Mr. Langley remarked that much of the loss of life was caused by the passengers not knowing the ship and Chinese Threw Off The Yoke of losing their way. Although he knew the vessel well he had to crawl out legs first through a porthole, dropping clear over to the sea and at moment later was sucked down by the sinking vessel. Being a strong swimmer he rose to the surface and was saved by a lifeboat.




