### N. S. Apples at the Pan

Mr. J. W. Bigelow, president of the Nova Scotia fruit growers' association, was in the city today on his way home from the exposition at Buffalo, where he spent a month in connection with the apple exhibit of the Nova Scotia growers.

In conversation with a local man, Mr. Bigelow expressed himself as very much pleased with his experiences at Buffalo.

"Our exhibit was very much admired," said he, "and the jury of awards gave a gold medal to Nova Scotia and four silver and three bronze medals to the growers who sent fruit by us for excellence in favor of Nova Scotia apples. I was also shown every possible variety of apple by Supt. Taylor of the Buffalo building."

"It may interest your readers to know that the apple crop in Nova Scotia this year is about 300,000 barrels for export and the price the highest known in the history of the trade."

"One grower, Mr. Arthur Starr, whose orchard is near my home, grew about 2500 barrels of apples on 25 acres and valued his crop this year at more than \$8000, the average price ranging from \$3.50 to \$4 a barrel."

"The varieties which proved best favored at the exposition were our commercial varieties—gravenstein, blenheim, king, golden russet and nonpareil."

"There were excellent apple exhibits there from New York, Illinois, Washington, Missouri and Ontario, but many of the states were not represented, notably, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania."

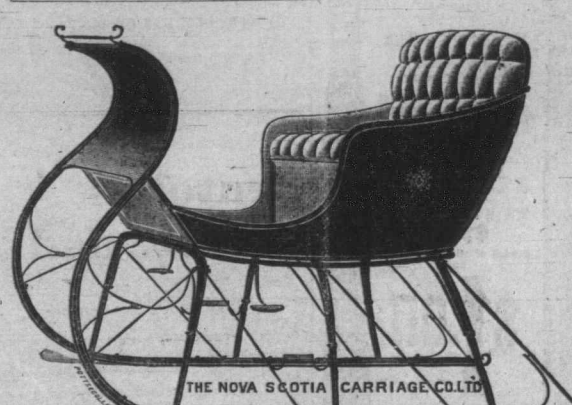

## Crown for the Queen

London, November 12—It is stated that the King has ordered the construction of a crown to be worn by the Queen at the coronation. The principal feature of the crown will be the famous Kohinoor, which was found in the mines of Golconda 841 years ago. The Kohinoor is the most remarkable diamond in the royal collection. It was often worn by Queen Victoria on special occasions. The original weight of the gem was 800 carats, but it now weighs only 106 1-2 carats. Yet it is valued at about ten million dollars.

Li Hung Chang Dead

China's greatest diplomat went the way of all the earth on Thursday last.

Leaving honesty and integrity out of the question, he is acknowledged to have been the greatest Oriental statesman in a worldly sense, the man who gets the better of his fellow diplomat in the eyes of the world, with notable exceptions.

Li Hung Chang was unscrupulous and shrewd and his influence was great in the Celestial Empire. It is said the immediate cause of his death was a violent quarrel with the Russian ambassador.

Pugwash Swept by Fire

Fire was discovered in Elliott's block, Pugwash, Sunday night at 6.40. The wind was blowing a gale and notwithstanding most strenuous efforts, in less than four hours \$35,000 of property went up in smoke.

By great work on the part of the fire fighters, the south end of the town was saved.

Twenty-three business places and houses were burned, valued at \$35,000, about one third covered by insurance. This is the second time within a year or so that the town has been burned. Pugwash is one of those towns who are "a penny wise and a pound foolish"—cannot afford an efficient fire protection service and suffer in consequence. It is said a hand engine would have drowned out the fire in 15 minutes.

Eight deaths of children have been reported to the St. Louis Health Department as the result of lockjaw, due, it is asserted by the physicians, to the administration of the city bacteriologist's specially prepared anti-toxin for diphtheria.

Eleven other children are ill with lockjaw, and death is expected in each case. Nineteen cases of lockjaw among children have therefore been reported as a direct result of the administration of the infected anti-toxine.

DICKIE'S BIG CUT

Five Million Feet of Lumber Sawn at Liscomb Mills—Fine New Plant.

Special to the Morning Chronicle:
LISCOMB MILLS, N. S., Nov. 9.—The new saw mill of Alfred Dickie at Liscomb Mills has finished its first cut of five millions and is now undergoing improvement for a much larger cut next year.

On Saturday, October 15th, an hour's test run was given this saw and during the sixty minutes one hundred and ten logs were sawn, aggregating twelve thousand, seven hundred and four superficial feet in one, two and three st.ck.

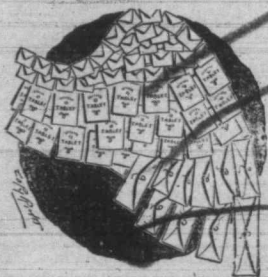

The work will employ 250 men for four months. This pier will be used exclusively for coal shipment. Other piers will be constructed for iron ore purposes. The total length of the new pier will be 1,400 feet, which is the length of the Dominion Coal Company's pier at Sydney.

As a result of the French naval demonstration Turkey has yielded all points in dispute and the French ambassador will shortly return to Constantinople.

After the conclusion of hostilities in South Africa, it is expected that a permanent garrison at the Cape will consist of 50,000 men.

EIGHT BARRELS OF GUM. Windsor Tribune.

On Monday the steamer Avon carried from Windsor to Summerville eight barrels of gum, which had been picked from trees in New Brunswick by men employed by Wm Spearing, Cambridge. The weight of the gum is estimated at 190 lbs per barrel, and the value of the lot at about \$800. In Nova Scotia this business would be very unprofitable, but in New Brunswick, where often 4 to 5 pounds of gum are obtained from a single tree, the business is a very good one.
