance. The final test, however, is the detection of flukes in the gall dutels, and usually an opportunity will occur for a post mortem examination, which will place the matter beyond doubt.

Liver rot being known to exist in the flock, the question of treatment naturally arises, and there are several points which require consideration. First, it is well to be quite certain whether or not the sheep became in fected on the ground where the disease was discovered. A mistake in this direction may be serious, because it is most important that the animals should be removed from the place of where the larve of the fluke are to be found. It will often be ascertained on inquiry that the sheep have been recently purchased, or that they have been reaching the pastures where the larve is and it may be the case that the ground on which the sheep are at the time of the investigation is perfectly healthy. When it appears on inquiry that the affection has originated in the pastures where the animals are still feeding, it becomes a mere common sense proceeding to move them to higher and drive land. If from any cause this essential step cannot be taken, treatment is not likely to be of much use. Experience has proved over and over again that rotton sheep have a fair chance of
