Yet what right has he to claim to shrink from personal exertion: to plead for exemption on conscientious grounds is anything but honourable, however it may be passiated and pitied as a weakness generated by education in a highly respectable sect. But if it be admitted that force may and ought to be used by the magistrate to put down domestic violence, none will hesitate to infer that he is equally bound to resist violence offered by a foreigner. If a fleet of Morocco or Greek corsairs were to descend on our coasts, no man who con cedes that highwaymen ought to be repressed by force would deny that we ought to resist the piratia. Here then we have a clear admission that war, when really desensive, is justifiable; or rather, is a duty on the part of the magistrate: and if so, it is the duty of the subjects and citizens to assist him.
